> Some facts which will be of interest to voters have been assembled for Enterprise readers as follows:

No. 33

The 1948 evaluation of the Maverick School District was \$193,850. while the bonded indebtedness was \$4,000 at 5 per cent interest, retiring in 1965 with payments of \$250 annually, plus interest.

The evaluation of the Bronte District at the same time was \$1,732,525. which included besides Bronte, Oak Creek and Brookshire, which consolidated with Bronte April 2, 1949. Bronte's bonded indebtedness was \$18,300, with enough in the sinking fund to retire approximately \$3,000, which is planned in the near future. This leaves about \$16,000 indebtedness, plus \$3,531 of Oak Creek indebtedness, which was assumed from Norton by Oak Creek.

Bronte's tax rate is \$1.00 per \$100 evaluation, while Norton has a rate of \$1.50. Norton has an evaluation of \$354,831 and a bonded indebtedness of \$20,000, according to the Election Order.

Bronte Schools to Start September 5



VACATION! They've picked time and place, and they've planned and saved for months.



with your tax funds.




This is true not only in our industry in some eastern locations, but the bureaucrats are now openly aiming at banks, insurance, steel, railroads, mines, forests and many other private busi-

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
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purely local and intra-state in character. Yet, by interpretation of what is included in and connected with interstate commerce, hundreds of small businesses and service establishments have been drawn under Federal control, contrary to the intent of Congress when the wage and hour law was passed back in 1938. For example, by interpretation, window cleaners working on independent contracts for factories which make goods shipped in interstate

pendent contracts for factories which make goods shipped in interstate commerce have been held to come under the Act. So have elevator operators in office buildings who serve passengers who engage in interstate commerce business.

Not long ago, workers on a local irrigation canal were held to be covered because the water was applied to sugar cane, which in turn was refined and shipped in interstate commerce. Another example is the holding that employees of a purely local fertilizer concern are covered because the fertilizer is put on soil that raises



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
