Farmers Urged To Declare Amount Of Acreage Saturday

Farmers in the eastern part of Coke County are urged to meet at the towns nearest their farms Saturday, April 30, to declare the amount of acreage they have had in various crops in the years 1941-45-46-47-48-49.

In the east side of the county meetings will be held at Blackwell, Bronte and Tennyson. All farmers who received an acreage form in the mail are requested to have it filled out and bring it in as early as possible Saturday.

A spokesman for the farmers said that it is imperative that everyone who is farming comply with this request to come in and declare the amount of acreage they have had in the past.

The meeting in Bronte will be held at the city hall.

EVANGELIST VESTAL WILL PREACH FOR BAPTIST REVIVAL

Evangelist Dan Vestal of Fort Worth will do the preaching for a revival meeting which will begin at the Bronte Baptist church next Wednesday night, May 4. Vestal will bring a singer with him from Fort Worth.

Both morning and evening services will be held at the church for 10 days, continuing through Sunday, May 15. The evening services will start at 7:30 and the time for the morning services will be announced later.

Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the local church, said that a hearty welcome is extended to all who will attend the services. And speaking of Vestal, Price said, "Brother Vestal is a very zealous young evangelist — much older and richer in experience than in years. He has held several pastorates in Texas, the last one being in Waco, while attending Baylor university. He is an evangelist by nature. Soon after he was converted in a CCC camp, he began preaching and has been kept constantly busy in revival meetings since.

"He moved to Seminary Hill, Fort Worth, a couple of years ago, intending to attend the Seminary, but so far as I know, he has not had time to attend a single semester. He has been too busy holding some 25 revivals annually. He comes nearer 'praying like everything depended upon God and preaching like everything depended upon the sermon' than any other man I know."

Work was to have been completed yesterday on the dam and spillway on Lake Chapman which will approximately double the capacity of the lake.

Bruton said the city commission met at the White Auto Store early Tuesday morning and with the assistance of County Commissioner Otis Smith, made plans to raise the dam and the spillway there. Bruton said that Smith is furnishing the equipment and giving other assistance and that it was being done at "very little cost to the city."

20 Acre Proration Unit Set for Bronte Field

Word was received from the Railroad Commission of Texas Wednesday concerning the field rules which have been adopted for the Bronte Field. As requested by the people of the town, a 20-acre proration unit was adopted by the commission.

The second rule to be adopted was that 600 feet of surface casing must be cemented at the surface and the oil string set at least below the top

of the Palo Pinto formation.

Another decision that was in favor of the townspeople was an allocation formula based 50 per cent on the well and 50 per cent on the acreage.

Humble No. 2 Nannie Ash this week flowed 137.7 barrels of oil on a 24 hour test through casing perforations at 4,330-60 feet.

J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray Thursday morning was having trouble with stuck tools. The well was acidized in an effort to free the tools but was unsuccessful. Depth of the No. 1 Gray is 5,050 feet.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 3 E. C. Rawlings was drilling below 3,134 feet. Southern Minerals and Seaboard No. 1 Albert Bawlings was drilling below 2,300 feet in shale.

Placid No. 1 Robert Forman was continuing swabbing operations after recovering several thousand feet of cable which was lost in the hole. One workman at the Forman said that he was getting plenty of salt water and some oil on each pull of the swab.

Meeting Of UCRA Is Planned Tonight

UCRA Chairman L. T. Youngblood said Wednesday that a meeting of the River Authority is planned for tonight, to take action on the proposal Sweetwater has made on the construction of a dam on Oak Creek. The meeting will be held here.

Sweetwater has offered to build the dam and reservoir and sell water to Bronte and Robert Lee at the site of the lake. It is hoped that the UCRA will be able to assist the two Coke County towns in constructing pipelines to carry the water to their city mains.

WEEPING LOVEGRASS RECOMMENDED FOR SEEDING PASTURES

If land owners are planning to spend money to eradicate cedar, they should spend a little more money and buy Weeping Lovegrass seed to plant in the brush and in the holes, is the statement made by C. N. Webb, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Supervisors. I am convinced that it will pay big returns. Weeping Lovegrass that was seeded in February of 1948 has made a very rapid growth this spring. The grass is now from half to knee high and is beginning to mature a seed crop, Webb added.

Weeping Lovegrass is an introduced grass that shows to be a promising grass for livestock feed and to control soil erosion, Webb explained.

Construction of two and one-half miles of terraces was completed on Ed Cumbie's farm located five miles southeast of Bronte. Cumbie is cooperating with the Coke County Soil Conservation District and is a member of the Bronte Conservation Group. The terraces and contour farming are a part of Cumbie's soil and water conservation plan being established on his farm.

I believe Madrid Sweet Clover is going to be a wonder crop for our country is the statement made by H. C. Grafa, District cooper with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. The clover that I seeded on my farm, five miles southeast of Bronte, is making rapid growth and will be large enough to graze before too long, Grafa added.

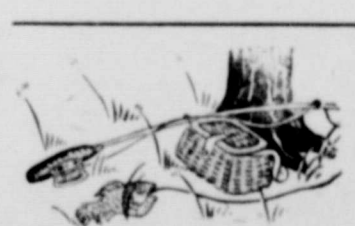

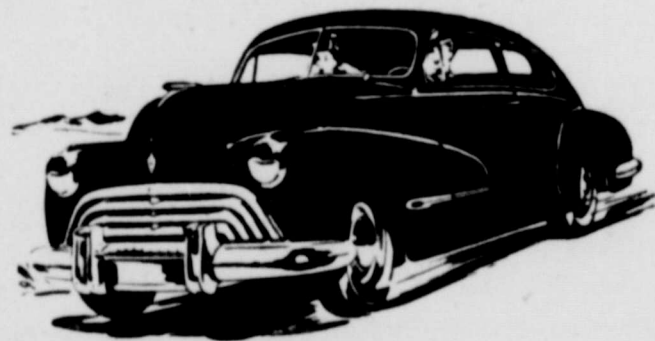

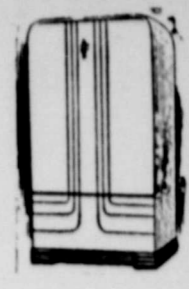
