POLITICAL HARMONY

After having read some two score newspapers, magazines, and articles about the recent Democratic Convention at San Antonio, we have about reached the conclusion that the only "harmony" to be found there must have been in the dictionary.

Both Harris and Dallas Counties sent two delegations to the conclave, each of which claimed to be the "legal" delegation. That was finally settled by a roll call vote which seated one of the Harris County delegations by a vote of more than 2-1. So the majority ruled.

Now the law provides, as we understand it, that each senatorial district is to choose its committeemen who are to serve on the State Democratic Executive Committee. Several members were thus chosen, only to be thrown off and replaced by others, at the convention.

The Convention Committee on Party Officers, for example, threw off members of the San Antonio delegation and replaced them with members of its own choice, in spite of the fact that an attorney present pointed out that their action was not legal.

In this case, two papers have quoted the chairman as "ruling the State laws are 'out of order'."

An example, then, that anything one does not like or disagrees with is "out of order." "Harmony" at all costs.

It somehow reminds us of the story about the prisoner in a concentration camp, who wrote home to his people. His letter was full of lavish praise for his captors, his food, and the way they treated him. But the payoff came with his post script: "Bill was shot this morning for griping."

Eagles Outscore Longhorns

The Eldorado Eagles came to Bronte last Friday, September 27th, and went home with a 13-0 victory over the Bronte Longhorns, who had previously played a scoreless tie with Lohn.

Eldorado's first touchdown came toward the last of the 2nd quarter on a 45 yard run following an intercepted pass, but the point after touchdown was lost when the ball was blocked. The visitor's second touchdown was the result of an end run from the 15 yard line, and here the point was good, making the score 13-0.

First Quarter

Eldorado received the ball on the kickoff, advancing 50 yards in 11 plays, and then lost the ball on the 10-yard line on downs.

Bronte then took over, and behind good plunging by Vaughn and White, brought it back for 30 yards. Simpson got off a good 35 yard punt, and a penalty gave the ball back to Bronte on the Eldorado 40-yard line.

The Bronte threat failed to materialize, however, as the Eagles intercepted a Longhorn pass on their own 30 yard marker. That ended the first quarter, with still no score.

Second Quarter

But the tide soon turned at the first of the 2nd quarter, as Vaughn in turn intercepted an Eagle pass on their own 48 yard line. The Longhorns failed to gain sufficient yardage, however, and lost the ball on downs. Eldorado was then set back 10 yards by fine line play on the part of Scott, Arrott, and Rogers, playing for the Longhorns, and the Eagles kicked out from their own 40.

A swarm of Longhorns closed in on the ball, blocking the punt beautifully, and Bronte recovered on the Eldorado 35 yard line to offer another good scoring threat.

Another pass was intercepted at this point, with the Eagles taking over in mid-field. It didn't take long, though, till Scott took his turn at pass intercepting, and Bronte again had the ball on the Eagle 35 yard line.

More line plunges brought the Longhorns down the field, but another Bronte pass backfired when intercepted by the Eagles, who ran 45 yards for a touchdown, making the score 6-0 when the try for extra point was blocked.

Billy Bob Herron received the kickoff following the touchdown, but was knocked down when he collided with a teammate. The ball was put into play on the Bronte 15 yard line, and after several plays at the line brought no gain, Simpson punted out of danger.

Eldorado received the ball on the Bronte 45 yard line, and there the ball stayed for a few plays till the half.

3rd Quarter

Bronte received the ball, ran it back to the 30 yard line, then punted. Eldorado received on her 35, played a bit, punted, it went back to the Bronte 45, the Longhorns gaining 10 yards on the exchange. Bronte kicked again on 4th down, Eldorado again took it on the 35, and in turn, kicked on their 4th down.

Another Bronte pass was intercepted on their own 41-yard line. Eldorado waltzed down to the 35, made a first-down on the 15, went over the next play on an end run, making the score 13-0 when the try for extra point was good.

White received the Eagle kickoff on his own 25, running it back to the 45 in a good exhibition of broken-field scattering as the quarter ended.

4th Quarter

Another pass was good for five yards, but the line leaked, letting the ball carrier be tossed for a 7-yard loss, and Simpson again punted. The remainder of the quarter consisted of passes and punts, with the ball staying more or less between the 35 yard lines. As the game ended, Robbins was shagging several passes for sizeable yardage, and the Longhorns had the ball on their 48 and were still advancing.

For the Longhorns, Scott, Simpson, Rogers, Herron, and Arrott turned in fine games in the line, and White, Vaughn, and Clark put on good pepper in the backfield.

Eldorado racked up 6 first downs to 3 for Bronte, while the Eagles twice penetrated the 20 yard line as compared to once for the Bronte eleven.

The Pep Squad kept up a continual chatter to the boys all during the game, and put on a stunt during the half.

Coach Gassiot's talk to the team during the half was interrupted by a crowd of onlookers who gathered around and got in the way, despite frequent attempts to shoo them away. He has requested that in the future fans will please stay on the sidelines so the interval during the half may be used to its best advantage.

Officials included George Taylor, umpire; A. J. Hudson, referee, and V. L. Lynn, head linesman.
