FARM BUREAU MEETINGS AT BIG SPRING, ANGELO

A series of 25 bi-district meetings sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau Federation will be held throughout the state of Texas September 6-21. It has been announced by J. Walter Hammond, federation president. The two meetings scheduled for this district will be held in the Settles Hotel, Big Spring, on Thursday, September 15, and in the St. Angelus Hotel, San Angelo, on Friday, September 16. Director C. H. DeVaney of Coahoma will preside. Meetings will start at 10:00 a.m.

All farmers, ranchers, and agricultural agency leaders are invited to attend the meetings.

Humble 1 Johnson Drilling at 3,950

Humble No. 1 Johnson was at 3,950 feet and had encountered a show at that depth. Operator was planning on testing the showing Thursday. If no production is found at this depth, drilling will continue to the Palo Pinto, where the other wells in the Bronte field are producing.

Humble No. 2 Sallie Odom recovered a small showing of oil on a test this week at about 5,500 feet. It has been plugged back to 5,100 feet and swabbing was underway at that depth.

Barnsdall No. 1 Harris Davenport this week swabbed 19 barrels of oil and three barrels of water in 13½ hours from perforations at 5,495 to 5,510 feet.

More than 300 guests were present last Friday night on Tad Richards' ranch out northeast of Bronte. Occasion for the party was Tad's 70th birthday. Richards was born in Rummels County, three miles east of Oak Creek, on Sept. 3, 1879. Although he has lived most of his life in Rummels County, he and his family have long been identified with the early settlers around Bronte. His father, in fact, helped to organize Coke County.

He has been in the ranching business all his life and business interests have carried him over a large portion of West Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas.

The Richards have three living children. A fourth child, Mrs. McCarley, died in 1947. Mrs. Shaylor Copeland lives at Strawn. Mrs. Claude Rowland makes her home in San Angelo, and their only son, Ralph, also lives in San Angelo. Most of their grandchildren and great grandchildren were on hand for the celebration, as were Mr. Richards' brothers, John and Lee.

More Than 300 Students Registered For Courses at the Bronte Schools

Supt. J. L. Carroll announced Wednesday that more than 300 students have registered for the 1949-1950 school year. School was officially opened Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock when a general assembly was held in the auditorium.

Superintendent Carroll was master of ceremonies at the school opening. Vershel Smith, local band director and teacher, lead the audience in two songs. Mrs. Chet Holcombe accompanied the group at the piano. J. T. Henry gave the invocation, which was followed by a welcome address by Mayor H. O. Whitt. The devotional was read by Rev. E. L. Thurmond and High School Principal W. N.

Gaddy made announcements concerning plans for the school year.

Coach Jack Price told the audience about the football schedule and prospects for the year. He also introduced the players. Rev. V. D. Price gave the benediction.

The school auditorium was packed with students and patrons who came for the opening. Carroll said that teachers were still busy Wednesday working on schedules, but that he thought everything would be working smoothly in a day or so.

Bronte schools this year have 15 teachers employed, along with some eight other employees. Pupils come from miles around over the 240 square mile district to attend school.

Polio Emergency Drive Gets Underway Today

Confidence that the entire community would give whole-hearted support to the Polio Epidemic Emergency drive was expressed today by Mac Rippetoe, chairman of the Coke county chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The drive, announced this week by Basil O'Connor, national foundation

president, is being held as a last resort because "in no other way can the National Foundation continue to aid increased numbers of polio patients without slowing up scientific research and professional education," he said.

It is the first emergency drive in the history of the fight against polio in United States.

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION

NOW THEREFORE, I H. O. Whitt, Mayor of Bronte, do urge each and every resident of Bronte to respond most generously to the National Foundation's emergency appeal during the week of September 9 to September 16, and

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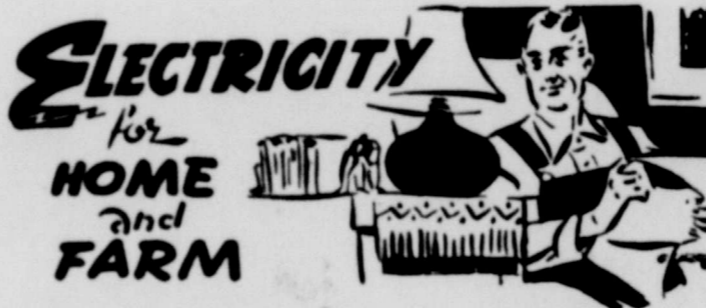

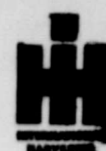
