Warning Concerning Mail Theft Is Given

Theft of mail from boxes in the Bronte postoffice has been reported this week by Mrs. Carrie Williams, postmaster. Latest theft was Sunday when several first class letters containing checks and other valuable matter were taken from a box.

NEWS FROM THE COKE COUNTY SCS

D. K. Glenn and a group of his neighbors met last week at Glenn's ranch located three miles north of Bronte to discuss treatment of land for soil and water conservation. A. V. Sheppard, Work Unit Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, led the discussion on treatment of cropland and rangeland in keeping with the Board of Supervisors Program and Plan of Work. The range discussion included a discussion of range sites, condition of range vegetation, and proper utilization to insure range improvement.

D. K. Glenn, Jacob Morrow, and Pete McDonald are land owners who completed their complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan last week. The land owners developed their plans in keeping with the Program and Plan of Work.

Two miles of terrace lines were run on T. M. Wylie's farm last week. The terrace system is a part of Wylie's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying on his farm. Wylie is a cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

Two diversion terraces were staked on Pete McDonald's ranch located at Fort Chadbourn. One diversion will divert water into a stock pond, and the other will divert flood water off a field. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted McDonald in staking the diversion terraces.

W. T. Green, a district cooperater, staked two short diversion terraces on his farm located one mile south of Tennyson. The diversions will divert outside water from his cropland. The diversions are a part of Green's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying as a district cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted Green with the staking of the diversion terraces.

H. C. Grafa, a district cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District, reports that the King Ranch Bluestem grass seeded last spring on his farm is making growth and producing a good seed crop. This grass promises to be a good forage grass, Grafa said. King Ranch Bluestem is an introduced grass first found growing on the King Ranch in south Texas, Grafa explained. It is a deep rooted, mid-tall, semi-prostrate tufted grass that is drought and cold resistant, and adapted to wide extremes of rainfall, Grafa went on.

A 4,000 cubic yard stock pond was staked last week on Tom Green's farm located one mile south of Tennyson. The pond is a part of Green's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying as a district cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. "The pond will give me a better distribution of livestock water and prevent livestock trampling around my other watering places," Green said. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted Green with staking the stock pond.

R. C. Lasswell and Mrs. Carrie Williams completed coordinated soil and water conservation plans on their farms last week. The plans were developed to treat each acre according to its needs. The plans include construction of broad base terraces, contour farming, seeding of cover crops, and range improvement.

A diversion terrace 2,600 feet long was staked on Jacob Morrow's farm last week. The diversion terrace will pick up outside water and divert it from his field. Controlling of outside water is a part of Morrow's complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan that he is applying as a district cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

Mrs. C. E. Earnest and children, Linda and Cecil, and Mrs. Horace Owens of Lovington, New Mexico, are spending this week visiting in Arkansas and Oklahoma.

Mail which was taken from the boxes Sunday was found scattered about the postoffice lobby and out in the gutter in front of the postoffice and on up to the front of the bank.

Mrs. Williams said that she has reported to the postal authorities and they have assured her that there will be an investigation of the matter. Evidence is being held for the investigation in order that it might be examined for fingerprints or other clues which might lead to the apprehension of the person who took the mail.

Mrs. Williams said that she wanted to emphasize the seriousness of this offense. She pointed out that tampering with U. S. mail is a federal offense and that usually anyone found guilty of the offense was dealt with in a very strenuous manner.

The postmaster urges that all persons who have boxes in the local postoffice keep them locked at all times and try to prevent a recurrence of the theft.

51,000 Barrels of Oil Start Moving From County Tues.

The largest shipment of Coke County crude oil ever to be made at one time was begun Tuesday morning when the Atlantic Pipe Line Company opened their valves at the pump station south of Bronte to let 51,000 barrels of the black gold start rolling toward their terminal on the Gulf of Mexico.

Atlantic is now handling the shipment of practically all of Coke County's crude output. Sun Oil Company recently completed their pipeline from the Jameson and Millican fields to connect with the line which runs south of Bronte.

Most of the big 51,000 barrel shipment was from the western part of the county, and the remainder was from the Bronte field. Atlantic's line runs to Port Arthur where the oil is either refined or shipped to other points.

