#### GRAIN LOANS DEPEND ON STORAGE

Although loans are available to support the farm price of wheat and grain sorghums, they cannot be made 1 unless the grain is stored properly.
9 Details of the loan program, together with specifications for proper storage, may be obtained at the County ACA Office located in the Agricultural Building, in Robert Lee, Texas.

Providing enough storage for a record crop of all grains has become a major problem for the Nation. Preliminary surveys indicate the Country is 800 million bushels short of enough storage space for the 1948 crop. Officials point out that every bit of the large crop is needed and none should be allowed to spoil through improper
