Public Urged to Attend Cancer Control Movie

Two moving pictures, "The Traitor Within" and "A Question In Time", will be shown at the high school auditorium Tuesday night at 8 p. m. and the public is invited to attend. The movies, which deal with the symptoms, causes and control of cancer, are informative films and will be

sponsored by the Women's Home Demonstration clubs of the county.

Mr. Armistead Rust, chairman of the 4th district of the American cancer society, will be present and will give some information on cancer and will conduct a question and answer period following the films.

Mrs. H. A. Springer, general chairman for the county, said that the films will be absolutely free but that those who wish to donate to the cancer control drive may do so. She also stressed that these films are not "scare" pictures but give a clear picture of what cancer does and how it can be controlled.

Rheumatic Fever

The number of deaths from rheumatic fever, a disease which frequently affects the heart, has dropped considerably in the last few decades. Yet rheumatic fever still kills more school-age children than any other disease, and many children who survive its attacks are left with permanently damaged hearts.

Rheumatic fever most frequently strikes children between the ages of six and 12, although it may occur at any age. It is a painful disease, usually accompanied by fever and aches and swellings of joints and muscles. It is serious because, even when it does not cause death, a single attack may leave a child's heart in a scarred and weakened condition. Rheumatic fever has a tendency to recur, too, and of course, the more attacks a child suffers, the greater possibility of damage to his heart.

Early symptoms of rheumatic fever include pains in the arms and legs (too often casually dismissed as "growing pains"), slight fever, loss of appetite and loss of weight or failure to gain weight, and the twitching and jerking of a child's face, arms or legs usually called St. Vitus' Dance.

When any of the symptoms which might mean rheumatic fever appear, it is wise to call a doctor immediately. If the sufferer has rheumatic fever, the danger of permanent damage to his heart may be lessened by prompt medical care. It is still difficult to diagnose rheumatic fever in its earliest stages, but today there are a number of aids to help the doctor detect the disease even in an early stage. Once the disease has been diagnosed, the doctor can take measures which may prevent permanent damage to the heart.

When the doctor discovers that a child has rheumatic fever he will prescribe, among other things, complete rest for the patient, especially during the acute stage of illness and sometimes for weeks, and even months, afterwards. Close medical supervision and nursing care are necessary to prevent any unnecessary strain on the child's heart.

The after-care of the child who has had rheumatic fever is important, and the instructions of the doctor must be followed carefully. Such a child must have sufficient rest and well-balanced meals. Precautions should be taken to protect him against all illnesses, especially those of the nose and throat, and he should have periodic medical examinations. However, a child who has recovered from rheumatic fever need not be treated as an invalid all his life. With proper guidance, he should eventually be able to return to school and engage in many of the normal activities of children of his age.

JUDGE GIVES LAW ON LIMITATIONS

Judge I. J. Curtsinger, county judge of Tom Green county, recently stated the law regarding limitations on real property for the Standard-Times and Tom Green residents. In view of the fact that this has also come up several times in Coke county we are reprinting the law as given by Judge Curtsinger:

"If a man who has no deed has actual possession of property and uses it continuously for 10 years, limitation applies although he does not pay taxes on that property.

"But limitation does not apply unless actual possession and use of that property is maintained continuously for a 10-year period, even if taxes are paid on that property during the 10 years."

DISTRICT COURT TO CONVENE THREE TIMES EACH YEAR

It was announced this week that District Judge John F. Sutton has announced that in the future District Court in this county will be conducted three times each year instead of twice.

Judge Sutton announced further that the court will meet three weeks at each session instead of two.

The change was deemed necessary due to increased number of cases that have been coming before the court, both civil and criminal.

Oil Activity Quiet Around Bronte

Drilling was continuing in the Bronte vicinity this week with no big news forthcoming from the oil development here. Activity was slow and no new shows of production have been encountered the past week.

J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray, wildcat two miles north of Bronte, was drilling below 5,102 feet after being stopped to make motor repairs. Drilling was stopped for nearly a week because of stuck tools. The No. 1 Gray is scheduled to go to the Ellenburger after drilling through barren Canyon sand.

Humble No. 1 Lowery Estate was drilling below 3,700 feet in shale. It is in the Bronte field and is south of

Humble's No. 1 R. E. Hickman and east of the same company's No. 1 Nannie Ash.

Southern Minerals and Seaboard No. 1 Albert Rawlings, wildcat south of the Colorado River and 5 1/2 miles south of the Bronte field, was drilling below 4,660 feet in sand and shale. The No. 1 Rawlings is slated to drill to 6,500 feet.

Humble No. 1 Sallie Odom, wildcat across the line in Runnels County, was drilling below 2,500 feet in lime and chert. This wildcat is approximately ten miles northeast of Bronte.

Early in the week the Bronte field was extended a quarter mile to the west. Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 3 E. C. Rawlings showed gas in 42 minutes and recovered 120 feet of clean oil and 360 feet of heavy oil and gas cut mud on a drillstem test from 4,384 to 4,408 feet. Seven-inch casing was cemented on the bottom. The No. 3 Rawlings is a west offset to the No. 2 Rawlings and is a diagonal offset to the field open.

The same company's No. 1 Dr. R. J. Warren drillstem tested at 5,209 to 5,224 feet, presumably in the Strawn section, and recovered gas in 20 minutes. The breakdown of the stem showed 4,969 feet of muddy salt water. It made a Schumberger survey and was drilling ahead. Plans now call for testing to the Ellenburger.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 Billie Hanks, outpost to the Jameson field, has been plugged and abandoned after the Ellenburger was found barren.

