She expects each knock at the door and each telephone ring to be her unknown friend. And in Robert Lee, there must be a "fat man" who really believes the old axiom that "there is more pleasure in giving than receiving."

## 140 BALES OF COTTON GINNED THIS SEASON

## Local Man's Kin Dies at Sherwood

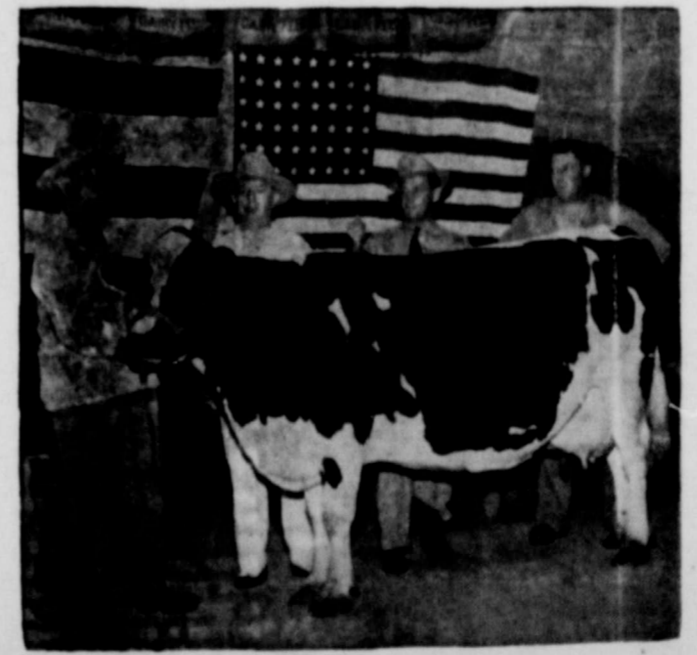

## New Producers, New Locations Near Bronte

Humble No. 3 R. E. Hickman was completed this week for 135 barrels of pipeline oil in 24 hours. Flow was through a quarter-inch choke.

Production was from perforations at 4,322 to 4,338 and from 4,350 to 4,365 feet. This section had been acidized with 1,000 gallons and

swabbed for four hours. Recovery was oil load and acid water.

This well is 2,000 feet from the north, 630 feet from the west line of tract 1 in the southeast quarter of section 453-1A-H&TC.

M. Queen and Clevenger, drilling contractors, moved their rig this

week from the No. 3 Hickman location to the Humble No. 4 Nannie Ash location. Wednesday surface casing was being set on this well.

Humble O. L. Johnson, southwest of town, pumped 110.40 barrels of oil plus 33 per cent water this week. The oil tested 45.9 gravity. Gas-oil ratio was 155-1. The pumper is 660 feet from the most northerly north line and 550 feet from the most easterly west line of L. J. Good survey 6.

Humble No. 3 Sallie Odom and others was drilling below 4,600 feet in lime. No shows have been encountered.

Barnsdall No. 1 Harris Davenport this week pumped 64 barrels of oil and 15 barrels of water in 30 hours. This pumper is northeast of Bronte.

Saxon Exploration Co. of Abilene No. 1 Ward Hill was drilling below 4,165 feet in shale. No tests had been run up to Wednesday night. Location of the wildcat is 1,000 feet from the southeast and 5,500 feet from the southwest line of a 732 acre lease in Wilhelm Thuren survey, six miles southeast of Bronte.

Hickok & Reynolds and Dan Auld No. 1 Warren was swabbing some oil this week after treating with 1,000 gallons of acid. This well, after having been abandoned has been re-opened, with the hopes that a pumper can be made from it.

## 70,000 Barrels of Coke County Crude Oil Roll to Coast

Officials of the Atlantic Pipeline Co., which has a pump station and storage tanks south of Bronte, announced this week that the largest shipment of Coke County crude oil ever to be made at one time went rolling through their line this week.

Seventy thousand barrels of crude from the Jameson Field in northwest Coke County was released at 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. The last of the oil was pumped out of the 80,000 barrel tank at 11 o'clock Wednesday night.

Atlantic's terminal is at Port Arthur where the oil is either refined or shipped to other points. The company recently completed construction of the new 80,000 barrel storage tank, and is now handling practically all of the oil produced in this county.

Bronte High School's Longhorns lost a hard-fought battle to the visiting Wylie Bulldogs here Friday night by a score of 13-7. The Longhorns are in preparation for their District 8-B opener against Stanton's Bulldogs at Stanton tonight. Kickoff calls for 8 p.m.

Stanton flailed Loraine 45-7 last week in the district 8-B tidewater. Hermeleigh remained undefeated and untied by stomping New Deal 26-0. Robert Lee sank the Reagan County Owls (Big Lake), 13-0.

In Friday's game Wylie drew first blood, scoring midway in the first quarter. Farr carried over from the 2-yard line for the score and the conversion try was low. Wylie led 6-0.

In the second quarter Wylie punted. The ball took a bad hop and bounded over Sandusky's head all the way back to the 2-yard line, where he picked it up, reversed his field twice, got away from about seven Bulldogs, picked up a mass of white-jerseyed blockers and went 98 yards for a touchdown.

Rusk plunged over the extra point to give Bronte a 7-6 lead at the half. The second half was Wylie all the way. Bronte did not register a first down during the second half.
