United States Supreme Court De cides For Railro:d.

AGAINST TEXAS LAW Opinion Holds That Cattle shipping Enaetment Transends the Police Power of the state and Is Too Arbitrary.

Washington, April 3.-In an opinion by Justice Brown, the supreme court
of the United States Monday the case of the Houston and Texas Central Railroad company vs, J. A. Mayes in favor of the company case involved a claim made by Maye count of fallure of the road to prompt y supply cars for the shipment of cattle, and brought into question the vallity of the Texas state law under Mayes in 1903 Iived in Llano county
Texas, and engaged sel Texas, and engaged seventeen cars fo
the transportation of 625 head of cat being that the cars were to be furnished April 20 of that year. The cattle
were driven into the stockyards o the morning of that day, but the car
for their shipment did not arrive until the afternoon of the next day. Mayes made a claim for damages on account
of welght and other injuries to his cat-
te tle to the extent of $\$ 3$ per head, or
$\$ 1,1,75$, and also in accordance with the
state law for $\$ 12$ a his contratet with the railroad compa-
ny. The case was begun in the dis trict court of Llano county, whisch
awarded him the full amount of the penalty and $\$ 500$ damages. The su preme court for the Third judicial diss

and the ralliroad brought the case tl a supreme cou,t on a writ of error

CONFEDERATE COLLDNX.

## THOMAS JONES.

The subject of this biographica ketch was born in -Tennessee, Nov, 3,1833 , and on the very day, June 8, 1861, that his state seceded and east her lot with the Confederate states, he was sworn into her service and became a member of Co.
A. 21 st Tenn. Regiment, which was organized and drilled at Union City Tenn., until the last of August, when the regiment was sent to Columbus, Ky., at which place they stayed in camp drilling until Nov. 7, 1861. On that morning they were to be tested, to see how well the drilling hadseasoned them. Hastily cooking ten days rations and drawing 60 rounds of ammunition, they were double quicked to the Mississippi river, there boarded a boat waiting for them, they crossed the river to the Missouri side and joined the commands of Genls. Polk and Pillow at Belmont, which place Genl. Grant which lasted for sometime, we finally drove the Yankees to their boats, billing many of them while they were going aboard. In this battle the S. loss was 641, the Yankees lost ver 1200 yet they had the assurance to claim a victory. One of the sig. ificent results of this battle was that up to this fight, Grant had superciliously refused to recognize Gen. Polk as one with whom he could exchange prisoners, yet after it he sent a llag of truce to get such privileges. The man destined to have the credit of ending the war, evinced even that early that he did After this battle the 21st Thipped. into winter quarters until Feby, went The army thep fell back to Corinth The army thed fell back to Corinth, Miss., but the 21st Tenn., was stop-
ped at Union City to forage and gather supplies, where it remained until April 1st. When the Yanks gave it an April fool and run it out Miss., the army was reorganized and the 21st Tenn. and a part of an Arkansas Regiment were consolidaed and called the 5th Confederate Regiment and went by that name to regiment an the consolidation campaigning became quite" active. First the Kentucky campaign, when we went close to Louisville then turned back and fought the battle of Perrysville, one of the bloodiest of the war, then through Cumberland Gap to Knoxville, then to Murfreesboro where we fought the severe battle of two days, Dec. 31, 1862 and Jany. 1, 1863 then to Tulahama, Tenn., then to
EIk River, then to Chattanooga, Elk River, then to Chattanooga,
then Sept. 19th and 20th the battle of Chickamauga, in which battle the enemy was driven back to Chattanooga, then the Missionary Ridge fight, then the Ringgold and Taylor's Kidge fight. Then the last of A pril 1864 the Georgia campaign comwanced, during which this subject Cas captured July 22,1864 , sent to kept until the close of the war, and was released May 1865. In all the campaigns and battles in which the 21 st. Tean., and the 5th Confederate
Regiments were engaged the subject of this sketch participated up to the time of bns capture except the battle of Chickamauga, and then he was sick in the hospital.
