

launch work out as expected, the Army's Transportation Corps Board will be able to transport a sea going cargo fleet to any place in the world in a matter of hours. Although planned for use as a workaday freight craft, availability of such a fleet for the evacuation of Dunkirk would have greatly simplified that operation and saved many lives.

would have greatly simplified that operation and saved many lives. The problem of portability was solved by building the experimental craft in three sections which can be connected in a matter of minutes by use of but eight bolts. All three sections fit snugly in a Fairchild "Flying Box Car."

The boat, of all-aluminum, aircraft construction, weighs 3,036 pounds empty and will make better than 10 miles an hour lightly loaded. With a useful load of 5,000 pounds aboard, it draws but 24 inches of water and the upswept reinforced bow permits beaching under its own power.
