

An Eighth Air Force Liberator Station. England:

S-Sgt. Archie C. Pittmann of Bronte, Texas, is a crew chief in the B-24 Liberator group commanded by Col. Albert J. Shower of Madison, Wis., which recently completed 100 bombing missions against enemy targets in the exceptionally brief time of 140 days.

During this time, Col. Shower and his group "showered" over 10,000,000 pounds of high explosives onto enemy occupied in Germany and the occupied countries.

This group is a part of a A Bronge lady in cleaning combat wing which was cited hedoism and outstanding peraltitude of 6,500 feet. Col. Shower led the wing on this occasion.

The group also has the distinction of having the first allied heavy bomber to land in France, when on June 14, Lt. Charles W. Grace of Kalamazoo, Mich, and his co-pilot Lt. Arthur L. Prichard of Onaway. Mich. set their big Liberator down safely on a new fighter landing strip, after the other eight members of the crew had bailed out.


