I-B Brunson Near Completion; Location Made for No. 5 Ash

Humble No. 1-B J. L. Brunson, outpost to the Bronte Field, was drilling the plug Wednesday night after setting casing at 4,355 feet. Total depth was 4,360 feet. Plans were to begin coring as soon as the plug is drilled. Reports were that the No. 1-B Brunson is running very slightly lower than the No. 2 John-

son, recently completed extension to the Bronte Field. Observers believed it would make a good producer. Humble has staked another field test in the Bronte Field. It is No. 5 Nannie Ash and others, located 660 feet from the north and 550 feet from the east lines of J. F. Clark survey. It will be 1,588 feet from

Humble No. 2 Ash, a producer. South of Bronte, Southern Minerals No. 1 Greenland was drilling at 4,519 feet in lime and shale. It is west and slightly north of Tennyson. It is located 616 feet north of the most northerly southeast corner and 528 feet west of the east line of tract 1 and 2,345 feet north of the most southerly south line of Seth Clark survey 475.

COKE COUNTY EXCEEDS QUOTA IN ANNUAL RED CROSS CAMPAIGN

Coke County has gone over its Red Cross quota again, even though this year's drive got off to a slow start. At the official end of the drive, \$1,025 was reported collected in the county, as compared with the county quota of \$924. Red Cross officials reported satisfaction with the drive in the county.

The shot in the arm that put the drive way over the top was the generous contribution of Mrs. J. B. McCutchen of Bronte. Mrs. McCutchen contributed \$100 before the quota was reached, and, with many smaller contributions, put Coke County over the \$1000 mark. As for various parts of the county the money was given as follows: Fort Chadbourne, \$58.80; Edith, \$20; Robert Lee, \$256.15; Silver, \$92.75 and Bronte and Tennyson, \$597.57. County Red Cross Chairman H. A. Springer expressed his appreciation to the volunteer workers over the county who solicited the funds and to the people of the county for their generous contributions.

FIREMEN NEED MONEY TO PAY FOR INSURANCE

Bon Spoons, Bronte fire chief, announced Wednesday that the insurance which is carried on local firemen while they are engaged in fighting fires, will expire at the end of next week. About \$100 is needed to renew the policy on the firemen.

Spoons urged everyone who possibly can to make a donation to the insurance fund. He said he particularly wanted to urge the people who live out of town to give to this, since the firemen are on call for fighting fires in the rural area as well as in town.

The local firemen have made any number of runs to put out grass fires in the last year, and have made ten runs to put out fires in buildings, the fire chief said.

Spoons added, "I believe it is the duty of the citizens as a whole to insure the fire boys while they are on duty protecting the property of everyone. They are on call for anywhere at any time."

Anyone who will give for this insurance fund for the firemen is asked to leave the money at Bon Spoons station or at The Bronte Enterprise office.

Wednesday night Bronte received 3 of an inch and by noon Thursday additional moisture had brought the rainfall this week up to .5 of an inch.

Small grain in this section has been needing rain badly, and agriculture experts say that the wheat production this year will be lower than in many years.

95 Persons Sign Up and Make Deposit for Gas

Ninety-five subscribers had put up their \$10 deposit for natural gas service, a survey Wednesday night showed. This leaves 55 more needed to meet the 150 minimum requirement of Lone Star Gas Co. if they are to pipe Bronte with natural gas.

C. E. Bruton was appointed chairman of a committee Wednesday to make a house to house canvass of the city to obtain subscribers for the gas company. Others on the committee were Jess Percifull, J. B. Mackey, Jim Simpson, Sam Spruell, J. L. Car-

roll, H. A. Springer, and H. O. Whitt. Other persons were working on the project also.

E. L. Buelow, divisional superintendent of Lone Star, with headquarters in San Angelo, was a guest of the Bronte Lions club Wednesday and he explained the proposition which his company is willing to make to the City of Bronte.

He said that Lone Star would guarantee to have the system in operation by September 1 of this year if sufficient subscribers are signed

up. He said that if the town is piped, it will become part of Lone Star's transmission system and Bronte would have gas as long as his company has it to sell.

