Three Funerals Here Past Week

Rites for Mrs. D. E. Sayner Held Here Thurs. Afternoon

Funeral services for Mrs. D. E. Sayner, 70, were held at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon from the First Baptist church in Bronte. Rev. V. D. Price, pastor, officiated.

Mrs. Sayner died Wednesday morning in San Angelo where she had made her home since last March. She had been ill for several months.

She had been a resident of Coke County for 62 years, having come to this county from Wilson County, where she was born. She was among the pioneers who helped settle the Tennyson community. She married D. E. Sayner, a prominent rancher, in November, 1897, in the home of her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Answorth.

The body lay in state at the home of her son, S. C. Sayner of Tennyson, from 9 o'clock Thursday until 3 o'clock in the afternoon.

Survivors include three sons, Collins and Frank of Tennyson, and Worth of Snyder; one daughter, Mrs. George Taylor of San Angelo. She is also survived by six brothers and two sisters.

Pallbearers were L. T. Youngblood, Earl Frank Glenn and R. T. Caperton, all of Bronte; D. L. Estes and Fred Conger of Tennyson; Fred McDonald, Jr., of Robert Lee; and Ted Harris and Merl Steele of San Angelo.

Burial was in Fairview cemetery at Bronte, beside the grave of her husband who died in 1932. Johnson Funeral home in San Angelo had charge of arrangements.

MAJOR G. C. HINES BURIED SEPT. 30 IN NATIONAL CEMETERY

Reburial rites for Major George C. (Lum) Hines were conducted September 30 at the Jefferson Barracks National cemetery in St. Louis, Mo. Hines was the son of Mrs. Lula Hines of San Angelo and was born and reared in Bronte. Mrs. Hines, her son, J. B. Hines of Amarillo and Mrs. J. B. Hines, her daughter, Mrs. Gay Copeland of Senora and Mr. Copeland attended the rites.

Major Hines was killed while a passenger on a B-26C bomber which was shot down while on an observation tour over Bitcher, France, on January 16, 1945. Hines and eight members of the crew were killed. One crew member bailed out and was taken a German prisoner. He was liberated and returned to the United States.

Six of the dead airmen were returned to their homes in the United States and two of the members were buried with Hines in the National cemetery in St. Louis. Hines was a major in the mechanized division of the cavalry.

Major Hines is survived by several relatives in Bronte including his grandmother, Mrs. J. B. McCutchen.

RANCHERS PLAN TO SEED COVER CROPS

James W. Allen, Ed Cumbie, D. K. Glenn, Vernon Haggerton, Jacob Morrow, Robert H. Sims and J. A. Stephenson are planning on seeding cover crops consisting of hairy vetch and Abruzzi rye. Forty-five per cent superphosphate will be applied at the rate of 100 pounds per acre if the superphosphate can be secured in the pellet form in time for seeding. Hairy vetch is a winter legume which adds nitrogen to the soil. The rye holds the soil and prevents it from blowing. Rye and vetch will produce excellent grazing during the winter months and can be harvested for seed or turned under in the spring.

James W. Allen seeded a 23-acre field to permanent pasture grasses last week. The grasses consisting of Weeping love, Sand love, K. R. Bluestem, and Western Wheat were seeded in rows. Allen plans to cultivate between the rows to control the weeds until the grasses become established.

Robert H. Sims and L. T. Youngblood completed a coordinated soil and water conservation plan on their farms last week. The plans include construction of level broad base terraces, contour farming, seeding of cover crops, and range improvement.

Construction of seven miles of level broad base terraces will be completed this week on Vernon Haggerton's farm located two miles south of Blackwell.

F. A. Whitt expects to harvest the best cotton crop he has grown in years on his farm located three miles west of Silver school. Mr. Whitt constructed level broad base terraces on his farm last fall. He states that he believes the terraces through conservation of soil and water, has increased his cotton yield by 50 per cent.

Coke County Oil Situation Is Looking Good With New Locations and Showings

The oil picture in the area this week was looking good with some new locations and showings being encountered in the Bronte territory.

Humble No. 3 R. E. Hickman was drilling ahead at 3,415 feet. This well is expected to encounter the Palo Pinto pay section within the next six or seven days. It is on the east side of the Bronte field.

Humble No. 3 Sallie Odom and others, 6,000 foot rotary wildcat had reached 180 feet in redbeds, a report

early this week said. It is located six miles southeast of Blackwell, and is northwest of the abandoned No. 2 Odom.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 Warren perforated a section 4,424 to 4,437 feet with five shots to the foot this week. The well was swabbing, but had found no shows of oil, it was reported Thursday morning.

