City, School Elections Saturday and Monday

Bronte citizens will make two trips to the polls in the next few days to elect their city councilmen and to elect trustees to the Bronte school board. The city council election will be held next Tuesday, April 5, and the trustee election will be held tomorrow, Saturday, April 2.

Two names, Mack Powell and Cecil Kemp, will be on the trustee ballot, both men succeeding themselves on the school board. Voters will also cast ballots on two consolidation proposals — to consolidate the Brookshire school district with the Bronte school

district and a similar consolidation move with the Oak Creek school district. This election will be held in the city hall with Mrs. Frank Keeney and Mrs. C. C. Glenn as election judges.

In the city council election, also to be held at the city hall, candidates J. P. McGuire, Vernon C. Lammers, H. A. Springer and Sam W. Spruell will be on the ballot to fill the three vacancies on the council. Two vacancies were created by expiration of the terms of Cecil Kemp and W. W. Milliken, neither of whom sought reelection, and the other vacancy is a one-year unexpired term of D. K. Glenn, who resigned from the council after moving from the city limits.

Noah Pruitt will be election judge for this election next Tuesday with Mrs. R. W. Rees and Mrs. Otis Smith as assistants.

Bob Ragsdale offered a toast to the seniors and the response was given by Harold Ware. Tom V. Copeland gave a toast to the teachers, with Mr. A. G. Craver making the response.

A trio composed of Devota Little, Martha Weddle and Elizabeth Pritchard sang "Gold Mine in the Sky" which was followed with the class prophecy read by Devota Little, "The Best Things in Life Are Free", the class song, was rendered by the same trio. Theresa Story gave the class and the trio sang "After Graduation Day". Glo Caraway was the master of ceremonies.

Olaf South, superintendent of the Roscoe Schools, was the guest speaker and was introduced by Supt. O. Z. Porter of Blackwell. The program was closed with "School Days" sung by the entire group.

On the dinner menu were "prairie chicken, gold dust on the Sierras, sage brush, prairie hay, corn pone, gold leaf, rich strike and spring water".

WELCOME SIGNS ARE ERECTED ON HIGHWAYS

Three signs welcoming visitors to Bronte have been erected the last two days as a joint project of the Bronte Lions Club and American Legion. A fourth sign was painted but has not been erected as yet.

Those who assisted in erecting the signs were H. A. Springer, W. D. McAdams of Robert Lee, George Wrinkle, Mack Eubanks and Steve Badley.

The signs have the following lettering on them: "Welcome, You Are Entering Bronte, A Town of Good People." They have a Lions Club emblem on one side and an American Legion emblem on the other. K. Fisher of San Angelo painted the signs free of charge for the two organizations.

A sign has been erected on the Robert Lee highway, one on the Ballinger highway and one on the Sweetwater highway. It is expected that one will be put up on the San Angelo highway in the near future.

PLACID 1 FORMAN BLOWS IN; TEST OF CITY LOOKS BRIGHTER

Everyone interested in the oil development around Bronte was excited Thursday about the bringing in of the No. 1 Robert Forman. According to information which was made available Thursday morning the Placid Oil Co. well blew over the top and with a good strong north wind behind it threw oil across the highway, threatening to make contact with a burning flare next to the storage tanks for Humble's Nos. 1 and 2 Hickman wells.

The No. 1 Forman is located east of Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 O. R. McQueen and north of Humble No. 2 R. E. Hickman, in C SE SE 450-1-A-H&TC. On a drill-stem test several weeks ago it recovered

1,090 feet of green pipeline oil from 4,982-94 feet. The section is Pennsylvanian, largely quartzite, believed to be basal Canyon.

Drilling in the city limits of Bronte may become an actual thing in the next few weeks, according to some of the lease holders in the city. Two lessors have actually made propositions concerning the drilling of a test well in the city.

G-B Drilling Co. of San Angelo made an offer to fellow lessors and townspeople late last week. He said that he will put down a well to test here in Bronte if \$20,000 dry hole money and \$5,000 bottom hole money is made available. After some investigation it was found that J. K. Wadley

will drill a test well with only \$15,000 dry hole money.

