

try work. Mrs. Mattie S. Seale, Dr. John R. Stockton, Bureau attend this meeting. The meeting widespread anxiety over weak spots developing in business all over the country, emphasizes the instability of the equilibrium that had been attained by American business at the end of the year 1948.

All but one of the components, electric power consumption with a 5% rise, registered declines during January in comparison with December. Miscellaneous freight carloadings dropped 8% from December; crude oil runs to stills, 4%; employment, 3%; and pay rolls and department and apparel store sales, 1%.

In comparison with January a year ago, two of the components showed declines, although the composite index was 8% higher. Although the year 1948 saw business at very high levels, further increases do not appear likely.

The greatest weakness in the Texas business picture appears in the data on detail sales. Total retail sales in the State declined 11% from December after adjustment for seasonal variation. Even more striking than this decline, Dr. Stockton said, was the fact that sales of durable goods' stores dropped 16% while sales of nondurable goods fell only 8%. This reversed a trend that has held with little variation since the war. Sales of durable goods stores have consistently run higher than nondurable goods stores, and have been an important factor in maintaining the high level of business activi-

Department and apparell store sales made a better showing than either durable or nondurable goods, with a decline of only 1% in the Bureau's index. It has been rather generally reported that the response of consumers to the price reductions available in the after Christmas sales have given a substantial boost to department and apparel store sales. This seems to indicate that consumer buying can be stimalated by reduction of prices, and that the buying public is becoming more conscious than ever of high

Cash income received by farmers continued to decline in January. The 37% drop in the seasonally adjusted index carried farm cash income to a level 32% under January 1948. This decrease indicates strikingly the effect of falling prices of farm products on the income of the farmer.

The conumers' price index for Houston continued to decline in January. The level of all prices went down 7%, while food prices dropped 1%. The food price index was 3% below the level of January 1948, but all commodities were still 1% higher than a year ago. The prices of goods at retail always move more slowly than the prices in the primary markets; so the price of foods in the grocery stores does not yet reflect all the decreases in the prices paid to farmers.

Known affectionately and reverently as the "Old Man", Hogan has brought to the United States a vast know-how of the hunting breeds and a warm Irish heart that sends him all over the country helping inexperienced sportsmen organize clubs and hold field trials. He has traveled hundreds of miles at his own expense doing this sort of thing, and wherever he goes, judging trials, organizing trials or just giving advice, he makes friends.

Hogan was a gamekeeper and professional trainer in England and Ireland, and came to the United States via Alberta, where he operated a wheat farm for a short while after World War I He specializes in the training and handling of retrievers and spaniels, and from the Hogan kennels at Barrington, Illinois, have come scores of typy working Labradors and springer spaniels to bolster and improve the strains of those breeds in this country.

Space hardly permits naming the great Labradors which he has trained-Nigger and Tyke and Kitty of Barrington, Glenairlie Rocket, Freehaven Jay were a few. A Hogan-trained springer, Dalshanagan Pomme de Terre, gave the Middle West its first concept of the class a springer can attain.
