Melva Dean Gartman's dry lot Hereford calf won the grand championship of the 9th Annual Coke County Junior Livestock Show held last Tuesday, as the Robert Lee 4-H Clubber sold the 960-pound animal

to Marvin Simpson for 38c a pound. Joe Russell Ash of the Bronte FFA boys won the reserve championship with his wet lot Hereford calf, 876.

J. B. Arrott of Tennyson and the Bronte FFA showed the grand champion lamb, 120, and the reserve champion was shown by Le Drew Arrott, Bronte FFA, 165.

Wayne Arrott of the Bronte FFA made a clean sweep in the hog division, showing the grand champion, reserve champion, and champion penof-three. The grand champion was a 232-pound Duroc-Jersey, and the re-serve was a 165-pounder. The grand champion sold to Sears for 32 cents LATEST OIL and the reserve to E. C. Carper for




