Cargill files suit against tax district

Lawyers for Cargill last week filed suit in district court here against the tax appraisal district, disputing almost \$17 million of the company's \$52 million appraisal. Chief appraiser for the Castro County Appraisal District Jerry Heller said he really wasn't surprised by the move. And the consequences will probably be immediate.

DISD will take biggest hit "They will pay all their taxes, but

the contested amount, about \$462,000 of that, will go into an escrow account pending resolution of the suit," he said. "Then, depending on how the court rules, the money will be dispensed."

The DISD, hospital district, city, county and water district will all be

affected. The school will be hardest hit, to the tune of \$253,000. The hospital district will lose about \$69,000. The City of Dimmitt will lose about \$40,000 through the loss of taxes, coupled with \$150,000 in lost water rates for the months that the plant will be idled, starting Sept. 20. And the

county will be hit for \$110,000.

The suit will be heard locally in district court, but Heller said he can't predict when it will be heard or how long it could drag on, depending on appeals.

"I've heard of some that drag on for years," he said. "I'm assuming some get settled quickly."

David Bone, Cargill plant manager, had not heard about the suit when contacted by The Castro County News.

"There's no one at the plant who's remotely involved," Bone said. "It's just the next step in trying to come to the conclusion of what a fair value is."

The school district will be hit with a double whammy, superintendent Les Miller said, because

Commissioners cut jobs, raises

County scrambles in wake of Cargill suit

County commissioners are not through with the budget process for the coming year despite the looming Oct. 1 deadline. Although commissioners have been working on the county's budget since May, Cargill's lawsuit, filed Sept. 7 against the appraisal district threw a wrench into all their work. The price tag on that wrench person from the Treasurers approximately \$110,000 in lost tax revenues for the

coming year. Throughout the hearings on Monday, members of the court told the audience that not only are cuts needed this year, more stringent cuts will be required next year if the economy stays the same.

"There are no good decisions," said County Judge Bill Sava. "I think it's good we cut back on the budget, because it makes the point that we're going to have to continue to make hard

decisions. Money isn't going to get any better and, depending on the outcome of the lawsuit, it could get worse."

Late last week commis-

sioners worked for two days

looking for ways to cut the

budget in answer to the shortfall. They came up with a number of decisions when they decided to:

* Eliminate a part-time office.

* Cut the hours on a parttime secretary in the County/ District Attorney's office; * Cut back JP Tana

Young's clerk from fulltime to part-time. * Reduce the number of

jailers from 10 to seven.

Not only would those moves save money from salaries, it would save the county \$6,850 annually per person that the county pays for health insurance.

Azteca awarded \$3.7 in federal grant/loan



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The most recent advancement used to reduce glare has been the antireflective coating. This lens coating is usually applied to your spectacle lenses in a dust-free vacuum chamber. It's very effective for the majority of patients, from outdoors men to rush-hour drivers. Another solution may be polarized lenses. With polarized lenses a microscopic "screen" within the lens acts to filter out and diffuse glare entering the eye. It's especially helpful for those who are bothered by glare around the water.

This problem is only made worse by dirty lenses and an appropriate prescription. If you truly hope to avoid glare, be certain to clean your lenses regularly and keep your prescription up-to-date.





Sava said the jail decision was reached because as long as the population on each floor of the jail does not exceed nine inmates, only one jailer is needed.

Also in the proposed budget that was voted on Monday night were \$100 per month raises, that had been approved earlier in the year, for full-time employees.

On Monday morning, during the commissioners regular meeting, they heard from the department heads affected by the cuts.

They decided to make several changes to the budget before Monday night's vote.

Commissioners made these changes:

* Left Young with a fulltime clerk. * Left the treasurer's part-

time secretary in place.

* Left the hours for the part-time secretary in the County/District Attorney's office as they were. However, that secretary did agree to waive her insurance, since she is already covered by her husband's policy.

After almost two hours of public input at the specially called meeting on Monday night, the commissioners voted that budget the year hasn't been finaldown 3-2, with Sava and ized, he has already talked to

Commissioners Dan Schmucker and Larry Gonzales casting the "No" votes.

All three said they had a hard time giving raises, although there have been none in three years for county employees, and at the same time eliminating

"I don't disagree with cutting jobs and cutting the budget," Gonzales said. "But I'm not sure about giving raises at the same time."

Schmucker echoed those sentiments. "My conscience wouldn't let me vote for that budget," he said.

The commissioners then spent the next hour coming to a consensus and deciding, without taking a vote, what would or would not be left in the budget, which must be passed by Oct. 1, 2004, according to state law.

In the end, the proposed budget, which will be voted on at a specially called meeting at 10 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 25, will still have the three jailer jobs cut.

However, instead of \$100 per person per month raises, the budget now gives each The budget voted on did full-time employee a \$50 a month raise.

If commissioners pass this budget with the three jailer positions eliminated, the jailers' last day of work will be Sept. 30.

Sheriff CD Fitzgearld said that, although the budget for the three employees who last three that were hired.

"They're not happy. I'm not happy, but that's the only way I can do it without being partial to any individual," Fitzgearld said. "Like I told the commissioners, we will do the best we can with what we've got."

Sava said he believes this budget will be approved, but it won't be unanimous.

"I consider it wrong to cut jobs and give raises," Sava

During discussions Monday night, Sava lobbied to retain one of the jailer positions, but that argument didn't make it into the proposed budget.

