Reed No. 3 Is Abandoned After Test; Millican Well Comes In

Southern Minerals and Seaboard No. 3 M. G. Reed has been plugged and abandoned following a drillstem test which recovered only forty feet of drilling mud. It is southwest of Bronte and is an offset to No. 1 Reed, Ellenburger discovery.

Humble moved two engines, a mud pump and an extra storage tank to the No. 1 R. E. Hickman, 1 1/2 miles west of Bronte. This activity took place

Thursday, preparatory to drilling of the well.

American Republic No. 1 Jess Percifull was waiting for the arrival of a rig to begin drilling the other offset to the Rawlings well, west of Bronte.

Western Coke county oil news feature yesterday was the coming in of Sun No. 1 P. W. Millican, which is located 12 miles west of Robert Lee and seven miles from the most southerly well of the Jameson field. It cored at 5,954-5,959 feet in what was presumed to be the Strawn crinoid reef. On a one-hour drillstem test it recovered 650 feet of clean oil and 210 feet of mud-cut oil, 80 per cent oil. Flowing pressure was 300 pounds and shut in hole pressure was 2,550 pounds. Drillers are now awaiting orders.

C. W. Sharp No. 1 B. D. Gartman, west offset to Allen Guiberson No. 1 Jack Lassiter perforated at 6,832-80 feet, swabbed and recovered gas and formation water, which was thought to be coming from a faulty cement job at a lower depth. The Guiberson No. 2 Lassiter was expecting a clean-up machine to arrive yesterday to begin work on that offset to the No. 1 Lassiter.

Sun No. 1 Beatrice Anderson completed with a potential flowing capacity of 212 barrels of pipeline oil per day.

SILVER SOLDIER BURIED WEDNESDAY

The body of First Lieutenant Verdon T. Allen arrived in Bronte Wednesday morning and burial took place at Silver Wednesday afternoon. Lt. Allen, the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Allen of Silver, was killed in action on August 20, 1944 in a bombing raid over southern France.

The Robert Lee American Legion was in charge of the services which were held from the Church of Christ at Silver. Burial was with full military honors.

Lt. Allen was killed while serving with the 12th Air Force on Sardinia. He was a bombardier on a B-26 Marauder bomber participating in the invasion of southern France when his plane was shot down over Toulon and fell into the sea. He was on the return trip of his 39th mission.

He was the recipient of the Air Medal with 11 oak leaf clusters, the EAME theatre ribbon with battle star, and the Purple Heart. The latter and eight oak leaf clusters to the Air Medal were awarded posthumously. He also held a Presidential Unit Citation for meritorious achievement.

Prior to entering the service he was employed for several years with the Santa Fe railway at Winslow, Arizona. He attended school at Silver and San Angelo.

Survivors include the parents, six sisters, Mrs. Bob Odum of Silver, Mrs. Elmer Clegg of Carraumet, Massachusetts, Mrs. L. D. Evans of Winslow, Arizona, Mrs. Jerol Sanders of Houston, Mrs. Bill Archer of San Angelo, and Miss Esther Allen of Silver; and three brothers, R. Durward of Vancouver, Charlie of Winslow, Arizona, and Bill G. of Lubbock; and a grandmother, Mrs. S. W. Gaston of Tennyson.

Interment was in McKenzie cemetery, with Cliff Fucnal Home in charge of arrangements.

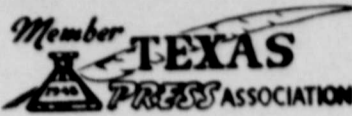

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon for Pvt. James Frances Lewallen at the Blackwell Methodist Church with Rev. E. N. Goode, pastor, officiating and Rev. C. F. Powell, pastor of the Lamar Baptist church in Sweetwater, assisting.

Pvt. Lewallen died May 28, 1942, at Camp O'Donald in the Jap Prison camp in the Phillipine Islands. He survived the death march of Bataan. He was serving with the military police in Manila. He enlisted in the army in 1940 and went overseas the same year.

Lewallen was born in Blackwell in 1920. He attended school at Blackwell. Survivors include two brothers, Marvin of Blackwell and G. K. of Hico, and one sister, Mrs. David Longoria of Austin.

Wells Funeral Home of Sweetwater was in charge of arrangements and interment was in the Blackwell cemetery where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Lewallen, are also buried.

FIRST METHODIST PASTOR RETURNS TO PREACH HERE SUNDAY

Rev. C. N. Morton, who was the first regular Methodist pastor in Bronte was guest speaker Sunday at the First Methodist church. Rev. Morton came to Bronte Dec. 1, 1907 and was pastor here for two years.

A cousin of S. A. Kiker, local pio-

near, the minister went from here to Glenrose and served as pastor of many central Texas churches until he retired twelve years ago. He is now 78 years old, and makes his home at Mexia.

