WEEKLY SURPLUS WAA NEWS

The first—and probably last—sale of its kind, is War Assets Administration offering of 400 typewriters exclusively to certified veterans starting Monday, Dec. 2, at the WAA warehouse, 123 E. Exchange, Fort Worth. All machines are standard makes and widths of carriages will be offered on a "first come—first served" basis. The line will form early Dec. 2, with doors opening at 9:00 a. m. Each veteran will be allowed to buy one typewriter for his own personal use. The sale will last three days—but the supply will go fast, according to Harold S. Gish, chief of the Veterans Division of WAA, who states applications for typewriters have flooded the Fort Worth WAA for the past few days.

Uncle Sam is fixing to tuck another large amount of jeeps, sedans, pickups and carryalls in the Christmas stockings of numerous West Texas veterans. WAA will conduct a sale of vehicles at Sheppard Field, Wichita Falls, Friday, Dec. 6th. Only certified veterans are eligible to purchase. Inspection at several locations in West Texas where the vehicles are located can be made daily, except Saturday and Sunday, from Nov. 29, through Dec. 5th. A portion of the vehicles are offered at fixed prices—the remainder to go to the highest bidder.

A military device for scrambling enemy radio messages will soon make an appearance on farmer's hen-houses. The device is the Ferracourt clock, a key-wound mechanism operating electrical contacts. A wholesaler recently bought up these surplus clocks from WAA, and they will be sold to farmers for use in chicken houses. The clock will turn on the lights several hours before dawn and keep lights burning long after the sun goes down. The object being to keep winter egg production on a par with that of summer. Thus, an invention the army used to scramble communications will help provide eggs for Americans to scramble.

Four million dollars worth of canvas goods go on sale starting Dec. 2 through Dec. 20, WAA announced. Thousands of farmers will find the solution to their storage problem caused by shortages of protective covering for their stocks of grain and feed. Fort Worth WAA still has \$511,174 worth of pyramidal tents, tent shelter halves, and tent flies to be sold in lot quantities to priority groups and commercial trade channels. REVIEW OF TEXAS BUSINESS

AUSTIN, Nov. 29.—Both employment and pay rolls in Texas edged upward in October over September to hit their 1946 peaks according to data compiled by the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. The gains for the month were 1.4 per cent for employment and 0.9 per cent for pay rolls.

Compared with October 1945 employment last month was up 6 per cent and pay rolls 21 per cent.

The Bureau's index of Texas employment in October stood 152 per cent above the average prewar month, while pay rolls were up 105 per cent—more than twice their 1935-39 level.

Air express shipments from Texas airports picked up 21 per cent in October over September. Compared with October, 1945, Texas shipments by air last month were up 65 per cent.

The October rise in air express shipments was general throughout the state, 16 of the 22 cities covered in the reports showing increases. The largest percentage advance for the month was the 65 per cent jump in shipments from the Midland Airport.

The first five cities in Texas for air express shipments in October were: Dallas 9,220 shipments, Houston 3,810 shipments, Brownsville 2,902 shipments, Fort Worth 2,547 shipments, and San Antonio 2,027 shipments.

Postal receipts in 57 Texas cities in October increased 20 per cent over September. While October normally shows an increase over September, this year's rise was unusually good, being exceeded only twice in the last ten years. A year ago, October receipts increased 22 per cent over September, and in 1944 between the same months the increase was 20 per cent.

The rise over last month was statewide, with only 3 cities out of the 57 showing a decrease. The largest increase was in Brownsville, with 96 per cent.

In comparison with a year ago, October receipts were up 1 per cent.

Production of lumber in southern pine mills increased 3 per cent, while shipments dropped 1 per cent from September to October 1946.

Actual production during October for all reporting mills averaged 191,564 board feet of lumber per unit. Average shipments per mill were somewhat less, 193,497 board feet, which permitted a reduction in the volume of unfilled orders held over at the end of September.

Lumber production as measured by the Bureau's index is now about two-thirds of the prewar output and is running about 7 per cent above last year.

Texas department and apparel store sales rose 3 per cent in October over September. This gain was only one-fourth of the increase in sales that usually occurs between these two months.

