Decision Delayed On Oak Creek Dam

The State Board of Water Engineers have continued the hearing on Sweetwater's proposal to build a reservoir in Coke county on Oak Creek. The board formally ordered the hearing continued for the presentation of further evidence but indicated that action will probably be taken within 10 days.

Fifty West Texas citizens were in Austin Monday for the public hearing to testify as to the need for the water in West Texas towns.

Discovery of commercial oil production last week on the Odom ranch is one of the main points of the opposition. The dam site is located on the 19,000-acre Odom ranch and some 600 acres of the ranch would be inundated. Mrs. Sallie Odom, widow of the late G. C. Odom, and Mrs. Edna Odom Wiley and Mrs. Nellie Currie were represented at the hearing by Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo. Hazlewood presented the formal request for the continuance of the hearing. Others appearing in opposition to the project were Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Kirk and Arthur Hendry. Their homes would be inundated by the 3,500-acre lake.

Sweetwater proposes to take 10,000 acre feet annually from the reservoir for domestic, municipal and industrial uses. In addition the reservoir would furnish water for Robert Lee, Bronte and Blackwell, and possibly Roscoe, Rotan, Roby and Trent.

Reburial Rites To Be Here Saturday For A. N. Coulter

Reburial services for Austin Nelson Coulter, 26, will be held here Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Bronte Baptist church. Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the local church, and Rev. C. R. Dunaway of Ballinger will officiate and burial will be held in the Blackwell cemetery. Military rites will be conducted at the graveside by the Sweetwater VFW.

The body will be met in Sweetwater Friday by the Clift Funeral Home. Coulter was killed March 26, 1945 in an airplane crash in Germany. He had completed more than 100 missions over German territory and had been awarded the Air Medal. He was a liaison pilot assigned to Patoth's Third Army.

He was born in Louisiana in 1919 and his parents came to Texas that same year. He was graduated from Lake View High School and was enrolled in Daniel Baker College in Brownwood at the time he enlisted in the army. He entered the Air Corps in November of 1941 and received his wings as a liaison pilot at Godman Field at Know, Kentucky in March, 1943. He was also in training at Goodfellow Field, Ryan Field in California, Blackland at Waco and also stationed in Tennessee and Georgia.

He is survived by his parents, A. C. Coulter of Bronte, and Mrs. Hettie Coulter of Las Vegas, Nevada; his stepmother, Mrs. A. C. Coulter of Bronte; his wife who has remarried, and a daughter, Neelen, both of Las Vegas; a half-brother, Grady Louis Coulter of Bronte.

Members of the local American Legion will serve as pallbearers.

Let's Make It 100 Per Cent

(Editorial)

Here in Bronte we have a very serious problem on our hands, and like many other towns, we must do something to solve this brain-teaser. This problem is the epidemic proportion by which polio has come into this area.

Since last weekend four new cases of the disease have developed and according to authorities this number is tremendous for a town the size of Bronte.

It is extremely unfortunate that we had to wait until six persons were stricken with this oftentimes fatal and crippling disease before we took it upon ourselves to do something about it. But now we have an opportunity to prevent further outbreaks. The Mayor of the town has designated Friday afternoon as official Clean-up Day for the City of Bronte, and he is asking that every business house in town close so that owners and employees can help clean up the town.

Several public-minded citizens have offered the use of various kinds of equipment for use in the job and it is up to us to do everything possible to make the Clean-up a success.

By helping in this project the people of Bronte will not only be doing their part toward getting rid of the polio menace — they will be making our town more attractive and a more pleasant place in which to live. This would certainly be a worthy project if no cases of the disease existed, but with its prevalence, a thorough clean-up is a MUST.

We urge you, for the sake of the children of this town, to cooperate 100 per cent in Bronte's Clean-up Campaign.

Friday afternoon has been named Clean-up Day for Bronte, according to a proclamation by Mayor H. O. Whitt. Firms in town have been asked to close their doors to business Friday at noon and join in cleaning up the town. The clean-up measures are being taken due to the outbreak of polio within the city limits of Bronte.

Otis Smith, county commissioner from this precinct, has made available two dump trucks to be used in hauling off garbage and trash and Bon Spoons will furnish a flat-bed truck. Spraying of the city started earlier

Edward Cumbie, Otis Smith and J. T. Henry have volunteered their power sprayers for use in spraying the town on that afternoon and the volunteer fire department will furnish the labor for the spraying.

