LATEST OIL NEWS

No. 1 Reed - Ending yesterday is continuing through a 24-64 inch tubing choke with perforations at 6,180-98 in 51/2-inch tubing that is cemented at 6,212 on the bottom. The rig has now been removed and testing continues today, with gauging J. W. Raney of Blackwell, Odessa planned, and completion scheduled Muston, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. in its present condition.

The well is located in the C NE SW 1-HE&WT survey, 51/2 miles west and north of Tennyson and 8 miles southwest of Bronte. From available figures, the percentage of oil flow was gradually increasing. Flowing the 18th. pressures were 350 pounds on the tubing and 850 on the casing, and the flowing was 38 per cent oil in the last eight hours of the 24, while in 15 hours flow ending Wednesday evening there was 25 per cent oil out of 16 barrels of fluid hourly.

As reported previously, stakes for No. 2 Reed will be set, probably this weekend as a southwest offset to No. I Reed. The first strike in the Ellenburger will presumably be followed by a number of other tests in southeastern Coke County, it was reported.

No. 1 Wendland - Recovered 60 feet of clean oil and 130 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud in a 3hour test in the Ellenburger, its second test. No water was shown on the test, which was from 6,235-50 feet, with bottomhole shutin pressure of 1,650 pounds after 15 minutes. This well entered the Ellenburger at 6,230 feet, which is 4,350 below sea level, or 82 feet lower than in the Reed well. However, observers predicted there were two separate structures involved. It is located 4,950 from the south, 2,970 feet from the east line of the Jose Gutierrez survey 22. Twenty feet deep in the Ellenburger, the well was waiting for 5½-inch casing which will Mrs. M. L. 



In the future, business houses will not be making lists of persons who want to buy cars, refrigerators and similar articles – they will be making period lost money because they didn't similar articles - they will be making lists of people who MIGHT buy if properly persuaded.

Advertising, properly used, can make things easier for the salesman. I. DECIDE WHAT YOU WANT TO ACCOMPLISH WITH YOUR AD-VERTISING.

A. Do you want to build your name in the public mind as Tiffanys have done with jewelry?

1. Make your continuing advertisements carry a good slogan or convey the impression in another manner that "The Best Means Johnson's."

2. Be sure you actually have the cleanest grill, the best clothing, or the lowest prices - whatever you decide to feature. Check on your competitors.

B. Do you want to move specific items of merchandise?

1. Pick good leaders, items that

are in demand. 2. Display the advertised goods in your windows, inside the store and at the cashier's counter. Teach your employees how to push them and to capitalize on the preliminary selling job done by your ads and displays.

II. GET THE BEST ADVICE ON

A. Your local newspaper is usually the best source of advice on this important subject. Discuss your plans with them.

1. They can tell you if your plan has a chance, and they can help you estimate the costs exactly. 2. They can help you in preparing ads, will furnish illustrations, help you polish up copy and show you what merchants in other towns are doing by using

their out-of-town newspaper.files B. Investigate all methods of advertising, but don't go overboard for high pressure schemes. When in doubt, don't do business with the fly-by-night promoter. Not all of the following are good for every kind of business, but all have sor good points for certain specialized

1. Neon, flashing and store front

2. Billboards, both on highways and in the city.

3. Radio (Effective principally for the building of name recognition; too costly for a business that does not attempt to serve a wide area with a generally used product.)

4. Window displays 5. Direct mailings. (How many circulars do you throw away daily?)

6. Movie trailers. (Resented by some patrons who don't like to buy entertainment with ads forced upon them. Do you enjoy

7. Telephone calls. (Inexpensive and very effective for many of the service-group of businesses. It is easy to build antagonism if this is not very carefully done. It requires a pleasant voice.)

8. Telephone directories. (If most of your business originates from

More than 20 per cent of those filing social security claims in the San file soon enough, George Clark, manager of the social security office in San Angelo, said today.

The amount lost and the number of claimants involved in the losses were not large. But when one out of every five claimants who do file claims are losing benefits, it indicates that some are not filing their claims at all. Yet, many who do not file prompt claims are either depending on relatives or using up slender resources before they file their claims.

Austin, Texas, May 21. - You may be standing on or near the potentials of an industry worth thousands of

dollars. Texas is full of large natural deposits of ceramic raw material awaiting development, says F. K. Pence, University of Texas Ceramie Engi-

neering department chairman. His information is based on geological data which show that the strata of various ages containing the valuable deposits are exposed in fairly regular bands extending across the state from southwest to northeast.

A band 20 to 40 miles wide from the Rio Grande Valley to Newton County contains a weathered volcanic ash known as bentonite which has the unique property of firing to a very white color.

It is currently being shipped throughout the world, but Texas is making relatively little use of it, Pence

Also in sections of East Central Texas are sizeable deposits of a volcanic ash which makes an excellent and cheaper flux for sewer pipe, chemical stoneware and related pottery

products. The Wilcox strata, extending from South of San Antonio to Texarkana, contain a variety of clay materials with infinite possibilities, he said.

Other valuable deposits and their locations include: glass-sand in marine Cretaceous formations in Central Texas areas: red shales, North Central; pegmatites for production feldspar, tale and soapstone, Llano uplift in covered by the Social Security Act, Mason, Llano and Burnet counties; and kaolin deposits in Southeastern Jeff Davis County.
