

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

has been arranged to have a bond rally there next Friday evening, December 15, in the Robert Lee school auditorium. It is a county-wide rally and it is urged that everyone from the East side of the county who can possibly do so, attend this rally.

Major David Evans, with a "Bond Wagon," will be in at tendance and will do the entertaining. Major Evans needs no introduction in Coke county, for he has been speaker at such rallies in the county before. He is known as "a Hitler hater, says what he thinks, is a patriotic American to the core, lashes the enemy with a scorpion tongue and says "to h-ll with Hitler."

And the "Bond Wagon" is a group who were stage artists before entering the service, and "know their onions," when it comes to entertaining.