During Monday night's hearing, Sava and several commissioners warned employees that the cuts that were reinstated in this budget could be in next year's budget.

Sava also said the county will probably reconsider its insurance program. It couldn't be done this year because contracts had already been signed.

However, he said that one alternative next year may be to lessen coverage or increase co-pay for the countypaid insurance.

Right now, employees get the best coverage offered in this type policy by Blue Cross/Blue Shield, he said.

It was "standing room will be affected. They are the only" at the public hearing Monday night, with employees from all the offices potentially affected in attendance.

A number of jail employees spoke to commissioners, claiming that the reduction would cause unsafe conditions in the jail. Other employees said they would have trouble accepting a raise knowing that jobs had been lost.

Although commissioners listened sympathetically to those who asked that all jobs be kept, several pointed out that they also have a duty to the taxpayers of Castro County, none of whom want to see increased taxes.

"Some counties have had to file bankruptcy, while others can't get credit because they can't pay their bills," Gonzales said. "We can't let that happen here. We have to serve the best interests of the taxpayers of Castro County.

"We're the stewards of taxpayers' money. We're going to have to cut if we're going to survive."

Jailer Rosa Sanchez said



that, as a single mother of four, her situation will be desperate.

"It's hard to realize that in two weeks I won't have a job," she said.

"It just doesn't seem fair. I'm happy for the people getting raises, but in two weeks, I have to go home and tell my kids I don't have a job."

Dispatcher Erin Barnes said the loss of jailers could be dangerous. "By taking their backup, that increases the chance of them getting hurt," she said. "I would gladly give up my raise in order for them to keep their jobs."

However, Sava said, next year could be worse.

"It will take a small miracle to save us from more austere cuts next year," he said. "I think that the whole set of circumstances is sad. And no decision is going to be completely right.

"If we cut raises for county employees, please understand that we probably won't get them next year. When there is not enough money, you're looking at hard options."

Sava said he was pleased that employees attended the hearing and voiced their concerns.





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

money it gives the district almost proportionately to the amount the district will lose from the Cargill taxes.

He said the DISD trustees anticipated that this might happen and there is enough in reserve to cover it.

"We don't ever plan on going into reserve unless we have to and we'll make whatever cuts we can," he said. "This has been talked about for a while so, in planning ahead, we were planning for some of this. Until we get the exact numbers we don't know how it's going to impact us.

It's not only an impact on local, but it's also on state aid. The way the state funds us, they have our value set and say we should collect taxes at that value. When we don't collect taxes at the value it hurts us because the state pays us proportionately, so it will be almost twice a big of a loss for us."

One bright spot for all the taxing entities is the pending sale of GOMAX, according to Heller.

The deal hasn't closed yet, according to an attorney who is representing the purchasing interests.

Heller said he doesn't yet know who is buying the property, but the first thing that must be paid after such a sale is the back taxes of \$202,000, not counting interest that has been accruing since 1997. About half of that money will go to the DISD and the rest will go to the other taxing entities.

"We're hopeful the taxes will be paid in the next week or two," Heller said.

Miller said that money will help compensate for the lost taxes this year if the sale goes through. But should that \$253,000 be lost permanently, it means the board will have to take another look at spending.

"We've cut and streamlined everywhere we can," Miller said. "The next thing we can do is start cutting programs.

"We think that the appraisal district has done a good job on their appraisals in the past. But that's a half million dollars we're talking about. Anytime you take a hit for a half million dollars, something's going to have to be given up. We'll start looking at streamlining even more than in the past."

"In the past we've reduced staff everywhere we can without cutting programs. Cutting programs may be the next step.'

The hospital district raised taxes this year and that will lessen the impact of the \$69,000 loss, said CCHD CEO Linda Rasor.

"Our increase in taxes will offset what we lose," she said. "But we were going to use the money from the tax increase for capital improvements, like a new roof and a new ambulance. We'll have to use it to make up the loss and that will slow the progress of our capital improvements program."

The city is in the midst of budgeting for the coming

Mayor Wayne Collins said he doesn't expect the Cargill case to be decided this year, so the city is adjusting.

"We're going to leave the tax rate the same for the city," he said. "We'll probably look at our capital expenditures and see which of those can be deferred. We're in pretty good condi-

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tion on capital improvements and we'll look and see if some of those can be deferred.

Least affected, he said, will be the water district, but every entity will be hurt.

"This will impact the ability of local governments to fund their operations," Collins said.

However, he said he doesn't believe the recent decision to idle the plant, at least for some months, was related to the decision to challenge the tax assessment, although this year's assessment changed very little from previous years' assessments, which weren't challenged.

"I don't think they filed suit because they're planning on shutting Cargill down," Collins said. "The company just purchased an additional quarter section of land near their waste water treatment facility northeast of Dimmitt about three miles, so I don't think they're planning on shutting down their Dimmitt plant."

The San Antonio firm that filed the suit on behalf of Cargill did not return a call from The Castro County





Abernathy's speed was also a factor.


"They had tremendous speed and that hurt us more than anything," he said. "All their skill people had tremendous speed. We knew that going in and we let it get away from us."





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
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Morton tops Nazareth


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
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

The setting for the game, Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo, might have had something to do with his team's performance, he said.


"I don't now if it was the atmosphere, playing in a big stadium, the kids might have been overwhelmed."

Cindy Sides Ebling, Class of 1977, from Plainview, was helping with the cleanup crew.


