He attended the Meridian Junior College, and later received his B. A. degreee from Southwestern University at Georgetown, then attended S. M. U. for a year and a half.



Sheppard Speaks To Lions Club

A. V. Sheppard of Robert Lee, who s connected with the Soil Conservamembers last Wednesday about various aspects of soil conservation prob-

Sheppard, and T. A. Revell of Sterling City, who holds a similar post with the North Concho set-up, noted that they were representatives of the Federal Government, whose services were available on request of any group of farmers.

"We have found that our work with local groups is the most effective,' Sheppard noted, "and that the soil deficiency here is in organic content."

"The lack of grass causes a big runoff of rain water, and when the land is grazed for several years, there are no roots to hold back the water," Sheppard asserted, declaring that soil and water conservation was necessary to build a happy and prosperous community.

Rev. Alvin R. Mauldin noted that a prosperous church depended on prosperous land conditions, thus endorsing the program of the Soil Conservation organization.