Notable sales gains were recorded, however, over last year's figures. This past month sales in department and

LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION MEETS

The Coke County Livestock Association met recently to discuss plans for the coming show year. The meeting was called to order by Wilson Bryan, president, and the following committee members were present: Charlie Copeland of Blackwell, James Arrott and W. D. Latham of Tennyson; Horton Devoll of Sanco; Tom Schooler, Bryan Gartman, Delmir Sheppard, Bud Jones, and Wilson Bryan of Robert Lee; and R. T. Caperton, J. T. Henry, Edward Cumbie, and Louis Bridges of Bronte.

Committees discussed various aspects of the show and exhibits, and came to the following conclusions: Tommy Stewart of Roby was selected to judge the cattle, sheep, and hog divisions of the show; Bob Mims of Water Valley was named to judge the quarter horses; and Col. Dornblaser of the Remount Station at San Angelo was selected to judge the thoroughbreds.

The secretary reported that the final figures on the show sale and fund drive totaled approximately \$1,300. An inventory of the assets revealed that the association now has a permanent show grounds including two city blocks; complete rodeo pens and show barn 114x25, and that this represents an outlay of about \$4,200.

These fixtures have been acquired through hard work and co-operation of the people of Coke County, and every citizen may be justly proud to have had a part in establishing a show ground and county program second to none in West Texas.

The Girls' 4-H Club and Ladies' work will also have exhibits at the show this year, it was disclosed.

Notice is hereby given, to whom
 concerned, that the UPPER COLORADO
 RIVER AUTHORITY, the postoffice address
 of which is Robert Lee, Texas, did on the
 2nd day of November, A. D. 1946, file its
 application in the office of the Board of
 Water Engineers for the State of Texas,
 in which it applies for a permit to ap-
 propriate of the unappropriated waters
 of the State of Texas, from the Colorado
 River, in Coke County, Texas, not to
 exceed Six hundred Seventy thousand
 (670,000) acre-feet of water per annum
 for the irrigation of not to exceed Fifty-
 eight thousand (58,000) acres of land,
 and also for municipal and industrial
 purposes, said water to be impounded
 in a reservoir created by the construction
 of a dam, the storage capacity of the
 reservoir to be 670,000 acre-feet, and to
 impound in said reservoir and to divert
 therefrom not to exceed 670,000 acre-
 feet of water per annum for the purposes
 herein stated. Said 58,000 acres being
 parts of approximately 170,000 acres
 located in Southwestern part of Coke
 County, Southwestern part of Bunnels
 County, Northwestern part of Concho
 County, and Northwestern part of Tom
 Green County, as shown by maps on file
 with the Board of Water Engineers in
 their office in Austin, Texas.

A hearing on the application of the
 said Upper Colorado River Authority
 will be held by the Board of Water En-
 gineers for the State of Texas, in the
 office of the Board at Austin, Texas, on
 Monday, December 16th, A. D. 1946,
 beginning at ten o'clock A. M. at which
 time and place all parties interested may
 appear and be heard. Such hearing will
 be continued from time to time, and from
 place to place, if necessary, until such
 determination has been made relative
 to said application as the said Board
 of Water Engineers may deem right,

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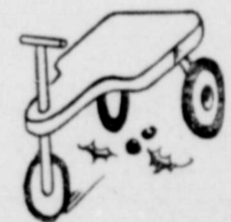

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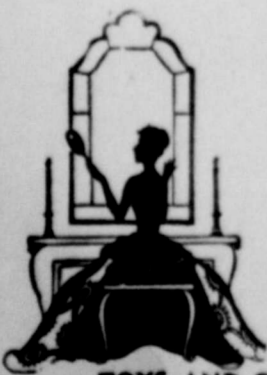
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HERE'S BLACKWELL . . .

"The Federation is a good thing," Arrott said yesterday, "for it is beneficial to the county and helps the farmer when he needs it."



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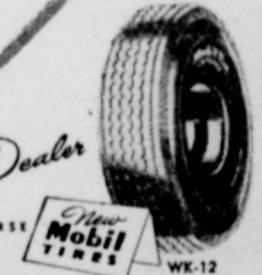
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
