HD Agent Gives Tips On Selecting New Iron

Eight good features to check when urchasing an electric hand iron are listed by the Oregon Experiment Station as a result of a study of equipment for hand ironing in the home.

They are: Power, a rating of about 1.000 watts is desirable for for fast heating: Dial to control heat, located where it is easy to read and move when ironing; Handle, of heat resistant material such as plastic or wood, shaped to fit the hand comfortably; Beveled or slanting edge for ease in Ironing around buttons; Cord well insulated with a secure flexible connection where it is attached to the iron; Sole Plate shape and size suited to the ironing job.

A large sole plate saves times when family ironing includes considerable flat work. A smaller, narrower iron is more convenient for young children's clothes, ruffles or other fine detail on clothing; Weight, an iron weighing no more than four pounds saves energy in lifting; Iron rest, side proof pad to set the iron on, prove A. Consequently, the matter the federal Bureau of Reclamation a dam on the Colorado River in Coke is taking on paramount importance and that government agency has shown much interest in helping this er associations and other interested rich area develop water for its increasing needs.

Since the lake which was proposed some time ago on the Colorado River in Coke County is capable of furinshing more and better water han any other location in the area, his site is receiving much consideration as the place to build the primary lake for this area. The area involved in the over-all plan would be bounded by Brownwood on the east, Paducah on the north, Odessa on the west and San Angelo on the

Authorities say it may take more han one dam and lake to furnish o vast an area, but the proposed Coke County lake would furnish far nore water than any of the other

sites which are under consideration. The West Texas Chamber of Comnerce has been working on a water roject for this area for months and is hoped that the combined efforts of that group and the river authorities in this section can put the proposition over.

Youngblood said that if this projct gets federal approval it will take the combined efforts of everyone and that the UCRA is seeking cooperation from every group which has any connection with the project.

Additional engineers from the Bureau of Reclamation are now studying possibilities of this section of West Texas in regard to locations