After Wadley made this offer to test the city, G-B Drilling Co. withdrew its offer in favor of the less costly test. Wadley has a lease on property owned by L. T. Youngblood where the Bronte Tractor Co. is located, and G-B Drilling Co.'s lease is on a tract in the north part of town owned by Mack Eubanks.

The G-B Co. has a permit to drill on its lease, but to date no permit has been issued to drill on the Wadley lease.

In addition to the G-B Drilling Co.'s permit, four others have been issued the past week, bringing the total up to nine. Howard Hill and

Earl B. Persons of Grand Saline were issued permits for No. 1 Homer Vaughn and Edith Vaughn, located 75 feet south of the north line, 70 feet west of the east line, of block 13 in the center of lot 2, and for No. 1 E. M. Beaver, located 65 1/4 feet from the north and south lines and 198 feet from the east and west lines of the 1 1/4 acre tract in the 80 acres originally patented to W. W. McCutcheon.

S. E. (Skinny) Adams of Robert Lee and San Angelo was awarded a permit for No. 1 C. A. Eubanks, which will be located 138 feet from the north line, 120 feet from the west line of the 1.27 acre tract in the H&TC Railway survey 452.

Humble No. 1 Nannie Ash, two locations south of the field opener, pumped 130.16 barrels of oil plus 78.3 barrels of water in 24 hours ending Wednesday morning. Humble No. 2 Ash, a quarter mile south of No. 1, recovered drillpipe twisted off at 2,283 feet and was drilling ahead of 2,400 feet in lime.

L. G. Yarborough & Son and others No. 1 Addie Fletcher ran a drillstem test Tuesday at around 6,150 feet. Recovery was nothing but salt and sulphur water, some reports said. This well is being drilled "tight" and no accurate figures are available.

J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray, located 2 miles north of Bronte, was drilling ahead of 1,700 feet, after making pump repairs the first of the week.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 2 E. C. Rawlings was drilling ahead of 3,000 feet in shale, with streaks of lime. It is a south offset to the field opener.

\$5,000 Set As Goal For Lions Auction Sale On April 16

Most of the committees have been appointed and work is progressing on the auction sale which has been planned by the local Lions club to be held on Saturday, April 16. Proceeds from the auction sale will be used for civic betterment, including the hiring of a band director for the Bronte schools, establishment of a boys' organization and other worthwhile community projects. A spokesman for the Lions said that a minimum of \$2,500 is needed for this work and the club hopes to realize \$5,000 in order to sponsor all the needed projects.

A 25-foot canvas sign will be stretched across highway 277 in the near future to give publicity to the event. The sign will be furnished by the Lions club and erected by the West Texas Utilities Co.

On the Lions committee for the sale are Steve Badley, chairman; R. W. Rees and Norman Kiker. The committee asks that everyone in the surrounding area cooperate with the Lions in this project. A committee member said, "This is not a Lions club auction; it belongs to everyone in the area, for they will be the ones to benefit directly from the proceeds and we earnestly solicit the help and cooperation of every person."

The auction will be Saturday afternoon, April 16, at 2 p. m. at the Bronte Tractor Company. Cash prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be awarded on the afternoon of the sale and tentative plans call for a community store to dispose of some of the smaller items.

HD AGENT ATTENDS TWO DISTRICT MEETS

The County Home Demonstration Agent attended two district meetings this month; one on Recreation in Ballinger and the other on Home Management in Colorado City. At the meeting in Ballinger thirteen agents and the District Agent were present with Miss Dorothy Brightwell, Extension Service Recreation Specialist, as leader.

The purpose of this training school was to learn the art of camping out and practice camp leadership in preparation for a District 4-H Club girls' encampment at Camp Louis Farr at Mertzon in May. Miss Brightwell taught the group how to set up a well organized and safe camp. Tables, wash basin racks, pot hooks, shelves and other camp needs were made from twine and tree branches. During the camping period only those activities which are adapted to outdoor living and which teach the campers about their outdoor surroundings were stressed.

