Every feature from beginning to end of the two day encampment was of such high order, even including the recreations, it is difficult to decide as to the most interesting and pleasing feature of the program.

The climax of the two big days of work and fun, was Wednesday night, chosen as "Family Night." It began with a barbecue. ## "Aunt Frankie" Baldwin Dies, at Age of 89

Mrs. Frances Baldwin, one of the former pioneers of this part of Coke county, but more recently of San Angelo, died at the home of her daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Bergen, Tuesday morning July 7, at 10:35 o'clock.

Interment was in the old Fort Chadbourne cemetery, Wednesday afternoon, following religious services at Johnson's Funeral Chapel in San Angelo, at 2:30 o'clock. Services were conducted by Rev. K. P. Barton of San Angelo and Rev. Hanson, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church.

August 7, 1885 Frances Saffronie Henderson was born at Pangburn, White county, Ark., the baby daughter of one of the old and widely known families of her home county, where she grew to womanhood. She was one of a family of 21 children.

October 2, 1873 the deceased was married to Thaddeus Baldwin, who was a member of another widely known family in his home county. Mr. Baldwin died August 2, 1924 and was buried in the old Fort cemetery. Beside him her body was placed for its last rest.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. L. G. Bergen, Mrs. H. M. Stevens of Hayrick; two sons, W. E. Baldwin of Hot Springs, N. M. and Hugh Baldwin of Abilene; a half sister, Mrs. E. N. Henderson, McCamey, and a half brother, C. D. Chandler of Searcy Ark. Eighteen grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren, one of whom is Mrs. Geo. Thomas of Bronte.

The Baldwins were one of the truly pioneer families of Fort Chadbourne and Coke county. They came from Arkansas to Texas in 1885. One of the first recollections of the writer is that of the departure of the Baldwins from the home state. They and our parents were friends before we were born. Here in the West, as they were in their former home, they were identified with everything

**SERVICEMAN'S WIFE MAY APPLY FOR MATERNITY CARE**

Austin, Texas, July 19.—A serviceman's wife may apply for maternity care and care for her baby, under the emergency maternity and infant care program, even after the husband has been honorably discharged, promoted, or demoted, provided she was pregnant during the period when he was in one of the four lowest pay grades of the services or was serving as an aviation cadet. On the same basis, she may apply if the husband and father is a prisoner of war, missing in action, or dead.

This clarification as to who is entitled to care under the Government's emergency maternity and infant care program was made today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The State Department of Health administers the program in Texas.

Heretofore the application for care had to be made while the serviceman was in one of the eligible grades. Now all that is required to establish eligibility is proof that the wife was pregnant while he was in one of the eligible grades. The infant in these cases is also eligible for full care during his first year of life. Similarly, if the father of an infant whose mother did not receive care under the program was in one of those grades at any time during the infant's first year of life, the infant's eligibility for care under the program is established.

The greatest effort of the new policy, which is retroactive to January, 1945, will be in bringing infants of discharged servicemen under the program for the full year in which the infant is entitled to care. The new regulation also clears up a matter about which some confusion has existed, that is whether widows and their infants are eligible. Under this interpretation they are without question eligible.

The procedures to be followed in establishing eligibility is simple. The wife has only to show her physician or other authorized person assisting her in filling out the application form an envelope or V-mail letter from her husband, her allowance card or other official communication dated at a time when he was in one of the eligible grades. If she does not have such evidence, the State Health Department can make inquiry of the appropriate armed service.

"Clarification of this matter by Congress brings the whole undertaking in line with the spirit of the law," Dr. Cox said. "The important matter is to get care to these women and their babies, not the fine points of when the application was made. Surely all can see the justice of taking care of these men's wives and babies."

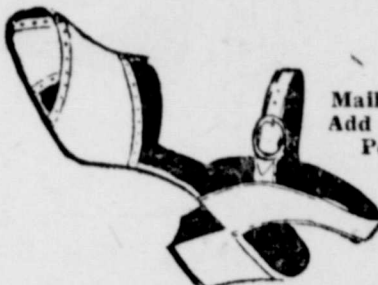
