## Ample Roughage **Necessary For** Livestock Feed

Ample roughage is essential for the most economical feeding of livestock, even when grain and other feeds are Jan. 2: Mrs. Euvon Ford, Mrs. L. abundant, feeding authorities point

> roughage, properly supplemented with grain and protein concentrates, are most essential and economical because the roughage furnishes nutrients at low cost, provides bulk needand increases efficiency.

Cottonseed hulls, more plentiful as a result of the larger 1948 cotton crop are a widely-used, economical roughage. Experience and experiment station tests have proved that cottonseed hulls are equal in feeding value to Bermuda, Johnson grass and other average hays. In fattening rations for cattle, 100 pounds of cottonseed hulls replaced 250 pounds of sorghum silage or 200 pounds of corn silage.

Because they prevent scouring or bloating, cottonseed hulls are recommended for feeding with silage, and legume hay, and for livestock on young, tender pastures.

After swabbing the well flowed by heads and was connected with storage tanks at 6 p.m. Since its completion last summer it has been pumping approxi-mately 50 barrels of oil daily. No gauge since acidizing was available.

Latest announcements by Humble and Hickok & Reynolds indicated that an electric survey has been made on the two wells that came in Wednesday and that casing will be run within the next few days.

Over in the west part of the county drilling has been going on at a rapid pace. Listed below is a summary of the latest developments:

Sun No. 3 Central National Bank was drilling at 1,284 feet in shale; Sun No. 1 Bloodworth was coring at 6,105 feet in lime; Sun No. 1 Annie Cummings was preparing to acidize after swabbing and flowing 60 barrels of oil in an unreported time, with no water. Plans called for acidizing Thursday morning with 2,000 gallons.

Sun No. 14 Jameson was coring at 6,266 feet in lime and shale. Sun No. 12 Jameson was drilling at 6,168 feet in shale. Sun No. 4 Brannon was drilling at 5,682 feet in shale. Sun No. 10 Mathers was drilling at 5,333 feet in shale. Seaboard No. 1 Russell was drilling at 5,220 feet in lime. Plymouth No. 1 Millican was drilling at 6,100 feet in sand with no shows. It had not encountered the reef that was expected and was running low.

In the northeast part of the country Union No. 1 Jack Frost was drilling 2,725 feet in lime and shale.



#### **Grand Champions Repeat in West**


