NEWS FROM THE COKE COUNTY SCD

J. R. Johnson, Noah Pruitt, G. C. Clark, Cecil Ash and Otis Smith are land owners and operators that completed development of their complete coordinated soil and water conservation plans last week. These plans were to treat each acre according to its needs. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted the land owners and operators develop their plans.

Claud Anderson, a member of the Valley View Conservation Group and a district cooper, completed a 2,500-cubic yard farm pond last week. "The stock pond will give me better distribution of livestock and prevent trampling out of the range vegetation around my watering places," Anderson said.

Land owners should begin to make plans to seed rye and hairy vetch, R. B. Allen, chairman of the board of supervisors, advises. "They should begin to prepare their land for seeding as soon as we get some fall rains. Seed bed preparation is just as important in seeding of cover crops as any other crops," Allen said.

"If land owners don't plan and regulate the grazing of their range grasses, they can destroy the improvement of their ranges which they have made during the year," said C. N. Webb, vice-chairman of the board of supervisors. "If the land owners will leave half of the vegetation on the land that has grown each year, the old crop litter will help improve the range. The litter will increase the water intake during rainfall, retard the runoff, reduce the soil temperature, and reduce evaporation. The more water that we can put into the soil and keep in the ground, the more grass we will grow," Webb added.

Two New Locations Made Near Bronte This Week

Humble No. 1 Lowery Estate acidized Wednesday in an effort to bring that well in. No word had been received at press time Thursday as to whether or not it was producing any oil.

Humble has staked a new location on the Johnson place southwest of

Bronte. Drilling operations are expected to begin right away, just as soon as the McQueen & Clevenger rig is through with the No. 2 Lowery well.

Rice Bros. No. 1 Stephenson has been abandoned after reaching the Ellenburger and getting no shows.

This wildcat made final test last Friday. It was located southeast of Bronte.

Humble has staked their No. 1-B Sallie Odum in the Fort Chadbourne field. It is located across the county line in Runnels County. It is located 810 feet from the northwest and 560 feet from the southwest lines of Elbert Smith survey 5 1/2. Plans call for a depth of 5,500 feet with rotary equipment.

Barnsdall No. 1 Harris Davenport, 1 1/2 miles north of Fort Chadbourne, has been acidized with 500 gallons. A test recovered 60 barrels of acid and wash water. Swabbing was scheduled below 5,000 feet, but little recovery was reported.

Humble No. 2 Sallie Odum has plugged back to the Strawn after finding the Ellenburger barren. It has acidized and operator was trying to complete it.

APPLICATION FORMS FOR GI DIVIDENDS AVAILABLE MONDAY

Monday, August 29, 1949 will be the first day of distribution of application forms for the National Service Insurance special dividend to be paid to veterans who carried their GI insurance for three months or more prior to January 1, 1948.

Application forms will be available at post offices, veterans service organizations, American Red Cross, Veterans' County Service offices and throughout the West Texas area served by the Lubbock Regional Office of the Veterans Administration.

These simplified application blanks are in the form of three-fold cards. The veteran will retain one-third of the card, which contains the instructions, and after filling in his full name, service number, C-number if any, and insurance number or numbers if available, and address, he will send the remaining two-fold card to the Veterans Administration in Washington.

Distribution of the dividend checks is expected to begin in January and will be completed during the first six months of 1950. Beneficiaries of deceased veterans who are presently receiving insurance benefits will not be required to make application for the special dividend. The VA will mail direct to beneficiaries of deceased veterans whose insurance was not in force at time of death, the necessary application form for any accrued dividend payable.

One application only is necessary although the veteran may have had more than one policy of insurance or more than one plan of insurance. Where the insurance number is unknown, the veteran's application will be identified through his service number.