A new wildcat was staked this week, southeast of Bronte. It is the Saxon Oil Co. of Abilene No. 1 Ward Hill. This wildcat is located close to the Runnels County line and just south of the Colorado River.

In Runnels County Sells Petroleum Co. of Gladewater No. 1 W. W. Mitchell, rotary wildcat two miles northwest of Norton, recovered 1,400 feet of oil and 2,000 feet of salt water on a drillstem test from 4,088 to 4,110 feet. This wildcat was drilling ahead.

Their guests included their wives and families, the Bronte teachers and their families and prospective Lions club members. Hardeman was introduced by Lion L. T. Youngblood. Other out-of-town guests introduced by Youngblood were Col. O. V. Spence, former chairman of the state board of Water Engineers, and Capt. Ray Butler, head of the San Angelo district of the highway patrol.

The Texas Interscholastic league has changed things by adding Hermleigh, Roby, Coahoma and Lorraine. Robert Lee finished third and Bronte last last year.

This year the district is made up of Bronte, Robert Lee, Hermleigh, Lorraine, Stanton and Coahoma. A well-balanced district, all teams are comparatively strong this year. Defending champion Hermleigh rates a slight favorite's role. District 8-B should prove to be an upset paradise. The Longhorns have a chance at the title this year and are asking the support of the town and surrounding territory. Every game should be close and the boys like to know their townspeople are behind them.

She said she wrote the letter after noticing an appeal to Americans to write friendly letters to persons in foreign countries. The address is Mrs. J. Kehr-Moesch, Knoningerstr. 8, Basel, Switzerland. She said she did not know just where her letter would be sent but has received this letter in reply. She believes the letter might be of general interest and we publish it as follows: Dear Mrs. Gaston:

I just got your address from the "Good Will Club" in Rene, but I must say I was a little afraid when I saw the date of your letter. Is it possible that since December last year, you did not receive an answer? Your wish for a nice Christmas sounds nearly like a good joke, isn't it?

Nevertheless I will try to write you some lines, perhaps you are still interested in writing letters with a young housewife from Switzerland? I am 25 years old, two years married, have no children and am still working in an office like my husband. We live in Basle, a little town with 180,000 people near to Germany and France. We like very much to walk on Sundays and like very much our nice little country.

Of course, I have always a lot to do. I am working in the office from 8-12 and 2-6 and in the evenings and on Saturday, I am free to do my housework. But anyway, I am sure, I will always find some time to write letters to people in another country and I am very interested to hear how you live in your little house so far away from a town.

I know, you and me, we live very different, but it is just this which interests me to write you. I hope you have the same feeling. When you really will continue the correspondence with me, I will send you the next time a few photos from us and the house in which we have our department of three rooms, and I think we will enjoy nice hours with our letters.

Hoping to receive an answer in an early time from you, I send you my best wishes over the ocean.

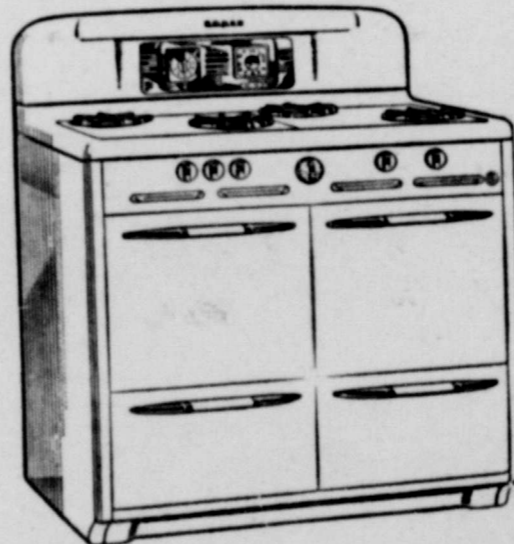

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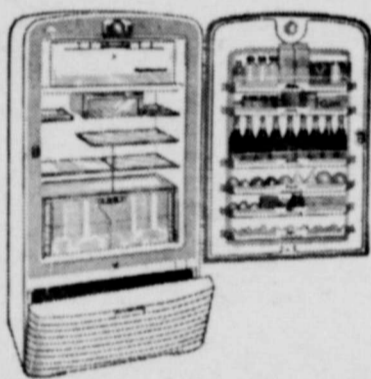