While Rev. Morton was pastor of the local church, he preached two Sundays each month at Bronte, one Sunday at Fort Chadbourne, and one Sunday at Norton. He organized the churches at Norton and at Maverick.

The former Bronte pastor started in the ministry in 1901 in a small church on the Gulf coast. He served as an active Methodist pastor for 36 years. He stated that when he was pastor of the Bronte church that it

had only 165 members, and that most of them lived in the country. He said that Bronte was not much of a town in those days.

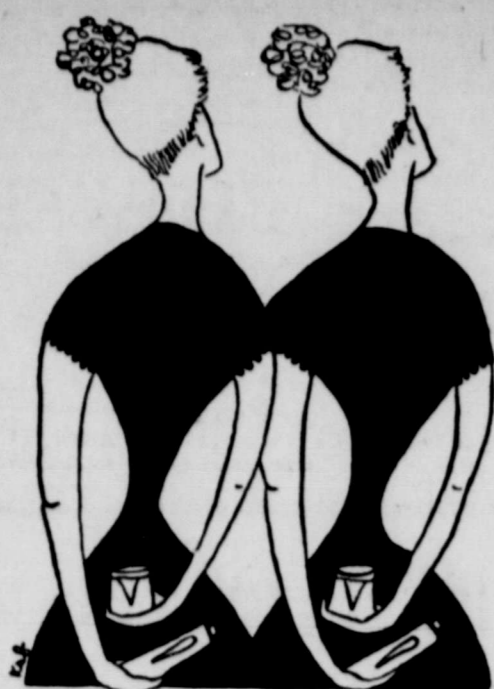

SALES TAX

YES OR NO?

(Editor's note: The article below was written in the interest of the people of Coke county and Texas, by L. T. Youngblood of Bronte. It not only contains his views but those of this newspaper, as well.)

Time to vote on the constitutional amendment to abolish the State ad valorem tax is near.

Many will vote for the abolition of the tax without any understanding of the full consequences.

First, it will take away from the public schools of Texas approximately four millions of dollars that is so much needed at the present time for the public schools of Texas.

We now have \$3,000 homestead exemption, which takes care of the average home owner, whether in city or country. Such owners do not now pay any State ad valorem tax.

Perhaps 60 per cent of the homes and average size farms are now free from State ad valorem tax.

A lion's share of State ad valorem tax now is paid by non-resident large property owners such as big oil and gas companies, sulphur companies, big insurance companies and the billions of dollars invested by non-resident owners along the coastal areas of Texas.

I believe big business, and especially the non-resident investors should contribute something to State schools and the administrative expense of the State, by virtue of whose sovereignty they enjoy the ownership of such investment in property.

Among those pushing the passage of the amendment are the birds representing foreign investors.

They do not come out in the open and tell the whole story. They do not tell you that as soon as the State ad valorem is abolished, then a cry will go up for a general sales tax, and it will come as sure as the sun rises.

Of course, the money to the schools and State from the ad valorem will be supplied shortly with sales tax that will affect all the people of Texas and especially the poor.

The matter of relieving the burden of industry and non-residents, is to place the burden squarely on the backs of the rank and file of the people of this state.

How would you like to pay sales tax on everything you buy? Even your groceries, gasoline, tires, clothing, and everything you buy from day to day.

Do you know that if we have a general sales tax everybody will pay plenty and pay as you go. Do you know that all merchants, small and great, all the cafes, filling stations and other places of business, will become tax collectors and many records will have to be kept that will knock your hat off, and, brother, let me tell you it will knock your hat off to pay.

Most of the States that have abolished the ad valorem tax have followed quickly with general sales tax. What do you think will happen in Texas? The answer is obvious.

Some of the public servants of West Texas, representing service groups, but fact playing politics, have been going about over Texas, holding meeting, trying to pull the wool over the eyes of local Chambers of Commerce, and other civic groups, getting resolutions passed in favor of the amendment, asking for donations for their support, and giving the people a double cross at the same time.

I quote Senator Dorsey B. Harde- man of San Angelo, who said, "RE-

The loss of revenue from State ad valorem levy will have to be replaced from some other source, to wit, out of the pockets of the RESIDENT citizens of the State of Texas."

I cannot vote for the proposed amendment at the polls in November. Yours for good government.

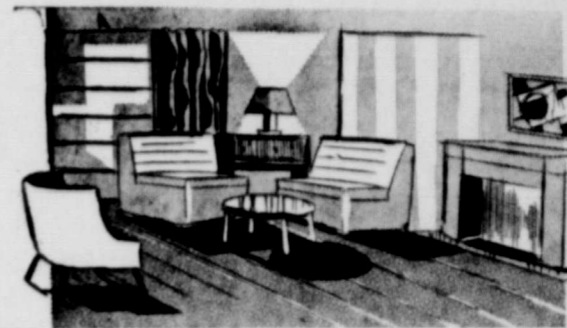



 the program.