HD AGENT ATTENDS BALLINGER MEETING

The Coke County Home Demonstration Agent attended the two-day program meeting in Ballinger on August 29 and 30. Miss Thelma Casey, District Agent from San Angelo, and Miss Nema Roberson, Associate Clothing, and Miss Margaret Jackson, Assistant Foods and Nutrition specialists from A & M College, were in charge of the meetings.

Miss Roberson assisted the agents from this district in making out the plans of work to be followed in the women's and girls' programs for the next year and in many cases for the next three years.

Miss Jackson assisted the agents in planning foods programs for women's and girls' work in the counties. Miss Roberson and Miss Jackson both gave help to agents on 4-H contests related to the foods and clothing programs.

Miss Casey gave assistance in planning foods and clothing programs as well as in discussing other problems with the agents as a group and individually.

CITY LAKE STOCKED WITH PERCH AND BASS

Mayor H. O. Whitt announced this week that the city lake on the Ballinger highway has been stocked with 5,000 Blue Gill perch and 500 bass. Whitt was able to secure these fish from the U. S. Government fish hatchery in San Angelo.

He asked that local fishermen restrict their fishing in the lake until the fish reach a suitable size.

Suits Are Filed to Prevent Building Oak Creek Dam

A new development occurred this week in the Oak Creek Dam fight between the farmers and ranchers of Coke and Runnels Counties and the City of Sweetwater. The Upper Colorado River Authority and the State

Board of Water Engineers were named parties in a suit to prevent the building of the dam.

The suits, which have been filed at Robert Lee and Ballinger, ask for an injunction against the building of

the dam or a specific listing of the property holders' water rights after the dam is built.

Originally the suits were brought against Sweetwater only. However, the other two groups were named in amendments to the original request for the injunction.

L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the UCRA, said Wednesday that attorneys for his group have filed a request that there be a complete severance of the UCRA from the suit, as it has no fight with the farmers and ranchers who are seeking to prevent construction of the dam.

Youngblood said that the UCRA has absolutely no interest in the dam other than a request for a specified amount of water for Bronte if and when Sweetwater builds the dam. Consequently, the UCRA is asking that its name be dropped as a party to the suit.

Signing the suit filed at Robert Lee were C. H. Wylie, Edna Wylie, Tad Richards and J. T. Ford of Coke County and W. S. Evans of Runnels County. Sweetwater is proceeding with plans to build the dam, according to the latest reports. City Manager Hans Thorgrimson of Sweetwater says that in most cases negotiations for the lake site are making satisfactory progress. However, the outcome of the squabble is probably a long way from settled, as the farmers and ranchers concerned have said they will take issue as far as necessary to protect their interests.

DELINQUENT TAX SUITS TO BE FILED SOON

Suits for delinquent taxes will be filed for the County and State as fast as they can be processed. Publication of citations will start next week.

The City of Robert Lee and Robert Lee Independent School District, and also the Bronte Independent School District have indicated that they will join in these suits for delinquent taxes on property within the respective districts. The law now requires this procedure and all persons having delinquent taxes will have considerable expense by contacting the tax collector's office immediately.

The County Attorney would like to avoid as much of this procedure as is possible under the law and certainly does not wish to cause any citizen any hardship or embarrassment, but the suits will be filed from the data that appears in the Tax Assessor's office as fast as such can be processed and got in shape to perfect service of citation.

An attempt is being made to notify all owners individually. However, the failure of notice to reach you will not delay the filing of the suit.

