HERMLEIGH BEATS BRONTE 27 - 6 HERE LAST FRIDAY NIGHT

Powerful Hermleigh used Bronte as another stepping stone to the District 8-B championship, overpowering them by a 27-6 count, on the local field last Friday night.

Early in the second quarter, the Cardinals rolled 79 yards on the ground with Henderson and Williams doing most of the ball carrying. Williams scored from the 1-yard line. The Longhorns dug in and held on the ground, but the Cardinals tallied again on a pass from Voss to Lockett that netted 36 yards. Williams scored the extra point to make the score read 13-0 at the half.

In the third quarter, Voss intercepted a pass on the Longhorn 40 and the Cardinals, behind Henderson mainly, rolled to pay dirt. Williams went 6 yards for this one. Henderson made it 20-0.

Henderson broke into the clear and went 65 yards before Kenneth Hester pulled him down from behind on the Longhorn 9. There the Longhorns held for downs but a high center went into the end zone and Lockett covered for 6 more. Henderson plunged over for the extra point and a lead of 27-0. The Longhorns came back with a screen pass, Kenneth Hester to Gerald Sandusky, for a beautiful 74 yards and a touchdown.

Pep Squad Girls Perform at Armistice Game

The Bronte Pep Squad girls performed at the half during the Bronte-Hermleigh Armistice game last Friday. The girls, who were well-trained, made a big hit with the sports fans in a touching Armistice tribute.

Dressed in their pep squad uniforms, the girls came on the field and then formed a cross, facing the Bronte stands. Each girl wore a corsage and carried a small white cross, some 14 inches high. They placed the crosses in the ground at their feet, removed their corsages and placed the flowers at the head of each cross. The girls then marched away, leaving a miniature Flanders Field. The drum major, Hattie Joe Snead, then loosed a white pigeon with white streamers to fly above the crosses, representing the dove of peace.

A firing squad from the local American Legion marched on the field and fired three rounds of ammunition and, from a distance Norman Kiker, Edward Cumbie and Noel Percifull played taps.

The girls then came back, picked up their crosses and went into march formation facing the west end of the field. They did a square, counter march and then a "hep step" to a drum routine off of the field.

Fans who witnessed the half time activities said that they had never seen a better demonstration anywhere and everyone was proud of the Bronte girls. The Armistice program was worked out and directed by Mrs. J. L. Carroll and V. Smith, band director.

Landowners and Sweetwater Agree On Water Question

The City of Sweetwater has come to an agreement with landowners near the proposed Oak Creek reservoir regarding the amount of water to be released for use of downstream stock farmers.

It is expected that the agreement will result in dropping the suit which has been filed against the city by the landowners.

The proposed agreement calls for the release of 60,000 gallons of water per day to be allowed to flow down Oak Creek. Then the City of Sweetwater is to release enough water once each year to fill all the water holes below the dam to the southernmost point of C. R. Wiley's property.

The city has agreed to build a three-inch pipeline from the dam to a point on Wiley's property equal in distance to a well from which he has been obtaining water in the past. Sweetwater is also to provide, by gravity flow, enough water for Wiley's household use. Other property owners below the dam likewise will be furnished water from the same pipeline.

Hearings on a condemnation suit in Coke County, which had been scheduled for Monday were to be held yesterday (Thursday) at Robert Lee. A three-man commission, consisting of Robert B. Allen of Robert Lee, J. Frank McCabe of Silver and W. W. Ivey of Bronte will hear evidence and assess the values on the land to be used by Sweetwater.

1300 Bales Ginned In Coke County; 1500 at Maverick

About 1300 bales of cotton have been ginned at the two Coke County gins of the 1949 cotton crop. The local gin, the Farmers Marketing Ass'n. gin, had turned out 505 bales last Tuesday night, according to J. D. Luttrell, manager. The Robert Lee gin had processed about 800 bales, according to Fred McDonald, sr., owner of that gin. They are the only two gins in Coke County.

The Maverick Gin passed the 1500 mark this week, according to Mrs. C. C. Glenn. Mr. Glenn is owner of the gin and it has been running 24 hours a day most of the time for some time.

Thanksgiving Day Game Will Be Played Here

Next Thursday afternoon, Nov. 24, at Bronte High School's Elbert Stephenson memorial field, comes the game that Coke County has been waiting for and wondering about since Bronte defeated Robert Lee 14-0 earlier in the season.

Now Thanksgiving is drawing near and both teams are preparing for the game which determines the championship of Coke County. The Bronte and Robert Lee rivalry is one of the oldest and most colorful in West Texas.

Comparative scores favor Robert Lee. The Steers last Friday lost to Stanton 13-7, a team that blasted Bronte 21-0. Robert Lee coasted by Loraine 26-0 while Bronte defeated the Bulldogs by a 21 to 6 count. Hermleigh beat Bronte 27 to 6 and Robert Lee 24-0.

Bronte's season record is two wins and seven losses and they have scored 62 points to their opponents' 138. Robert Lee has won four and lost four, scoring 73 points to their opponents' 83.

This lease, which has belonged to American Republic for some time has been sold to Hickok & Reynolds. The deal for the lease was closed Tuesday.

Location of the No. 2 Percifull is one location north and 330 feet east of the No. 1 Percifull. This location will be the first well drilled in the Bronte Field to conform to the 20-acre pattern which was authorized by the Railroad Commission of Texas.

DEATH ROW ACCIDENT INJURES 2

The old "death row" stretch of Highway 277 sent two more victims to the hospital early Friday morning. The accident occurred 4.4 miles south of Bronte where a car carrying two youths collided with a bridge and then turned over.

Fred Deuschman, 21, of Merkel and Jesse Eggleston, 19, of Sweetwater were taken to a Sweetwater hospital by a Clift Funeral Home ambulance. Deuschman was the more seriously injured of the two. He suffered a cut on the head and a possible skull fracture. Eggleston had a bad cut around the left eye. The Sweetwater hospital reported condition of both the youths as satisfactory.

This accident brings the total of persons who have been killed or injured in the last year on the highway between the river bridge and Tennyson to more than a dozen.

The No. 3 Odom flowed 128 barrels of oil and 63 barrels of water last week in 15 hours.

The wildcat in southwest Coke County, Southern Minerals and Bridwell Oil Co. No. 1 S. A. Runkles, had progressed below 2,507 feet in lime.
