the Morrison wrote his parents the letter below, which discloses that Jim was a fine brave and loyal boy:

My Dear Mr. and Mrs. Rogers: It is with heartfelt sorrow that I write you concerning! your son, who, as a result of the sinking of the USS Morrison on May 4, 1945, was declared missing in action.

In the early morning off the coast of Okinawa Island, the "Mighty Mae," as we affection-ately called her, was attacked by a large number of Japanese planes. For an hour we shot them down without serious damage to ourselves. Suddenly the ship was hit a great many times throughout her length, causing most of the super-

structure and parts of the hull to disappear amidst many violent explosions which started numerous serious fires. Our damage was so severe that the Morrison rolled over and plunged beneath the surface within a few minutes. Those who were either washed off or blown off the ship were the only ones found. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health matic fever are pain and swelling in the joints of the knees, ankles, elbows, or wrists. The pain usually is felt in one of these centers and spreads it to others. Oftentimes a child will get irritable and cross without any visible signs of a good reason for this attitude; he may cry easily or develop habits of nervousness. A physician should be consulted at once in such a situtation, for these symptoms may be the beginning of rheu-

matic fever. According to Dr. Cox the best safeguards against this disease are to have each child examined at least once a year by a physician, to have the right kinds of food and plenty of rest. When the disease is suspected of being present, a doctor should be consulted at once, and if he prescribes complete bed rest, his advice should be implicitly followed.



ASTOR COLUMN

Atop of Coxcomb Hill the Astor Monument reaches skyward, close to the site of the first permanent settlement in Oregon. Captain Robert Gray on a trading mission and his crew were the first white men to visit Astoria, at the mouth of the Columbia River. They came in 1792 and in 1805 Lewis and Clark passed the spot, setting up winter quarters seven miles southwest. The city's location and name were picked by members of a fur trading expedition sent out by the famous John Jacob Astor Company.
