1950 WHEAT ACREAGE ALLOTMENTS FOR CO.

The Coke County wheat acreage allotment for the 1950 crop is 3,727 acres. The county committee will hold back a small percentage of the allotment for new wheat farms and a small reserve for appeals. The new allotment is 75 per cent of the 1945-48 average acreage.

The 1950 wheat acreage allotment notices will be sent to producers soon. The allotments that will be sent out are for farms that seeded wheat for harvest in any of the years from 1945 to 1949.

The 1950 farm wheat acreage allotments will be used only for determining eligibility for price support. Any eligible producer shall be any individual, partnership, association, corporation or other legal entity that has an interest as landowner, landlord, tenant or share cropper in a farm on which the acreage planted to wheat for harvest in 1950 is not in excess of the farm acreage allotment.

Belva Rippetoe Has Rheumatic Fever

J. M. Rippetoe reported this week that after four physicians held consultation concerning his daughter, Belva, they decided that she has had polio, but is now over this disease. She now has rheumatic fever, according to their decision, Rippetoe said.

Dr. J. R. Gandy, Chief Surgeon at the Southern Pacific hospital in Houston, who is a person friend of Rippetoe, flew up for the consultation. He met with Dr. John B. Harris of Bronte, Dr. B. M. Arledge of San Angelo, and Dr. Franz, polio specialist of Chicago. Dr. Merrill W. Everhart was unable to be present because of illness.

The group of doctors went through every test and x-ray possible that could give a clue to the child's illness, and it was established that she is definitely over polio.

Belva has been moved from the polio ward into a private room and Mrs. Rippetoe is staying with her now. Rippetoe said that he was over to see her Tuesday night and that she was running a pretty high fever, but that she did not seem to be bothered with as much stiffness as she had been.

NEWS FROM THE COKE COUNTY SCs

Lee Parks and a group of his neighbors met at Park's farm last Wednesday to discuss treatment of land in keeping with the Board of Supervisors program for the development of their individual plans. The discussion was divided into treatment of cropland and rangeland. After the discussion, Parks insisted that all land owners schedule planning dates.

C. M. Anderson, who farms and ranches in the Valley View Conservation Group, completed a complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan last week. The plan included controlling outside water, seeding of cover crops, protecting crop stubble, farming on contour, construction of level broad terraces, range improvement and construction of a stock pond. A. V. Sheppard with the Soil Conservation Service assisted Anderson with the development of his plan.

After looking at two spots where water had been applied, one on bare ground, and one on ground with a good grass cover, Royce Fancher said "I can see now why a good grass cover is so important in getting the water in the ground when it rains. I would not have believed the grass cover could have made so much difference. Here are two range sites and water has been applied to each site the same length of time. The water wet the bare ground about six inches, and the good grass cover caused the water to penetrate a good twenty-four inches. If we could get all of our range land covered with good range grasses, our erosion would not be near as great and our rivers and creeks would not flood as often."

B. D. Gartman, who farms and ranches two miles south of Sanco started the construction of two miles of terraces last week. The terraces construction is a part of his complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan.

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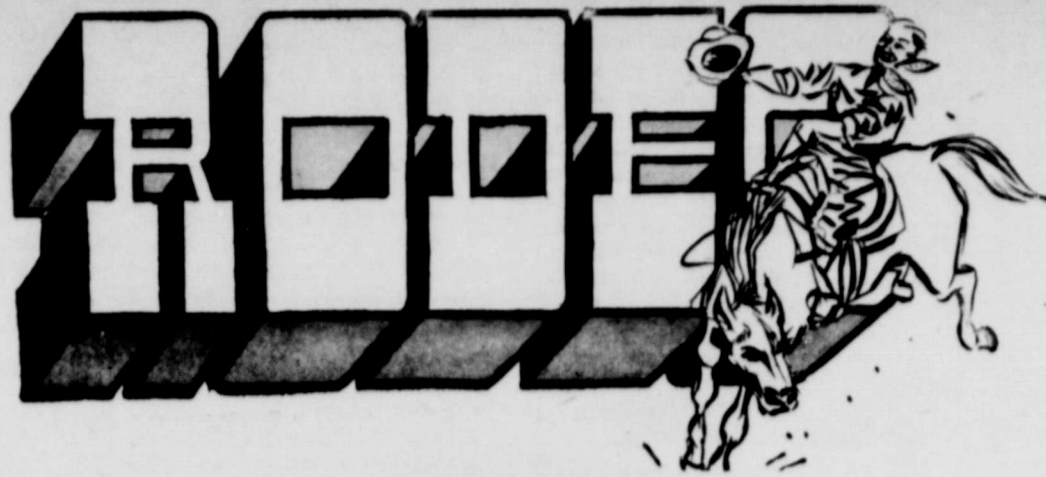
