## Pledge Cards Being Distributed in Cleanup

Members of several women's organizations began distributing pledge cards to residents of Bronte Monday in an effort to get public cooperation in the clean-up campaign directed against the spread of polio. Persons will be asked to read the cards, determine which of the listed items apply to their property, and sign the card pledging themselves to do the work.

The cards read: "The following measures have been passed by the City Council and we earnestly solicit your cooperation. I PLEDGE TO permit my house and grounds to be sprayed by the city; have the weeds on my property cut; buy a covered garbage can, which will be furnished at cost by the city; keep the lid on my garbage can; fly-proof my toilet and spray it daily; practice personal hygiene at all times; drain all stagnant pools on my property; individually

spray my home and property regularly."

In a public meeting Friday night, the council decided to try to get the cooperation of the public with the cards and members of the council expressed the hope that everyone would cooperate voluntarily and that they would not have to fine anyone in connection with getting the health measures enforced.

Also at the meeting the council voted unanimously to order DDT to spray the town and to have a weekly garbage collection. The costs of these operations will be financed by assessing \$1.00 to each water meter in town. The motion also carried unanimously to order 150 pounds of DDT to spray the city.

The meeting and health measures were called due to the outbreak of two cases of polio in Bronte. No new cases have developed this week but Dr. John R. Harris, city health officer, warned that unless the town is cleaned up and sources of infection eliminated, an outbreak of the disease may occur at any time.

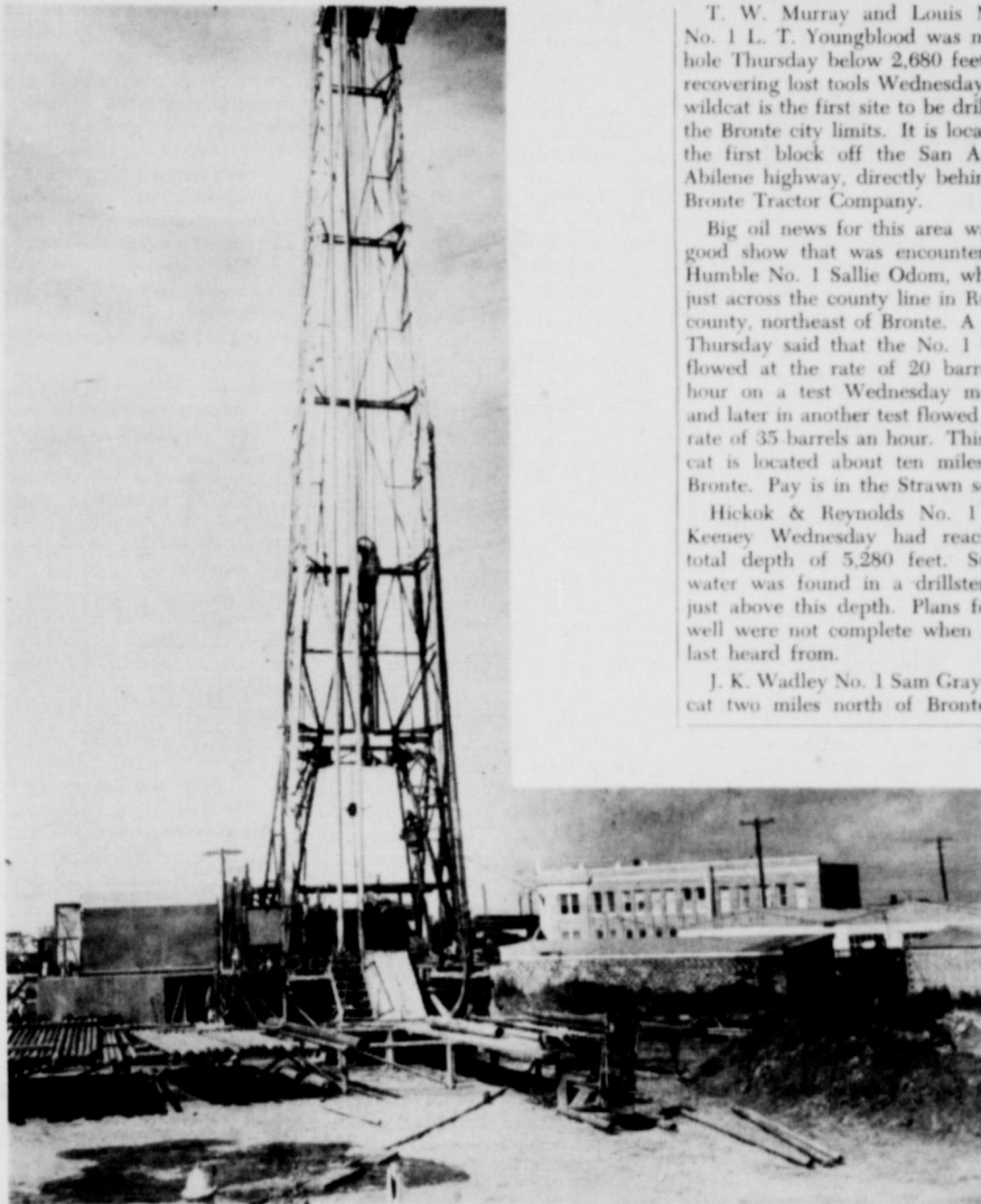
## COUNTY IS FAST BECOMING A SWAMP

## Several Wildcats Drilling Ahead; Humble No. 1 Odom Flows on Test

T. W. Murray and Louis Mabee No. 1 L. T. Youngblood was making hole Thursday below 2,680 feet after recovering lost tools Wednesday. This wildcat is the first site to be drilled in the Bronte city limits. It is located in the first block off the San Angelo-Abilene highway, directly behind the Bronte Tractor Company.

Big oil news for this area was the good show that was encountered in Humble No. 1 Sallie Odom, which is just across the county line in Bunnels county, northeast of Bronte. A report Thursday said that the No. 1 Odom flowed at the rate of 20 barrels an hour on a test Wednesday morning and later in another test flowed at the rate of 35 barrels an hour. This wildcat is located about ten miles from Bronte. Pay is in the Strawn section.

Hickok & Reynolds No. 1 J. L. Keeney Wednesday had reached a total depth of 5,280 feet. Sulphur water was found in a drillstem test just above this depth. Plans for this well were not complete when it was last heard from.

J. K. Wadley No. 1 Sam Gray, wildcat two miles north of Bronte, was

drilling the plug Wednesday after cementing above a pay section in the Ellenburger. It was hoped by operators that salt water which was encountered was blocked off by this latest cement job.

Seaboard and Southern No. 1 Albert Rawlings, wildcat across the river, southwest of Bronte, has been plugged and abandoned after failing to produce from the Ellenburger.

Humble No. 1 James L. Brunson was drilling at 3,199 feet. This wildcat is located 1 1/2 miles south of Bronte. An unconfirmed report Thursday morning said that a show was encountered at the above depth.