City officials said that anyone who has any kind of equipment, such as trucks, pick-ups, hand tools, or mowing machines is urged to bring them in to town Friday for use in the clean-up movement.

C. E. Bruton of the White Auto Store was scheduled to receive a stock of closed garbage cans which he has offered to sell to residents of the town

at cost. Everyone is urged to either purchase one of these closed garbage cans or to see that their own garbage containers have some kind of lid that will fly-proof them.

An effort was being made Wednesday to find a mowing machine to cut the high weeds around the town. It was not learned at press time whether or not one had been secured.

Four new cases of polio have been reported by City Health Officer Dr. John R. Harris, since last week's Enterprise was printed. The first one to occur was Diane Kirchner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kirchner, Kenneth Scott, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Scott, is also in a San Angelo hospital with the disease. D. L. Brunson, farmer near Tennyson, was diagnosed as having polio, and Mrs. Fennell Smith of near Edith is in the local hospital with a very light case.

Dr. Harris reported that he attended a conference Tuesday night in San Angelo where the doctors with the team of experts from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis told of new discoveries and new theories concerning the disease. The local doctor said these men are the best in the world in their knowledge of polio, as it is their specialty. They travel around the country trying to help anywhere the disease is present in epidemic proportions.

The specialists said at the Tuesday night meeting that there are four different kinds of the polio virus and that it is believed that flies carry the disease on their bodies from contact with contaminated garbage and other filth.

The two other cases of polio in Bronte were Mrs. J. D. Luttrell and Belva Rippetoe. Belva is in a San Angelo hospital with a relapse but she is steadily improving. The other patients from this area are also showing improvement.

Interment was in the Snyder cemetery. Pallbearers were members of his Sunday school class.

Hayley was well known in Coke county, having moved to Coke county in 1889. He was a former postmaster here for 24 years and served as postmaster at Norton for 15 years.

He is survived by his wife of Snyder, two sons, Hubert of Lufkin and Holliday of Tyler, one daughter, Mrs. Zelma Strom of Snyder; 10 grandchildren; and three sisters.

Therefore, I, H. O. Whitt, Mayor of the City of Bronte, Texas, hereby proclaim and designate the afternoon of Friday, June 17, 1949, as official Clean-up Day for the City of Bronte.

I request and urge all business firms in the city to close their doors to business on this afternoon and that everyone in the city do their utmost to relieve our city of the possible sources of infection.

General Report For School Year Given

The general report for the 1948-49 school year was given Monday by Supt. J. L. Carroll. He issued the following figures: 331 students originally enrolled and 49 registering from other schools for a total enrollment of 380. Sixty-nine students withdrew with a net enrollment of 311.

Average enrollment was 297 and average daily attendance was 279. In the grade school the enrollment was 295, the average enrollment was 224 and the average daily attendance was 210 with 218 students promoted at the end of the year.

In the high school, the average enrollment was 73 with average daily attendance of 69 and a total of 95 enrolled.

The five school buses traveled a total of 57,250 miles and transported 140 students.

Carroll said that the school employed 12 to 13 regular teachers, one superintendent and two vocational teachers.

On the financial condition of the school, Carroll said that the bonded indebtedness outstanding is \$18,000 with a tax rate of approximately 30 cents on each \$100 for interest and sinking fund. He said that the school will be able to pay off the above debt within five or six years but that the final payment is not due for 20 years. He stressed the fact that the total tax rate, one dollar per 100 dollars, is not inflated.

An increase in the number of home district was reported for last year with a total of 344 as compared with 304 for the previous year.

Main needs of the school, Carroll said, are to prepare and equip four more classrooms for use in the 1949-50 term; repairs to the floor, walls, windows and roofs of the main buildings and new maps and reference books.

Carroll said the Gilmer-Akin school bill will help the school tremendously and some new teachers may be added next year, under the terms of the bill.

Mr. and Mrs. Carroll are in school at Sul Ross in Alpine this summer and Carroll said he would be looking for new teachers for the schools to be added. He will be back in Bronte next weekend on business.

BAND PROSPECTS GOOD

Supt. J. L. Carroll said that prospects for a band at Bronte schools next year are good and that much interest was evidenced at the Monday meeting concerning hiring J. E. Price of Abilene as a part-time band director.

