MOTHER AND BABY DIE IN HIGHWAY CRASH NEAR HERE THURSDAY

Mrs. Clara Auten, 29, of San Angelo, and her baby daughter, Nancy Jean, 2 months old, were killed last Thursday evening in an automobile crash about five miles south of here on highway 277. The automobile, a 1948 Kaiser sedan, crashed into a concrete highway bridge on the highway near the old Juniper school. The automobile, totally wrecked, struck three guard posts of the bridge. Justice H. M. Robinson of Bronte assisted in the investigation.

Three other persons were also injured in the accident. Mrs. Norman Black of San Angelo suffered serious injuries including a fractured wrist and possible internal injuries. She underwent surgery in a San Angelo hospital following the wreck. Her son, Norman E. Black, 6, and Jack Auten, 2, son of the dead woman, underwent emergency treatment in a San Angelo hospital and were dismissed.

The group was enroute to their homes in San Angelo after visiting friends in Abilene for the day. The accident occurred about 6 p. m. They were taken to a San Angelo hospital in a Clift ambulance.

Dual funeral services for Mrs. Auten and the baby were held Monday morning from the Robert Massie Funeral Chapel.

Humble 1 Ash Comes in; No. 1 Sam Gray to Begin

Big news of the week in oil developments in the Bronte field was the bringing in of Humble's No. 1 Nannie Ash. The well was drilled to 4,449 feet where 5 1/2 inch casing was cemented. A test Saturday from 4,379 to 4,449 feet yielded salt water and the hole was plugged back and per-

forated at 4,340 to 4,370 feet. The well was swabbed a couple of days the first of the week and Wednesday night started flowing at the rate of 32 barrels per hour through a 3/4 inch choke. This rate of flow would amount to 768 barrels per day. Humble has staked their No. 2

Nannie Ash a quarter mile south of the No. 1 Ash. Hickok & Reynolds No. 2 E. C. Rawlings was drilling below 350 feet.

A wildcat, the J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray has been staked 2.4 miles north of Bronte. Location is 330 feet from the north and west lines of section 429, block I-A, H&TC Ry. survey. George Callahan has the drilling contract.

Thursday morning Placid No. 1 Forman, a new discovery in the Bronte area, was preparing to drill the plug for the second time. In an earlier test, No. 1 Forman recovered salt and sulphur water coming from above the pay formation, due to a faulty cement job. On a drillstem test the No. 1 Forman recovered 1,090 feet of pure green, high gravity oil. Test was from 4,975 to 4,994.

Barnsdall Oil Company, it was reported Thursday, has taken a seismograph shooting option on a large tract south and east of Bronte, under lease to George W. Strake of Houston.

Red Cross Drive Now Underway in County

The 1949 Red Cross drive is now underway in Coke County and workers have volunteered in all the communities in the county except Robert Lee. Only \$195.50 of the more than \$700 quota had been raised Wednesday afternoon, but workers were planning on a big weekend this coming Friday and Saturday and expect to get the drive over the top.

Of the amount that has been raised to date, \$174.50 has come from

Bronte and the remaining \$21 was raised by Mrs. Marguerite L. Sparks of Edith.

Other workers throughout the county were Mrs. John Allen, Sanco, Mrs. Odom, Silver, C. N. Webb, Tennyson, Mrs. Charlie Boecking, Fort Chadbourne. All persons in the county are urged by County Chairman H. A. Springer to contact the Red Cross worker in their respective communities and make a liberal contribution.

Chairman Springer pointed out that the Red Cross last year helped a large number of persons in this county, both financially and in other ways. Some \$300 was given to persons who lost their homes in a fire. Transients who needed aid were helped by the Red Cross and several old people were given assistance.

Red Cross workers urge that everyone in the county give liberally to this worthy drive and help put Coke county over the top.

The plaintiffs give notice that records of the County Clerk and County Tax Office will be placed in evidence at time of trial, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.

