TIPS ON BAKING, CAKES GIVEN

Christmas and the holiday season are here and now is the time to make your fruit cakes for the season. make it and store it, for proper storing will give it that good mellow flavor-the thing all cooks want in their

The preparation of the fruits for the cake is important and this job plan to bake the cake. Cut the citroh, orange and lemon peel in very thin strips, the cherries in half and the pineapple in thin wedges. Wash the raisins and currants and spread out to dry. Cut up the nuts coarsely with a sharp knife.

The baking pans should be readied before you start mixing up the cake. Grease and line them with oilel brown paper. Set the oven at 250 degrees so it will be ready when ou have prepared the cake. Then proceed mixing as for any other cake. Divide the flour in half and mix part of it with the fruits-this keeps them from sticking togetherand finish mixing the cake with your hands. Place the batter in the pans with your hands and press down firmly. This firming helps to get compact solid cake and one that is RED CROSS OFFICIAL HERE easy to slice.

The time allowed for baking is very important, about 45 minutes per pound for the larger cakes. A bake for approximately five hours at 250 degrees. Heavy brown paper office. tied over the top of the cake pan cake from getting too dry and brown.

Decorations, such as candied fruits cakes. To get it on a dark cake. brush the surface with a mixture of molasses and water and for the light or white fruit cake brush with honey and water or egg white and water about an hour before the baking time is up. When the baking time is up, remove the cake from the pan. but do not remove the paper from the bottom of the cake. After it has thoroughly cooled, wrap and tie it securely in waxed paper and it is ready for storage.

It should be stored in a clean, tight container. A few apples or oranges in the container with the cake will supply moisture to the cake as it mellows in storage.

Following is a recipe for white fruit cake recommended by Miss Louise Mason, extension foods and nutrition specialist of Texas A & M




IRON STAIRS IN ABILENE HOSPITAL - This ancient iron stairway at the Abilene State Hospital has caused many falls—