He said that in the way of equipment the school has only three horns, a bass drum and possibly a snare drum and another horn that can be used if new parts are added.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISCUSSED AT FORT CHADBOURNE MEETING

L. T. Youngblood and a group of his neighbors met at the Fort Chadbourne church Tuesday night, June 7, to discuss soil and water conservation through their soil conservation district. Youngblood called the meeting to order at 8:30 p. m. and gave a short discussion on the need of soil and water conservation and introduced L. L. Wilkins and A. V. Sheppard, employees of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the Coke County Soil Conservation District. Sheppard gave a short discussion on the origination of the district, assistance land owners can receive from the district, who will be expected to put conservation on the ground. Following Sheppard's discussion, Youngblood discussed the need for that group to make application for assistance to the board of supervisors of the district. Seventeen land owners and operators made application for assistance.

D. K. Glenn, who farms and ranches one and one-half miles south of Bronte, and a district cooperator, reports that his Madrid sweet clover seeded in February is furnishing lots of grazing. Glenn reports that he put 18 head of cattle on eight acres of clover 20 days ago, and it is still difficult to find where they have grazed it. They will not ever hurt the patch, Glenn said.

A diversion terrace 1,800 feet long has been completed on H. C. Grafa's farm located four miles southeast of Bronte. The diversion terrace is a part of a complete coordinated soil and water conservation program that Grafa is carrying out on his farm.

Other practices that Grafa plans to establish are contour farming, seeding of cover crops, construction of terraces, seeding of native and introduced grasses and range improvement.

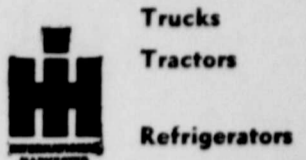

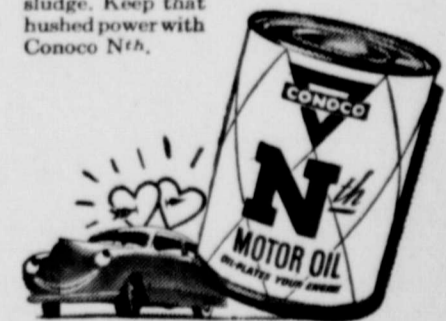

by a Clift ambulance where he was hospitalized with numerous lacerations and some broken ribs. The accident occurred about 1 p.m.

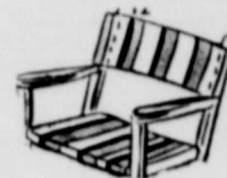

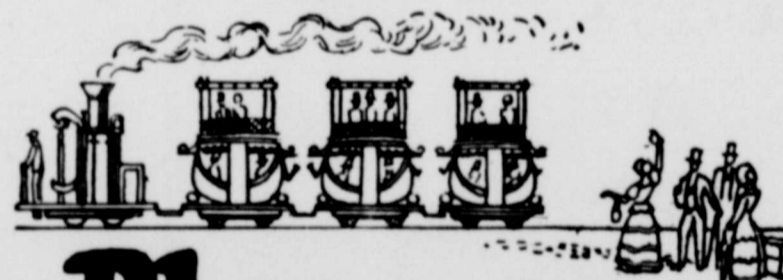

Buy yourself a complete set of wrenches to use on the containers that must be opened to inspect the lubricating supply inside. Also some new skin to graft on your knuckles when the wrench slips.

FIFTH

Fill your spray gun with penetrating oil to spray on the springs. Be sure not to breathe for about ten minutes while spraying the springs or you may oil-plate the inside of your lungs, which is bad.

SIXTH

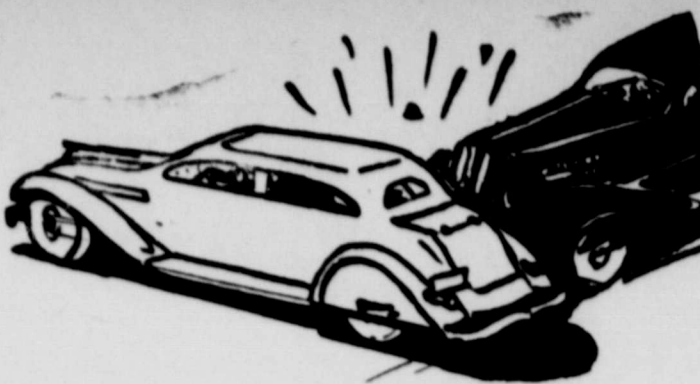

Mrs. Charlie Boecking has been a patient in the Shannon hospital in San Angelo since the first of the week.

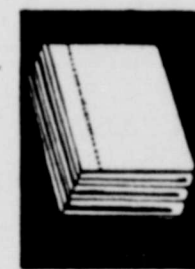