"We would put a local representative in Bronte and would maintain a free service on all kinds of gas appliances," he said. "The only thing my company asks is that you people buy gas from us. We don't want you to give us anything."

A two per cent gross profits tax would be paid to the City of Bronte, Buelow pointed out, as this is a state law.

If sufficient subscribers are obtained, he said, his company proposes to pipe gas to the property line of all those who signed up. It will be up to the subscriber to pipe the gas on to his house.

Mayor H. O. Whitt urged everyone who wants to sign up for gas to see one of the members of the committee which is working and sign up and make a deposit. The deposit, Whitt said, will be refunded at the end of one year, with six per cent interest.

BRONTE HAS CHANCE TO GET OIL FIELD SUPPLY LOCATED HERE

Mayor H. O. Whitt announced this week that officials of the National Supply Co. have been discussing the possibilities of putting a warehouse and distribution center at Bronte. Whitt said he assured them a good location on the Santa Fe tracks and that they were very favorably impressed with the possibilities of this area.

The Mayor said that the company is interested in having an all weather road constructed toward the Fort Chadbourne oil field, if they build a warehouse here. Otis Smith, precinct two commissioner, has agreed to cooperate in any way that he can toward getting the road in shape to meet the needs of the oil field traffic, Whitt said.

In a meeting of the Bronte Lions club Wednesday, Whitt asked the club to take over the sponsorship of the road, and Lion President H. A. Springer appointed L. T. Youngblood chairman of the committee to work on the project. Other members of this committee are Whitt and Ben Oglesby.

Whitt emphasized the importance of making Bronte a desirable place

for concerns of this kind to locate. He pointed out the additional business they could bring to the town from among the people working in the oil field.

No definite plans have been made as to which road leading to the Fort Chadbourne field will be improved and made into an all weather thoroughfare. It was mentioned by some members of the Lions club, however, that a road coming into Highway 277 close to Bronte should be the one.

Mayor Whitt said that National Supply is seriously considering locating here and that high officials of the firm are working on closing a deal with Santa Fe at this time.

Oak Creek Dam Project Plans Going Ahead

According to reports this week in the daily papers of this section, Sweetwater is proceeding with its plans to build the dam on Oak Creek in northeastern Coke County.

Roby and Rotan, both north of Sweetwater, are to hold elections in the next few days to decide whether or not to buy water from Sweetwater's proposed Oak Creek reservoir.

The following story was taken from Thursday morning's Abilene Reporter-News. It concerns the Oak Creek reservoir which Sweetwater proposes to build northwest of Bronte.

Revised but uncompleted plans for Sweetwater's Oak Creek water project will increase the lake's capacity from 30,000 acre-feet to 40,000 acre-feet.

Final plans on the project are expected momentarily from Freese and Nichols, Fort Worth engineers. Bids, now being advertised, will be opened at 2 p.m. May 25. The City of Sweetwater voted and sold \$2,500,000 in bonds for the project.

It is understood the increased capacity of the lake will require a slightly higher dam with 18 per cent more bulk. The dam, it has been reckoned, will be about 70 feet high and 4,200 feet in length.

Originally it was intended to open bids on May 8, but because the State Highway Commission was receiving many bids on projects May 17-18, it was thought advisable to postpone the date under outlook for more and better bids.

New Mayor Lester Reeves wants work to get under way soon as possible so Sweetwater can realize its dream of a plentiful water supply."

