Robert Lee oficials have not completely decided whether to run a pipeline to their city or to develop closer water resources. The Oak Creek project is to be an enormous one, costing more than

\$2,500,000 and impounding around 30,000 acre feet of water.

C. H. Wylie, manager of the Odom Ranch, was one of the main opponents to the project. He said that water wells drilled away from the creek's edge have been insufficient in many dry years, and that the underflow wa ter of the creek has been the only water available for stock.

Sweetwater plans to sign a con-tract with the Gulf Refining Co. within ten days to furnish the mwith three nillion gallons of water daily. No word was available as to when construction is expected to begin.