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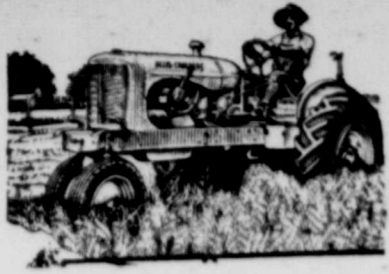

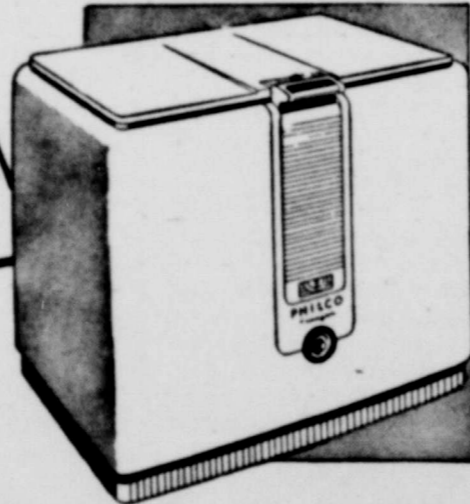

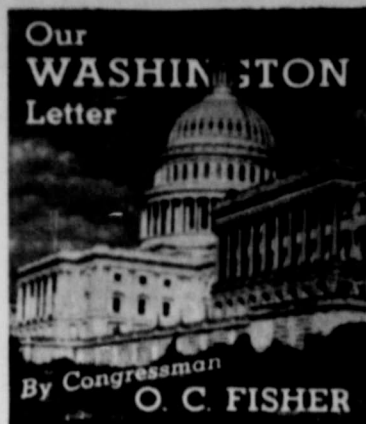

Electoral College Change

Rep. Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls, co-author of the Gossett-Lodge amendment to reform and modernize our electoral college system, has been getting some pats on the back recently. His amendment stands a good chance of being submitted this year despite some sniping from various partisans. For more than 15 years repeated efforts have been made to get the resolution passed but such reforms move very slowly and only after public opinion is brought to bear on the lawmakers.

A strange thing occurred last week when Senator Ferguson of Michigan expressed opposition because he was afraid it would harm Republican chances in general elections, and Rep. Wright Patman of Texas opposed it because he feared it would do the same to Democratic chances. Patman thinks it would enable the Communists to elect a President by mustering only 10 per cent of the votes. Most authorities, however, think Ferguson and Patman are both wrong.

The amendment would actually discourage small minority parties and would encourage a continuation of a strong two-party system. As it now is, the minority groups are much sought after by both major parties in pivotal states. Under our present antiquated system the party that leads in popular votes in a state gets ALL the electoral votes in that state and the opposing parties get none. Therefore, in order to get the lead, party leaders of both major parties kow-tow to the minority party groups in an effort to win them over.

The Gossett amendment would be the death-knell to that kind of politics and would play havoc with the abnormal power and prestige of those minorities. All agree it would lead to more statesmanship in party platforms and in presidential campaigns.

Under Gossett's plan, each candidate would get credit in electoral votes in each state in exact proportion to the number of popular votes cast for the respective presidential candidates. The Brookings Institute, an endowed research organization of the highest reputation, endorses the proposed amendment and says its adoption will be bad news for minority political pressure blocs.

Texans In Washington

Among Texans who have called on us in recent days was Willie B. Wilson of San Angelo. He was in Washington as a member of a nominating committee to choose the national officers of the American Red Cross.

Now he is president of the New Mexico Electric Service Corp., which serves a limited area around Hobbs.

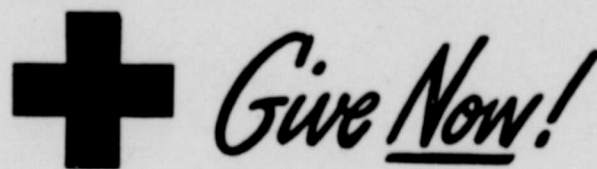