The meeting in Colorado City the 22nd and 23rd of March was a Work Simplification Training School conducted by Miss Thames, Home Management Specialist from A. and M. Miss Thames stressed the simplification of everyday household jobs in order to leave time for recreation and family fun. She demonstrated the saving of time and energy in several everyday jobs. These were making of beds, washing of dishes, sewing and ironing shirts.

Women were encouraged to purchase good tools for the jobs which have to be done each day. Good tools for a job are the greatest help in saving time and energy, yet women too often abuse their backs by not purchasing good tools for their work.



COKE COUNTY OWES \$8,799,030 ON DEBT

(An Editorial)

Some interesting and alarming figures were released the past week by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. These figures show the amount of each county's share in the national budget and national debt.

Coke County's share in the national debt amounts to the staggering figure of \$8,799,030. In other words, based on the last official census, each and every person living in this county owes \$1,917 on the national debt.

The situation regarding the yearly budget for 1948 was little better than our debt problem. Coke County's share of the \$42,203,000,000 budget for last year was \$301.45 for each person residing here.

Another interesting fact brought out in the report was the fact that West Texas paid more for its share in the national government in 1948 than the entire operating expense was in 1900.

The services offered by our federal government are invaluable, but even the best of anything can cost too much. A fine automobile is good to have; a nice home is something everybody wants; but if the cost of any commodity or service exceeds its value by too great a margin, then it is certainly unwise to buy.

We are not advocating the abolition of any of the many worthwhile projects and services financed by the federal government, but we do believe that there are many outlets for taxpayers' money in Washington that DO NOT give value for money spent.

COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER

Mr. Jack T. Sloan, Extension Visual Education Specialist, visited the C. E. Arrott Ranch Wednesday, March 23, to make a series of pictures on sheep shearing and wool preparation for market.

The "Texas" method of shearing is to be popularized in these pictures showing the proper way to shear a sheep without breaking the fleece. As soon as the pictures are made available we will show them in Coke County. Le Drew Arrott, 4-H Club boy and winner of many awards in sheep and wool production, was the principal actor in making the pictures.

A moving picture was also made for use in the county. Mr. J. A. Gray, Sheep and Goat Specialist from Extension Service, was with Mr. Sloan and directed the making of the pictures. Also present in the county were A. L. Smith, Dr. W. C. Banks, W. J. Moore, and District Agent W. I. Marshall, all from Extension Service.



Results of Poll

If it were left up to the folks who live in the 21st Congressional district,

many of President Truman's "Fair Deal" measures would be scuttled. The Taft-Hartley Act would not be repealed, the "civil rights" proposals would be snowed under, there would be no tax increase, socialized medicine would be doomed, and the proposed Federalized housing would be defeated by a narrow margin. At least, that's the way the vast majority of 10,000 people in the 21st district feel about it. Some of the verdicts are very decisive while a few are rather close.

According to this poll, three out of every four people who have an opinion on the subject would be against scrapping the Taft-Hartley law. About 80 per cent want Uncle Sam to keep his hands off civil rights legislation. Nearly 90 per cent think Texas should retain its tidelands. Ninety-five out of every 100 want a strong preparedness program and 78 per cent would not go for the \$4 billion tax increase.

Closer margins are shown on public housing and European aid. Thirty-eight per cent think the Federal Government should pay part of the cost of houses for low-income groups and for slum clearance, while 51 per cent think otherwise. The European aid program is supported by 63 per cent of those with opinions, while 23 per cent think it should be stopped.

