

Agricultural Contest for Castro County Begins In Dimmitt Saturday at 9 a.m.

Farm Produce to be Shown in Store Windows Over Town Until Oct. 26

The Castro County Agricultural Contest will get under way Saturday with a total of \$100.00 in cash prizes being awarded on ten agricultural products. The Grand Prize of \$50.00 will go to the

best head of grain sorghum entered in the contest. Cash prizes of \$5.00 each will be awarded on alfalfa hay, sesame, castro beans, pinto beans, potatoes, cucumbers, and in the woman's division

on canned peaches, plums and grape jelly. All items entered in the contest will be marked, or tagged, with the name of the grower and variety of the product and placed on display in

store showwindows about town where they will remain for the duration of the contest which closes Saturday, October 26.

The C&S Equipment Company Pontiac Building will be used as a receiving station for items entered in the contest. Entries in the contest may be made there from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. each Saturday on the items announced in competition for that week. Judging will be at the receiving station before the farm products are moved to the store windows for display.

The following items will be in competition Saturday, October 5, with the prizes indicated:

- Grain Sorghum: 10 heads, same variety, 3 inch stem, may be Milo, Kafir, Hegari. Prize \$50.00.
- Alfalfa Hay: Bundle 3 in. diameter, center band. \$5.00 prize.
- Sesame: 5 stalk bundle. \$5.00 cash prize.
- Sudan: 3-inch diameter bundle. \$5.00 cash prize.
- Watermelon: 1, any variety. \$5.00 cash prize.
- Spuds: 6 either red or white. \$5.00 cash prize.
- Cucumbers: 3 any variety. \$5.00 cash prize.
- Peaches: Quart, any variety. \$5.00 cash prize.
- Plums: Quart. \$5.00 cash prize.
- Grape Jelly: Pint or glass. \$5.00 cash prize.

Bobcats Defeat Antelopes by 34-0 Score Friday

The Dimmitt Bobcats again Friday night treated themselves to the sweet taste of victory when they handed a hapless Abernathy Antelope team a tidy 34-0 drubbing at the local stadium.

About 1,600 fans saw the game. Dimmitt's first tally came in the second quarter when quarterback Truman Touchstone, who was right in the middle of at least three of Dimmitt's scoring drives, passed to halfback Norman Nelson who picked up 20 yards and a touchdown.

Touchstone dropped another pass into the waiting arms of end Jerry Cluck for the second touchdown before halftime. The quarterback had set up the play with a previous 20-yard pass to Keith Lowe.

Just before halftime, the rampaging Bobcats added an insurance score when Touchstone sneaked over for a touchdown after a Dimmitt drive to the one-yard line. This play was set up by a 30-yard toss from Touchstone to Lowe also.

Dimmitt made two more touchdowns in the third quarter. One was by Lowe on a ten-yard end-around and the other was when Nelson intercepted an Abernathy pass on the 40 and made it to the ten. Nelson punched it over for the final tally.

Nelson made two touchdowns, Lowe, one; Touchstone, one and Cluck one. Lowe also kicked four of five extra points, missing the first try.

Coyce Wilkinson, Leon Gunn and Gary Cleaver led their mates in building a brick-wall line.

The Bobcats have an open date this week end. Next week they play the Hale Center Owls at 8 p.m. Friday.

About this time every year the Sheriff's office begins issuing little slips of paper that citizens in a lot of countries would give their eye teeth for. But here a lot of people won't bother to pick them up.

We're talking about poll tax receipts. Last year about 2,000 patriotic souls bought theirs and about 1,600 of these cared enough to use them.

Next year we'll be voting at every corner a half dozen times. All the two-year offices come up to bat next year. As in every year since someone thought of voting, there will be people who forgot to buy their poll tax receipt. Radium will blast consistently, television people will shake shadowy fingers at lax voters, and newspapers (still the best way created for informing the literate public) will plead, cajole, and threaten in their attempts to create a sell-out in poll taxes. But there will still be those who "forgot" or didn't have the buck seventy-five.

We've always maintained that the readers of this column (both of them) are fine upstanding, intelligent citizens with an appreciation for truth and logic. We KNOW they will purchase their poll tax receipts without being urged or pushed. We also know they will encourage everyone else to do as they did.

It's just one scrap of paper, but it marks the difference between a first and second class citizen.

Almost any day of the week, somewhere, somehow, there is a wedding ceremony. We hope this is true because a good many of them are written up in the Castro County News.

We have always left them alone, figuring wedding stories were really good news and were interesting to everyone who knew the couple. We still think so and from now on until the Castro County News grow whiskers we'll still carry accounts of every wedding we hear about in this territory.

Now it is not our intention to appear foppish or unduly straight laced, but think how much sense it would make (our point of view) if we could give a personal history of each of the two major participants, (the bride and groom) an account of the wedding in one paragraph or so, and their plans for the future.

At present the groom appears to be less important to a wedding than the color of a bridesmaid's dress! It is a long standing joke among people involved in weddings that the groom is the most useless necessity at the ceremony. He may feel that way, and other people may think he is—but he isn't!

We're not beating the tub for marital suffrage for the groom—all we want to do is treat a wedding write-up like a news story instead of an itemized account of a standardized occurrence.

