## Permit Applied for on Murray 1 Youngblood

One permit has been applied for the past week in the Bronte area. It is T. W. Murray No. 1 L. T. Youngblood. Location is 25 feet from the north and 75 feet from the east lines of lot 2-43, Bronte township. The operation will be a 5,600-foot wildcat. It was reported this week that all the dry hole money for this well has

been raised and that operations will get underway in the near future.

Humble No. 2 Nannie Ash was completed this week for a daily flowing potential of 126 barrels. Production was from casing perforations at 4,330-60 feet in the Palo Pinto lime. It was reported Wednesday that Placid No. 1 Robert Forman would be "shot" again Thursday morning. Earlier in the week it was swabbing some oil, but no accurate check of the amount was known.

J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray was drilling at 4,575 feet. This wildcat has passed through the Palo Pinto formation with no shows. It is contracted to go to 5,000 feet or production.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 3 E. C. Rawlings was drilling at 1,590 feet in shale.

Humble No. 1 Olive Mae Keeney and others (Lowry Estate) was getting started late this week on operations for a 4,500-foot well.

A rig is expected shortly to deepen the Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 Warren. It was a failure in the Palo Pinto formation.

## UCRA, Sweetwater Agree On Oak Creek Project

Upper Colorado River Authority officials and representatives of the City of Sweetwater reached a tentative agreement Monday night in a meeting at Sweetwater regarding the use of the water that flows through

Oak Creek in northeastern Coke County.

The plan calls for Sweetwater to build the dam on Oak Creek and to bear all the expense incidental to its construction and operation. Bronte

and Robert Lee will have to come to the lakesite to obtain the water that they desire to use. This is where the UCRA will try to help the two Coke County towns.

L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the River Authority, said that the plan will be submitted to his group Friday night, provided that all the members can be present. It is planned that the UCRA will try to assist Bronte and Robert Lee in financing the construction of pipelines from the lake to the towns.

Besides Youngblood, Frank Cannon, vice chairman of the UCRA, and Carl Runge, attorney for the river group, attended the Sweetwater meeting.

A meeting was held at Sweetwater Friday night of last week, but no agreement was reached at that time. It was decided then to meet again Monday.

If the plan goes through, as is expected, Sweetwater will file application with the state Board of Water engineers for a permit to use the water from Oak Creek.

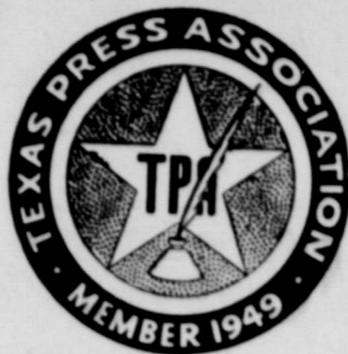

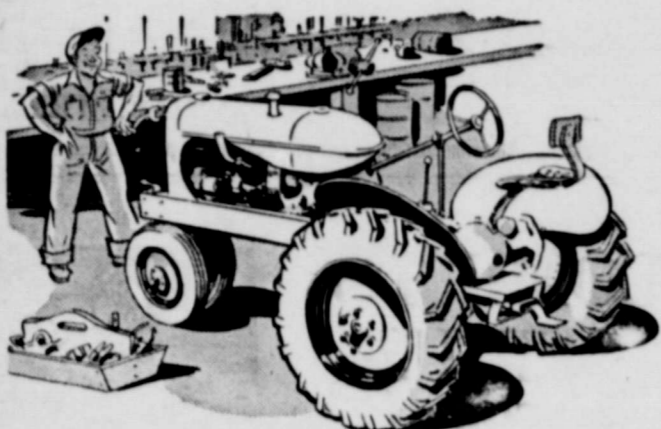

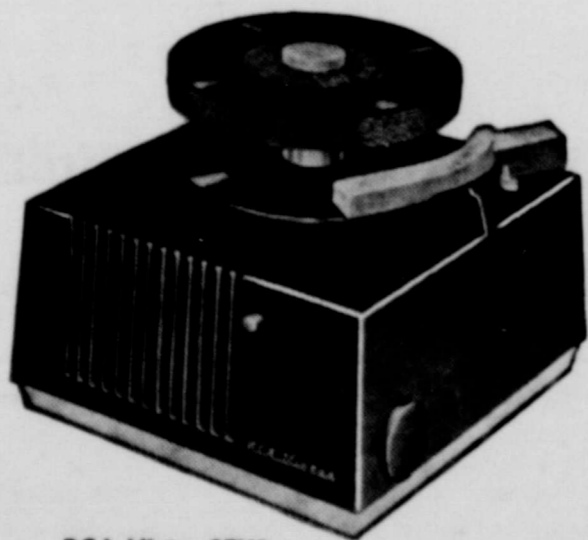
