

UCRA Awaits Ruling on Mountain Creek Dam

The UCRA was awaiting a ruling from the attorney general's office this for towns in this area. The river authority has set aside \$50,000 to help build a dam on Mountain Creek near Robert Lee, and a ruling as to the legality of the proceeding is being sought. Cost of the proposed dam would be \$125,000.

Robert Lee is now receiving its water from wells and this source is no longer sufficient to meet the demand of the growing town. The project has been endorsed by the Robert Lee Board of City Development.

The UCRA also has plans to help Bronte secure water for its increasing ceds. However, the outcome of the ontest between the City of Sweetater and landowners along Oak reek will determine just what kind aid will be given Bronte. Sweetwater plans to build a dam on Oak reek, and if the project goes through Bronte could obtain water from it.