Here is a summary of the tabulations, percentage-wise:

1. For repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act, 19.8%; against repeal, 66.5%; no answers and no opinions, 13.7%.
2. For a Federal anti-poll tax law, 27.7%; against 69.5%; others 2.8%.
3. For a FEPC, 12.8%; against, 81.9%; others, 5.4%.
4. For a Federal law controlling segregation problems, 5.9%; against, 90.4%; others, 3.7%.
5. For compulsory health insurance, 20.8%; against, 72.5%; others, 6.7%.
6. For giving the President power to impose price control and rationing, 14.5%; against, 80%; others, 5.5%.
7. For 4-billion-dollar tax increase, 13.4%; against, 77.8%; others, 8.8%.
8. For strong preparedness program, 95.5%; against, 2.2%; others, 2.3%.
9. For Federal payment on low-income housing and slum clearance, 37.9%; against, 51.6%; others, 10.5%.
10. For Federal ownership of tidelands, 7.4%; against, 89.1%; others, 3.5%.
11. Is European aid justified, — Yes, 62.9%; No, 23.5%; others, 13.6%.

It is well to point out that in answers to Number 11 — relating to European aid — quite a large number qualified their affirmative answers. Many hundreds answered "Yes", but added: "For a limited time", "but it should be reduced", "if properly administered", "provided those people will do more to help themselves", "we can't buy friendship", etc.

Thousands of comments on various questions submitted, as well as others, were made. These are very revealing and very interesting to me. I am personally reading every one of them, and am examining each questionnaire.

The predominant theme of all these expressions is "Let the States handle their own civil rights problems and let Uncle Sam keep his nose out of our affairs that are local in nature." Many, many hundreds express grave concern over the tendency toward big, centralized Government and the threat that this tendency may eventually lead to state socialism. And they are big-debt conscious. They want this public debt cut down, the Federal payroll reduced, fewer

bureaus, and non-essential governmental activities whacked. I am pleased that so many are following the Hoover Commission recommendations and praise them.

These questionnaires went to the people on the poll lists. Answers have come from all walks of life, from every town and hamlet in the 21st district, and they undoubtedly reflect a fairly accurate cross-section of the thinking of the people living there.

Hundreds have requested that this poll idea be repeated. It will be, early next year when the new poll list is made up.

APRIL IS NATIONAL CANCER MONTH

Throughout the nation April is observed as National Cancer Control Month, and on April 10, 17, and 24, the Texas State Department of Health is presenting special broadcasts over WOAI in San Antonio, at 7 a. m., outlining twenty different sites of cancer, the common age at which they appear, the accepted methods of treatment, the percentages of cures, and any known preventive measures. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, says that cancer patients today have a brighter prospect for recovery

than at any time before in history, and agrees wholeheartedly with the national movement to stamp out cancer through educating the public that "early discovery can mean recovery".

"Surgery, radium and x-ray therapy are working wonders in many different types of cancer," Dr. Cox said. "In all types of cancer except leukemia there is a possibility of cure if the patient is diagnosed in the very early stages. Any suspicious symptoms should be investigated by a competent physician at their first appearance, and if cancer is found to be present and treatment instituted at once, there is every reason to hope for complete recovery. The important thing to remember is that cancer can be cured; but it depends entirely on early discovery and proper treatment."

All persons interested in cancer control are urged to hear these special broadcasts on April 10, 17 and 24, on WOAI, San Antonio, at 7 a. m.



**SIDE OATS GRAMA
BEST RANGE GRASS**

"By keeping close check on the range grasses that my sheep utilized last year, I am convinced that side oats grama grass is a better range grass than buffalo or curlymesquite," Raymond Schooler, a district co-operator with the Coke County SCD, reported. "The sheep would graze around buffalo and curlymesquite and pick out the side oats grama grass. This has convinced me that if we are to protect our better range grasses, we are going to need to work out a deferred and rotation grazing system," Schooler said.

Construction of seven and one-half miles of terraces and a diversion ter-

race 1,800 feet long was completed this week on F. A. Whitt's farm located two miles west of Silver. The terraces and the diversion terrace are a part of Whitt's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying. Whitt is a district cooperator with the Coke County SCD and a member of the River Conservation Group.

Delmir Sheppard, Ed Hickman and Raymond Schooler seeded twenty-five acres of Madrid sweet clover last week. The clover will be used as a grazing crop as well as a soil building crop. The clover seeding is a part of each of the land owner's complete plan they are applying on their farms and ranches.