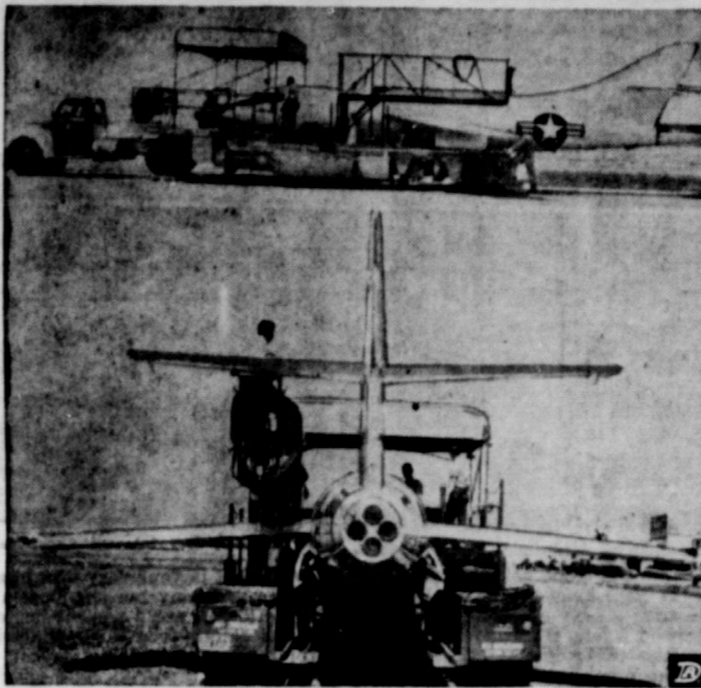

Mobile Station "Mothers" Rocket Plane



EL SEGUNDO, CALIF.—The U.S. Navy's experimental rocket plane, the Douglas D-568-2 skyrocket, is handled every bit as carefully as any other item of delicate precision laboratory equipment. A Frauehauf designed mobile "mother" unit, 13 feet wide, and 35 feet long, services its needs. The extremely versatile rig is provided with winches and ramps which roll the skyrocket aboard in a simple movement for fueling and servicing the entire plane. As some of the propellants used in the craft's rocket and turbo-jet engines are highly volatile, the trailer-rig is constructed to afford increased safeguards against hazards. The unit's efficiency has resulted in worthwhile savings of operation time, and permits the optimum use of the skyrocket for the benefit of American aviation science.

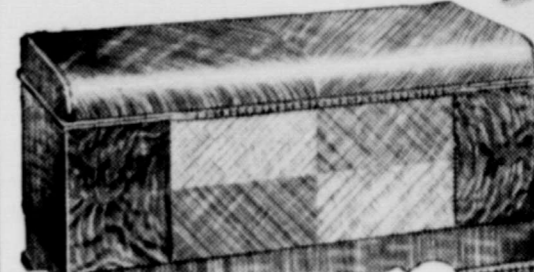

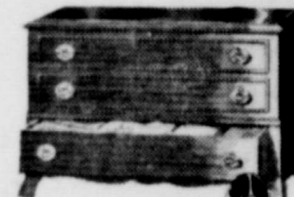

Caffeine-free coffee is the perfect beverage for those who must set a limit to the number of cups they drink a day. Co-star the drink with cheese, doughnuts or coffee cake. It is no top secret that a Coffee Klatsch wins friends. An automatic electric pot is an especially convenient coffee maker for those who serve it throughout the day and evening. You're a doubly thoughtful hostess if you provide small, medium and large cups so that each guest can take his choice.

SOFT CRUMB COFFEE CAKE

1 cups sifted flour
 1/2 teaspoon double-acting baking powder
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/2 cup shortening
 1 egg, well beaten
 1 1/2 cups milk
 Crumble Topping
 Sift flour, salt and sugar, and sift together into bowl. Cut in shortening until mixture looks like coarse meal. Combine eggs and milk; add to flour mixture and mix only enough to dampen flour. Spread in a greased 15x10x2 inch pan. Sprinkle with Crumble Topping. Bake in a moderate oven (375° F.) 35 to 40 minutes.

CRUMBLE TOPPING

Mix 4 tablespoons sugar and 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon. Add to 1 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs and mix with 4 tablespoons melted

butter. Add 4 tablespoons chopped nuts and sprinkle over coffee cake before baking.

VACUUM TYPE COFFEE

When making caffeine-free coffee in a vacuum coffee maker, the standard measurement is two level tablespoons for a 6-ounce cup of water. This same proportion applies regardless of the size of the Cory Maker. It makes a good full bodied cup of coffee. Slightly more water can be used for this measurement of coffee, if a weaker brew is desired.

The water should be put in the bottom bowl and brought to the boiling point. The top containing the coffee should then be inserted. The water should be held in the top—but not boiling—for from 1 to 3 minutes, depending on the strength desired.
