Hence, Miss Croslin's first work was to get the women work. organized. This, she soon accomplished, with 16 W. H. D. clubs in the county, having an aggregate of 190 members. Since that time an estimated 38 other members have been added, making a total of about 225 women engaged in an orgaized and orderly way in learning more adeptly as to their work as housewives.





Fifteen books selected from the T. H. D. A. reading list clubs and council. Four more have been ordered. These books will be read by the club members until January, then they will be loaned. The purpose of this activity is to start a county library. These books are by well known authors and are on postwar planning.
