The Bronte Longhorns won their conference opener at Wingate last Friday by a score of 25 - 13.

Frank White tore the Wingate line to shreds on driving line plays. Frank went through them and Bobby Vaughn went over them, passing to Billy Bob Herron for 28 yards and to Billy Thomas 20 yards for touchdowns, with both passes caught in the end zone.

Vaughn passed to Herron for the extra point after Thomas' touchdown, and the score at half time was 13-0 for Bronte.

Wingate intercepted a Bronte pass but White hit the receiver on the one-foot line and hit him hard. A line play failed, also a pass, then Carl Howard went over from the one-foot line on a quarterback sneak.

White then went down the middle for nine yards and a touchdown.

Arley Wheat of Wingate then passed to O'Dell Preat, who scampered 75 yards to score, and Wheat also made the extra point.

White scored the final touchdown on a 4-yard run.

S. W. TEXAS METHODIST CONFERENCE MEETS WEDNESDAY

The Southwest Texas Conference of the Methodist Church will open its 88th Annual Session on Wednesday, October 23rd, at 3:00 P. M., in the Travis Park Methodist Church of San Antonio, with Bishop Bruce R. Baxter of Portland, Oregon, as the special guest speaker of the occasion.

Rev. George B. McCrary, pastor of the local Methodist Church, will attend as a delegate, along with Clifford Clark, lay delegate, and Joe Blake Whalen, who will represent the young people at the Boys' Conference.

Other features will be devotionals each morning, led by returned chaplains; the third session of the Boys' Conference attended by an outstanding youth from each church in the conference; a special laymen's service; a conference-wide Youth Rally for all young people, to be held on Saturday and featuring the choirs from Trinity University in San Antonio and Samuel Houston College in Austin.

Bishop Baxter has served as bishop of the Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Alaska Area since his elevation to the Bishopric of 1940. He also served for six years as president of Willamette University in Oregon and ten years as Dean of the School of Religion and Assistant to the President of the University of Southern California. His honorary degrees include a D. D. from the College of the Pacific, L. L. D. from Chapman and Whitman Colleges, and the Litt. D. degree from Willamette University. He is also a member of Phi Beta Kappa, a 32nd degree Mason, and a former director of the Hollywood Bowl.

It is expected that the largest number of delegates and visitors ever to attend the parley will be present, and it will close Sunday afternoon, October 27, with the reading of the appointments of the preachers for the new year.

WILLIAMS TESTIFIES IN TRIAL

Slaughter Williams, 28, former aerial gunner in the Pacific, took the stand yesterday morning in an attempt to establish a case of justifiable homicide as the murder trial continued in 51st District Court under Judge John Sutton.

Williams has been under indictment on charges of murder growing out of the fatal stabbing of J. W. Vest, 64, stepfather of the accused, who died last June 30.

During the trial, which opened Wednesday following Williams' indictment by the grand jury on October 7, State's witnesses have included Tracy White, who testified Williams told him the killing had occurred. Ollie Eubanks, deputy sheriff, who related he found a butcher knife with blood on it; Bruce Clift, Robert Lee undertaker, who brought in the body of Vest, and Sheriff Frank Percifull, who obtained a statement from Williams.

Defense witnesses were heard yesterday morning, and these included Williams, who testified of growing suspicions that his wife and stepfather were having improper relations. Williams told the jury that he

killed Vest because he believed he was breaking up his home.

Also testifying were Glenn Foster of San Angelo, who was a character witness, and Mrs. J. W. Vest, wife of the slain man, who declared that she and Mr. Vest were separated.

Cliff Tupper, Don Holdridge, and W. C. McDonald, defense attorneys, introduced a motion yesterday morning for an instructed verdict of "not guilty" but it was denied by Judge Sutton.

The case was given to the jury late yesterday, following the reading of charges by Judge Sutton and final pleas by the defense attorneys and by District Attorney Ralph Logan.

As the Enterprise goes to press, the jury had not reached a decision.

A special venire of 75 men were called to form the jury, and 56 of these were examined before the final 12 were selected. Jurymen chosen included Oran Fletcher, Jet Hood, T. W. Casey, Ed Hickman, and Lowell Roane of Robert Lee; J. W. Brown of Tennyson; and J. B. Mackey, H. A. Springer, J. L. Brunson, Finnell Smith, C. R. Smith, and V. H. Brock of Bronte.

