### Unusual Weather Sends Temperature Down to High 50's

The earliest fall weather in 50 years for this section sent the thermometer down to 59 degrees Tuesday and brought more than 134 inches of rain to Bronte.

The cold snap hit early Tuesday morning and lasted throughout the day, but temperatures were climbing steadily Wednesday afternoon. Rain began to fall at Bronte about 9:30 Tuesday night and continued intermittently until Wednesday

The drop in temperatures was a sharp contrast to the Monday high of 95 degrees. The early fall weather was brought on by a cold wave which swept down from the Canadian Rockies and brought snow to parts of Montana and Wyoming.