Other newspapers have done just like the Castro County News for ages and followed traditional concepts of wedding reporting. There has been very little change so we go on bogging down in the descriptions of cake, everyone's dresses, and corsages.

The rituals themselves have adopted a standardized form—just like the accounts are so standardized in the newspapers. People aren't standardized so why standardize their weddings? Maybe this fuss is just a kick at conformity, but we'd like to see some changes made.

Sergeant Ryan, the Air Force Recruiter for this area, told us Thursday that Dimmitt and Castro County was the hardest place in the area to recruit airmen.

This shouldn't be so. We spent several years in the Army and are firmly convinced the Air Force must be a much better place to live. All of our young volunteers from this area go to the army or navy for some reason or the other.

We're not trying to give Ryan a plug, but if any of you know a young man about to voluntarily join the army it might do some good to give him a pitch about the Air Force. It's bound to be better than the Army.

Nazareth Farmer Brews First Batch Of Peppermint Oil

The fascination of a man watching a still in Oregon in 1925 led this week to what is believed to be the first batch of peppermint oil distilled in Castro County.

The man was Mr. John B. Achilmayr of Nazareth and he has been tossing the idea of peppermint oil around in his head ever since he saw the product bubbling from a three-inch distillery pipe in Oregon.

One reason for his fascination with the idea is the approximately \$26 per gallon value of the product.

Mr. Achilmayr has studied the peppermint producing industry and has written letters and found his markets. He is ready to produce and his first batch ran off six and one-half gallons.

Most of the peppermint, used mainly in medicines, flavorings, and chewing gum, comes from Oregon, Washington, Indiana, and Michigan, Mr. Achilmayr says. The supply is short and about half the peppermint used in this country must be imported.

A peppermint plant is the base of the product. It is planted, cut with a mower, like hay, and is allowed to set for a day or so. It is then put inside the still, water is added and when heat is added the distilling process starts. Three crops of the hay can be harvested per year and Mr. Achilmayr believes it will be one of the most remunerative crops in this area. It has taken him some time and effort to find his market and to learn all he could about the growing of peppermint, but he feels he is ready to begin a limited production now.

Japan presently carries on most of the remainder of peppermint production. Michigan, which for a long time grew most of the American crop, was, in 1925, surpassed by Indiana, while Oregon ranked third. Peppermint is native to Europe, and it is a small plant which grows one to two feet high, with oval, pointed, dark green leaves, and small, bluish white flowers, clustered in spikes.

A monthly family-night at the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt will kick-off one of the first concentrated budget campaigns ever planned by the church. The Family-Night Supper will be at 7:30 Wednesday night, October 9.

Purpose of the campaign will be to enable the church to set up an operational budget a year in advance.

The supper will also mark the end of the educational phase of the campaign. Letters and talks have been primary instruments used in carrying the messages of budgetary needs to the congregation.

This is the first time such a campaign has been undertaken by the church. In this manner First Methodist Church officials will know where their operational funds come from. Church membership will make pledges to be fulfilled during the year as well as cash contributions. It is planned that this one solicitation will be sufficient to operate for the coming year.

All the church families are invited to the supper, to be prepared by a committee headed by Mrs. P. P. Robb. Allan Webb will be in charge of the program.

After-dinner speaker for the affair will be Mr. Joel Hodges, executive vice-president of the Hereford State Bank, and a lay member of the First Methodist Church in Hereford. He is known as an outstanding speaker and has worked on church stewardship campaigns in the past.

A meeting of the workers who will do the soliciting will be held after the supper.

The entire campaign will be under direction of First Methodist Church minister Darris L. Egger. "We have been very pleased with the interest shown in this program," Rev. Egger said, "and we every hope in its eventual success."

Dimmitt Fine Music Fans Offered Membership in Canyon Association

Citizens of Dimmitt who are interested in good music performed by competent artists have an opportunity to hear at least nine concerts for less than \$1 each.

The Canyon Community Concert Association has decided to enlarge its membership area to include several towns in the area, including Dimmitt, in order to afford better artists and better music for music lovers in the four counties of Randall, Swisher, Castro and Deaf Smith.

A drive for memberships in the Canyon association begins Monday (Oct. 7) and will close on Saturday (Oct. 14). Only those who are members of the association may attend the concerts and performances.

Poll Taxes Are On Sale Now

About a dozen persons have purchased their poll tax receipts, which went on sale Tuesday, the Sheriff's office reported.

The poll taxes, which cost \$1.75, will be good next year for school, city and county elections, democratic primaries and a general election. All two-year public offices will be in the running along with several commissioners and public service boards.

There may also be special bond elections.

Those needing to pay poll taxes to vote are all citizens between the ages of 21 and 65. Those who are 21 and have never voted may obtain an exemption certificate by requesting one prior to the first election in which they intend to vote. Persons over 65 who live outside a city of 10,000 or more do not need an exemption certificate.

Memberships in the Canyon Community Concert Association are \$6 per year. It is hoped that representatives of the association will be selected in Dimmitt to take applications for membership. In the meantime, mail applications may be sent to the association in Canyon.