The cable tool rig which has been over the Placid Oil Co. No. 1 Forman has been moved. No plans for that location had been learned at press time Thursday. Forty barrels of oil and a like amount of salt water were being recovered in 24 hour periods of swabbing last week.

The Bronte baseball team will play Veribest Sunday at 3 p. m. in Veribest. Their game last week with Robert Lee was postponed on account of the muddy weather. Only one Concho Basin league game was played Sunday, between Veribest and Sonora. The game, played at Sonora, was won by Veribest 3-to-1.

A perennial standby of the weekly paper for the editorial column is a "Buy At Home" missile. That they are ineffective is evidenced by the need of the same.

Yet we feel that we would be neglecting our duty to our advertisers, our subscribers . . . and ourselves, if we did not do all that is in our power to persuade the people of this trade territory to keep their money in Hockley County.

With the progressive merchants that we have offering prices that cannot be beat in Lubbock or elsewhere it is a difficult task to ferret out the reasons for this migration of shoppers.

Perhaps Madame thinks she is buying something exclusive if it comes from Dallas department stores. Chances are ten to one that the item she buys differs from the local item only in that she paid for the high rental of Elm Street business houses.

By watching for sales and what not, the customers might be able to save a few pennies over the regular cost here in Levelland. If you discount gasoline, time and trouble, however, you'll find that you can save money by staying at home and going "around the square," and reading the Herald for local offerings.

Money spent at home eventually returns and the cycle is never-ending until someone breaks the circle. If you make your living in Hockley County you get back a part of every dollar you spend in Hockley County.

The item of taxes paid by local merchants is not to be overlooked in a comparison of pennies either. When the wash is out, the county and city have to have just so much money. COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER

The rains came and the weeds grew. Farmers may control weeds in their grain fields by spraying 2-4-D at the rate of 1 to 1 1/4 pounds per acre. Enough water to give a good coverage should be used. The powdered form

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of 2-4-D will be found most economical in treating a large area. Caution should be used in spraying around broad-leaved plants that are not to be killed.

Otto Wojtek has sprayed about 90 acres and even though there have been frequent showers, the weeds are going down "for the count". Several

other farmers are planning to spray for weeds. Any kind of spray equipment such as is used in spraying other crops is effective.

The cost is not prohibitive when we consider the gain in grain production and the grade of grain produced without the weeds.

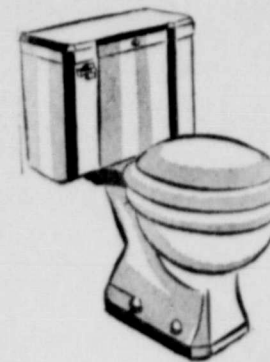

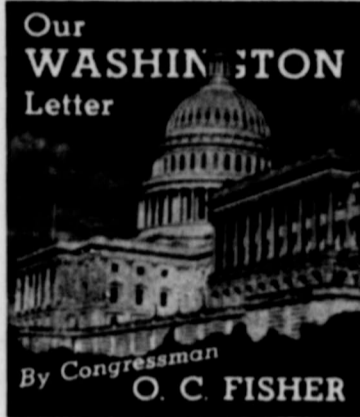

Ten House Members became eligible for membership in the mythical "Flip-Flop club" last week when they voted one day for the Wood labor bill (which passed by a vote of 217-to-203) and then on the following day flopped over and voted to kill the bill they had approved the day before. They were admittedly under terrific pressure, the President even threatening to cut off patronage from those who didn't stand pat for the Lesinski bill.

After the House voted to okay the Wood measure (which contains about 75 per cent of the Taft-Hartley law), on the following day the reversal occurred, sending the whole thing back to the labor committee by a three-vote margin, presumably for further study.

The Lesinski bill, for which the Wood bill was substituted on the floor, would have repealed the Taft-Hartley law, re-enacted the old Wagner Act, and would have repealed all State laws on the closed shop and prohibited future ones from being enacted by the States.

It was a close call and a hard fight to substitute the Wood bill and thereby prevent a complete break-down of our laws controlling and restricting the activities of labor unions as well as those of employers. Texans in Congress were sharply divided on the question of killing the Lesinski bill with the Wood substitute. Nine voted to keep the Lesinski bill alive by voting against the Wood bill.

I joined with ten other Texans in voting for the Wood bill, thereby voting to retain some controls over unions as well as management and against rubbing out our State laws on the subject of the closed shop.

COTTON CLASSING AND MARKETING NEWS NOW AVAILABLE TO FARMERS

Plans for handling the 1949 cotton classing and market news services available to farmers without cost under the Smith-Doxey Act were announced this week by H. J. Matejowsky, in charge of the Abilene office of the cotton branch, Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture, which serves this area.

"Farmers should apply for these services just as they did last year," Matejowsky said.

To be eligible for the free cotton classing and market news services, he pointed out that farmers must meet these requirements: (1) belong to a group of farmers organized to promote the improvement of cotton; (2) plant part of his acreage in the variety of cotton adopted by the group; (3) file an application as soon as the cotton is planted.

Groups in this area should mail their applications to U. S. Department of Agriculture, PMA, Cotton Branch, P. O. Box 2001, Abilene, Texas.

"To make sure farmers secure all the benefits due them under this program, their group application should reach our office by July 1," Matejowsky said. However, applications will be accepted until August 15.
