## K. R. BLUESTEM HAY WITHSTANDS DROUGHT

Land owners farming and ranching in the Coke County Soil Conservation District are making every effort to find ways to reseed our native and introduced grasses and legumes. R. B. Allen, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors, and Ed Cumbie, district cooper with the Coke County Soil Conservation District used K. R. Bluestem hay as a means of seeding vegetative waterways for their water spreading system that is being established on their ranches. K. R. Bluestem is an introduced grass that has wonder possibility as a range grass for livestock and has proven its value as a soil erosion resisting grass. Allen points out. K. R. Bluestem is a tall perennial grass that is easily established by artificial reseeding and will withstand rather severe drought. W. C. Shamblin of Blackwell, added. V. G. Haggerton, who ranches two

and one-half miles south of Blackwell and a member of the Olga Conservation Group, and Richmond Stroud, who ranches four miles west of Robert Lee, completed soil and water conservation plans last week. The plans include, terracing with level broad base terraces with ends closed, contour farming, construction of diversion terraces, seeding of clover and hairy vetch, and native introduced grasses,

range improvement to be secured by adjusting livestock to feed supply and deferred and rotation grazing practices and returning crop residue to the soil. SCS personnel assisted Haggerton and Stroud with the development of their plans.

Construction was completed last week on seven and one-half miles of terraces and a diversion terrace 1,800 feet long on F. A. Whitt's farm locat-

ed two and one-half miles west of Silver and a member of the River Conservation Group. The terraces and the diversion terrace are a part of Whitt's complete coordinated soil and water plan that Whitt is applying as a cooper with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

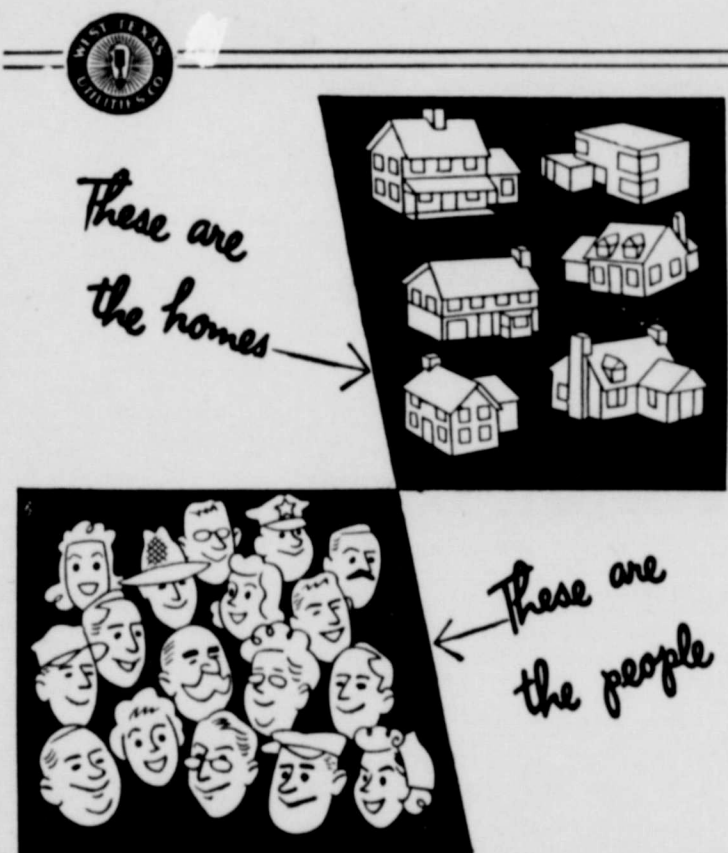

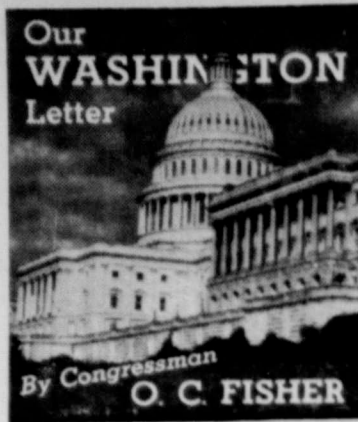

Oleomargarine and cherry blossoms combined to make food and fragrance top news on the Potomac last week. Oleo was stripped of all federal

taxes by a thumping vote of 287 to 89 in the House.

It's good news for consumers who, since 1886 when President Cleveland signed the first anti-margarine measure, have paid dearly for the privilege of buying and serving this derivative of cottonseed and soybean. Twenty per cent of margarine is milk.

The oleo taxes are punitive — deliberately imposed for the avowed purpose of discouraging its use. What are these taxes? To begin with, there is a 1/4-cent tax on the uncolored oleo. There is the tax upon the manufacturer of \$600 per year. There is a tax on the wholesaler of \$480 if he handles colored oleo. There is a tax of \$200 on the wholesaler if he handles only the uncolored. The retailer pays a tax of \$48 if he handles colored oleo or

\$6 if he handles only the uncolored product. In addition, there is a wide variety of State taxes.

If you operate a hospital, there is no way that you can serve colored oleo without putting yourself in the class of a manufacturer and paying a \$600 tax.

Under the bill authored by Rep. Bob Poage of Waco, all these federal taxes are repealed, but where oleo is served in restaurants it must be in triangles so as to distinguish it from butter.

Actually, oleo is naturally yellow because of the natural color of the ingredients. To reduce the tax burden, manufacturers have been obliged to go to the extra expense of bleaching it into a white color. But if the Poage bill becomes law, that won't be necessary any more.

The American consumers and our hard-pressed cotton growers will be winners in this long and hard-fought battle if the Poage bill becomes law. It's up to the Senate now.

With thirteen names on the ticket, 142 Robert Lee voters, Saturday,

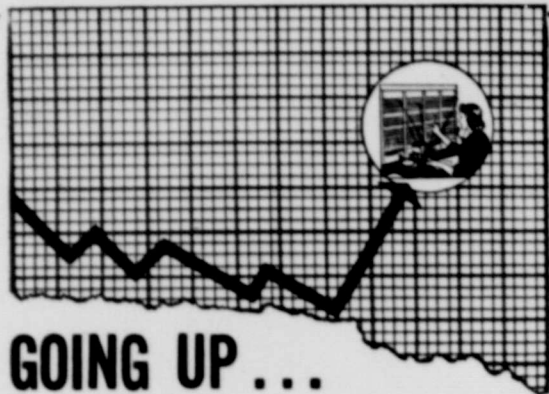

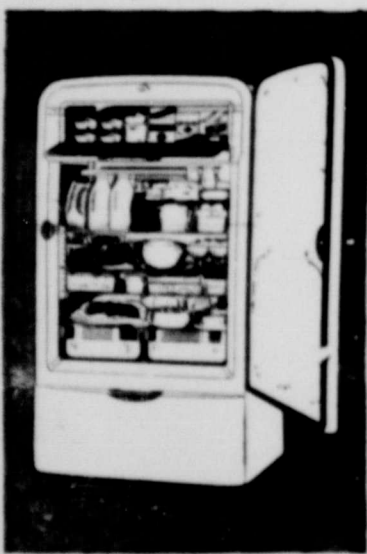
