SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION

Robert Lee - The largest number of ballots ever cast in a school board election in Robert Lee saw 194 persons go to the polls to effect a complete turn-over among the nine candidates, three of whom were seeking reelection in a race to elect three per-

The top three who were elected included Frank McCabe, 130; Wilson Bryan, 99; and Mrs. Marvin Simpson, 97. The election of Mrs. Simpson marked the first time in Robert Lee history that a woman was elected to the school board, it was reported.

Other votes included these: Fred McDonald, Jr., 76; T. M. Wylie, 65; Mrs. McNeil Wylie, 44; T. W. Casey, 25; Roy Ross, 24; and Genie Baker, 14, the latter three being incumbents. Melvin Childress received two MAYOR





NEW WATER WELL

Bronte now has another new water well, which, as of last Wednesday, was flowing at the rate of 1,700 gallons per hour, according to Mayor H. O. Whitt.

It is located some 40-50 feet north of the main well, near the river, and is 7-feet square, with a total depth of about 25 feet. It is expected that this well will be drilled to about 30 feet, with a large basin, and that jetting will be used to increase the flow of

Jetting, as outlined by T. H. Rogge, causes a flow of water into the crevices, from which more openings are made, thus enabling a supply of additional water.

The new well supplies a real need in Bronte, where for the past several weeks the regular flow of the water wells has had to be aided by pumping water from the river.

Both the new well and the old well will be connected by means of the jets, it is hoped, thus eliminating extra pumping expense.