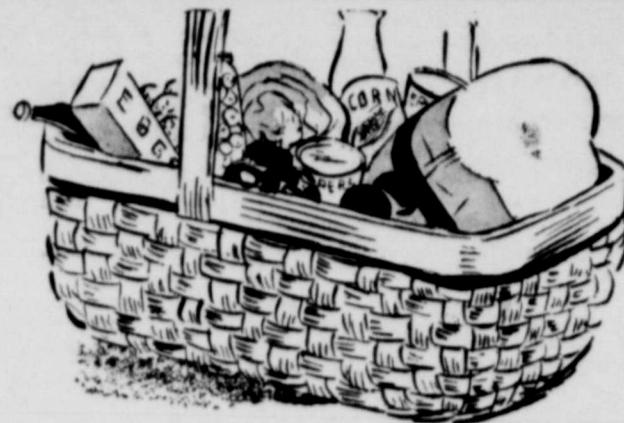

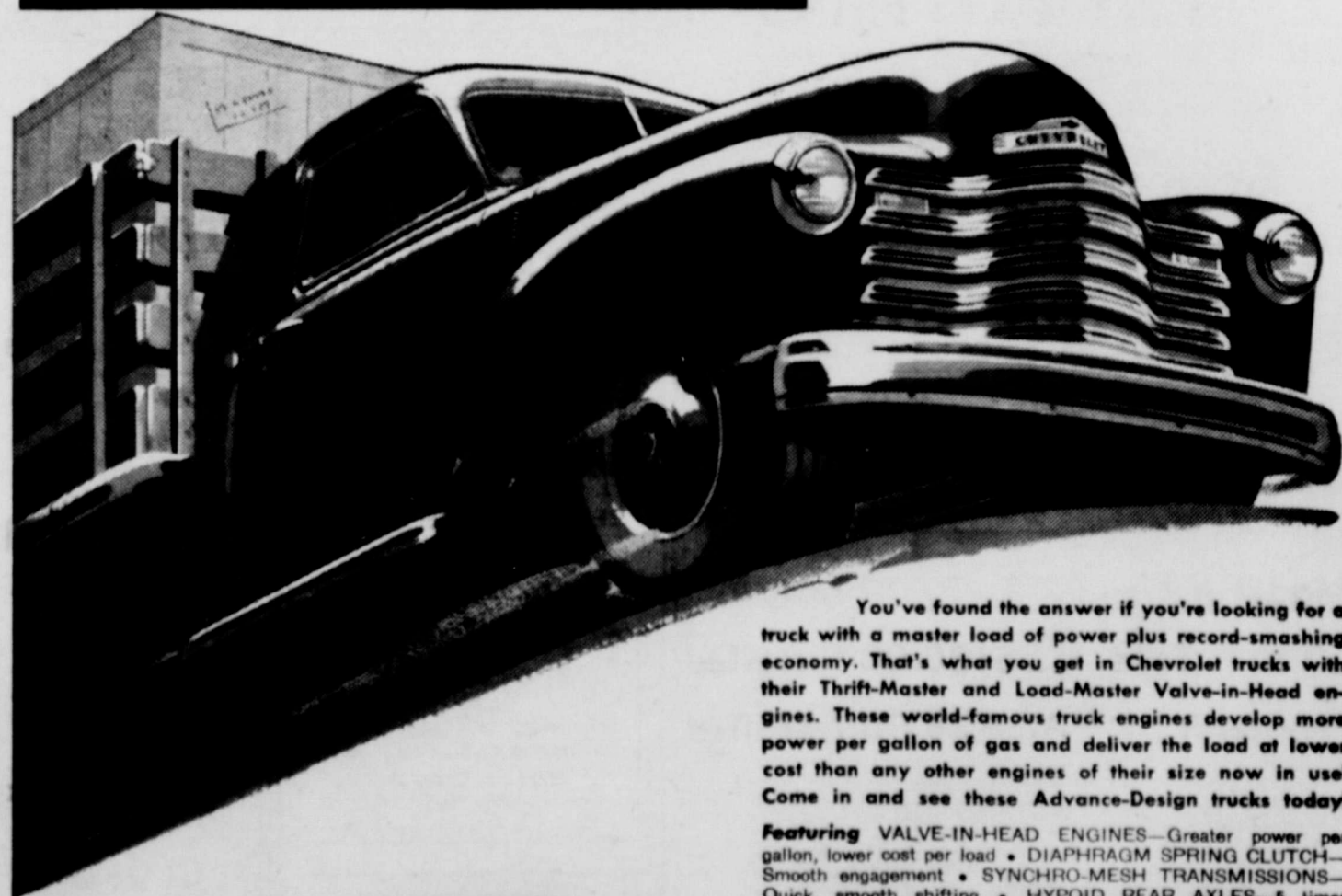

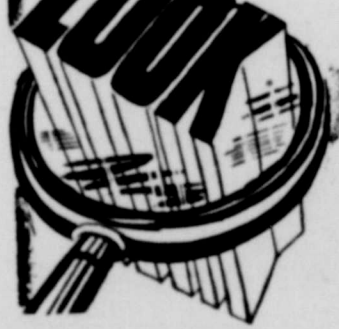