WEST-KNIERIM SUIT SETTLED OUT OF COURT

The case of D. M. West et ux vs. W. Robert Knierim et al, which was scheduled to be heard before the 51st District Court last Monday, October 14th, with Judge John F. Sutton presiding, was settled out of court on agreement between attorneys of the parties involved, and upon motion of the plaintiff (West), the case against the City of Bronte was dismissed without prejudice.

Terms of the agreement, filed with County Clerk Willis Smith, revealed that the Home Motor Company, on or before February 1, 1947, will permanently cease putting water or other material into the 18-inch pipe running in front of its premises, and will cease running any water or other material into the 4-inch pipe running on to the vacant lots east of the West Apartments. The company also agreed, according to these terms, that as much of the 4-inch pipe as was on the lots, belonged to the plaintiff.

All other demands made by West "shall be and are settled by this agreement, and the plaintiff is barred from asserting any such demands hereafter."

It was determined that court costs would be divided equally between West and the Home Motor Company, and that the case shall remain on the docket until the company has ceased running water or other materials into both of the said pipes.

The agreement was signed by D. M. West, Minnie B. West, Robert Knierim, R. W. Rees, and J. Robert Knierim.

Also settled by this agreement was the first amended original petition, No. 1642, filed in behalf of West by his attorney, Paul Petty of Ballinger. This petition alleged that West had delivered to Knierim a deed conveying him an undivided half interest in and to the wall standing upon the dividing line from the ground up to the second floor and no higher, on condition that 2nd story windows not be obstructed. West contended that Knierim had violated the conditions, thereby causing him to suffer damages in the amount of \$5,000. It was also alleged that the defendant (Knierim, not the city of Bronte) had also built a wall which extended several inches over on West's property, and West asked for another \$5,000 for this, thus making a total claim of \$10,000 on these two counts plus \$5,750 on the original petition, or a grand total of \$15,750 in damages.

Members of the petit jury, which had been summoned to hear the case in the event a jury was needed, were dismissed by Judge Sutton following the settlement of the case between the attorneys involved. Three members were excused, however, these including Allen Jameson, Victor Wojtek, and Bryan Yarbrough.

CITY COUNCIL HEARS REES AND KNIERIM

Members of the City Council of Bronte met last Friday, October 11, in a called meeting with the following members present: C. R. Smith, D. K. Glenn, C. E. Bruton, George Thomas, and Noah Pruitt.

It was learned that the meeting was called at the request of R. W. Rees and W. R. Knierim of the Home Motor Company, who discussed plans for the disposal of sewage and waste emanating from the company. It was suggested by the pair that they would dig a cess pool on the north side of the building within the limits of the sidewalk and off the street, to a depth of approximately 16 feet and a width of 5 feet, which would be walled in with tile or stone, and covered with a heavy layer of concrete.

It was also proposed that waste water be cared for by installing a drain pipe to the south of the Home

Motor Company. These proposals, later approved by Dr. J. D. Leonard, city health officer, were favorably received by the Council, it was reported.

It was later learned without confirmation that C. R. Smith proposed a clause requiring the Company to care for any eventual overflow or damage resulting therefrom, but his motion was not included in the final agreement, although D. S. Holdridge, city attorney, reportedly said later that such a clause should have been a part of the agreement in order that both parties be protected.

In other words, the city apparently granted an easement to the company, but secured no protection for itself in case of later mishaps.

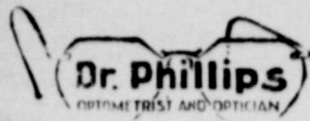

NELSON TALKS ON RECLAMATION FUTURE IN TEXAS

Wesley R. Nelson, regional director of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation at Amarillo, recently appeared before the second annual convention of the Texas Water Conservation Association at Austin, and talked on matters of vital interest to Bronte and Coke County.

L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the Colorado River Basin Authority, reported the following remarks made by Nelson at the meeting:

"The future of reclamation in Texas depends upon four basic factors: water, land, people and engineering works . . . and among projects now being studied are Robert Lee and San Angelo in the Colorado Basin."

"Foremost plans of the Bureau in the Colorado River basin include the construction of a dam at Buffalo Creek site, about six miles below Robert Lee, for irrigation of farm lands . . . and utilization of storage water. Submission of the report of this project to the Commissioner of Reclamation at Washington recently climaxed several years of survey and planning."

"As reported, the reservoir will have a capacity of 690,000 acre feet and will store water for irrigation of 58,000 acres of land, provide municipal water for Robert Lee, Ballinger, and Miles, offer recreational and fish propagation facilities, and allow for some flood control."

In other words, as Youngblood pointed out, the future for this area appears bright, indeed.
