LONGHORNS LOSE TO STANTON; MEET OZONA SATURDAY NIGHT

Bronte's Longhorns lost the opening game of the District 8-B scramble to Stanton Friday night by a score of 21-0. Elsewhere in the district Hermleigh was established as a heavy favorite by blasting Coahoma 4-0 in a district contest and Rob Lee squeezed by the Big Spring 3-1 eleven 7-6.

Saturday night at Ozona, Bronte battles the Ozona Lions in their last district game. Records of the teams are as follows: Bronte 0, Lee 19; Bronte 14, Robert

Lee 0; Bronte 7, Eldorado 31; Bronte 7, Wylie 13; and Bronte 0, Stanton 21. Ozona 7, Alpine 14; Ozona 26, Reagan County 0; Ozona 6, Ira 45; and Ozona 13, Menard 13.

In last Friday's game, Stanton scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to add to a 7-0 lead they had compiled in the first quarter. Sandusky was Bronte's offensive threat as well as the Longhorns' defensive star, along with Brown, McCutchen and Vaughn.

The passing attack looked fairly good (better than usual). There were five completed passes, 3 to Vaughn and two to Snead. Hester and Rusk were doing the throwing. Sandusky joined beautifully all night.

The outlook for the next five games is not so dark as some fans think. Every team Bronte has played so far has a winning record. Lakeview had five wins to one loss; Robert Lee, three wins to two losses; Eldorado, three wins, one loss, and one tie; Wylie, four wins and no losses; and Stanton, four wins to one loss. The Longhorns hope to break the slump tomorrow night at Ozona.

Officers Elected of SCS Board Church News

The supervisors of the Coke County Soil Conservation District held their regular monthly meeting in Robert Lee, Tuesday, Oct. 11. C. Webb was elected to serve as chairman of the board for the ensuing year. Bryan Yarborough was elected vice chairman, and W. C. Shamblyn was named secretary. Other members of the board include W. E. Burns and Guy Denman.

W. C. Shamblyn reports that he plans to harvest his King Ranch Bluestem crop this week.

W. T. Given, a district cooperator with the Coke County SCS, and a member of the Mule Creek conservation group, reports that construction of his 3600 cubic yard tank was completed last week. Mr. Green said that the tank will hold water to a depth of 20 feet when it is full. The tank will provide a permanent water supply even in dry years, Green stated.

C. C. Boecking completed a coordinated soil and water conservation plan on his farm located in the Fort Chabourne conservation group, last week. The plan will include contour farming, seeding of cover crops and range improvement.

C. E. Mathers seeded 20 acres of abandoned land to perennial ryegrass and Western wheat last week on his farm located five miles southwest of Silver.

Prospects for Dam on Colorado Are Brighter

According to L. T. Youngblood, chairman of the Upper Colorado River Authority, prospects for building a dam on the Colorado River in Coke County look brighter than they have for years.

West Texans are becoming more and more aware that their growth

and prosperity are limited by the amount of water they have at their disposal. Consequently, the matter is taking on paramount importance in the business of civic groups, water associations and other interested parties and organizations.

As a result of this renewed inter-

est in the water situation in West Texas, groups have consulted with the federal Bureau of Reclamation and that government agency has shown much interest in helping this rich area develop water for its increasing needs.

Since the lake which was proposed some time ago on the Colorado River in Coke County is capable of furnishing more and better water than any other location in the area, this site is receiving much consideration as the place to build the primary lake for this area. The area involved in the over-all plan would be bounded by Brownwood on the east, Paducah on the north, Odessa on the west and San Angelo on the south.

Authorities say it may take more than one dam and lake to furnish so vast an area, but the proposed Coke County lake would furnish far more water than any of the other sites which are under consideration.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been working on a water project for this area for months and it is hoped that the combined efforts of that group and the river authorities in this section can put the proposition over.

Youngblood said that if this project gets federal approval it will take the combined efforts of everyone and that the UCRA is seeking cooperation from every group which has any connection with the project.

Additional engineers from the Bureau of Reclamation are now studying possibilities of this section of West Texas in regard to locations for lakes.

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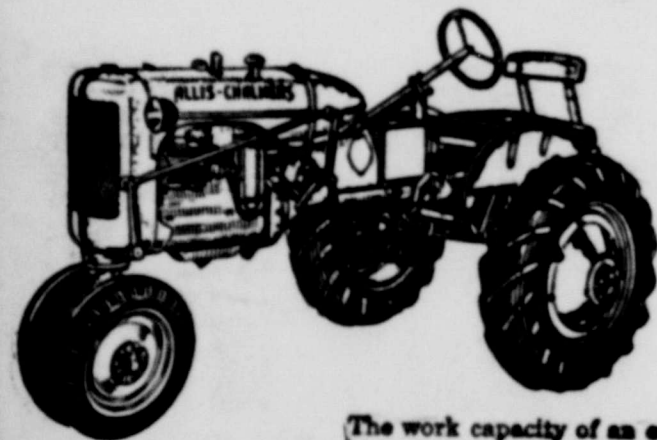
