Wildcat Located on Copeland Ten Miles North of Bronte

A wildcat ten and one-half north of Bronte was announced Thursday by Carl E. Masey and J. D. Leftwich of Lubbock. The test, projected to 6,000 feet, will be the No. 1 Charles Copeland. Drilling is begun by May 15. Location is 660 feet from the north and west lines of the southwest quarter of section 273-H&TC. It will three and one-half miles northwest of the town of Fort Chadbourne and two and one-half miles west and slight north of Barnsdall No. 2 Harris Davenport.

Humble No. 7-B Odom was spotted late last week. It is 330 feet from the south and 917 feet from the east lines of Gray Carroll survey 289. It is 1,888 feet northeast of the same operator's No. 3-B Odom, a producer.

Humble No. 5-B Odom was to run casing this week after topping the line at 5,328 feet. Humble No. 5 Odom was drilling below 4,830 feet in lime.

A spuddler was working on Humble No. 2-C Odom this week. It is northwest of Hiawatha and Plymouth No. 1 Tad Richards. It was producing about a barrel of oil per hour and plans were to block off 19 feet of shale and then re-drill.

Southeast of Bronte Sparton No. 1 Levy Lee ran a drillstem test Tuesday in the Palo Pinto section. Recovery was mud and salt water. Drilling was continuing. This wildcat is west of the townsite of Maverick.

\$3,400 remains in the sinking fund. This amount is surplus.

Estimated income for the school district from now until the beginning of the 1950-51 school year is \$14,075 while estimated expenses are \$13,660. Carroll said that he hopes the school will break even on this account. He pointed out that in years past the school has been in debt as much as \$11,000 when a new school year began.

The school lunch room has a surplus of \$560 which will be available to begin with next year.

A total reached from figures supplied by Thomas Y. Pickett, tax engineer, and from last year's valuations placed the tax valuation in this school district at \$2,700,000. This is a third more than the approximate figure of \$1,800,000 which was placed on the property last year. This valuation will yield approximately \$27,000 in tax money, with no increase in the tax rate.

Carroll said that the increase in valuation has come about through the discovery of oil in the district and through some additions through consolidations. Of the total figure, it is estimated \$2,400,000 of the property is in Coke County, while \$300,000 is in Bunnels County.



Children First



The establishment of community dental health programs which will make dental care available to all children is being urged by the American Dental Association.

In a statement unanimously approved by the Association's House of Delegates, representing more than 70,000 dentists, it was urged that children be given priority over adults for dental health care.

Such programs, it was pointed out, would permit a practical solution to the problem of dental disease in the nation without resorting to a federal system of compulsory health insurance which the Association described as "costly and unrealistic."

Many of these programs are now in operation throughout the country and the dental profession is urging that one be placed in operation in each community. The Association pointed out that the community is the ideal medium for such activities as dental care needs and facilities vary widely. Local programs, therefore, should be adapted to the situation at hand.

Dental care for children is the major target because their dental health today carries the promise of higher general standards of dental health in the future, dental authorities said.





This deficit of \$102,449.81 can not be refinanced or refunded, it is not a warrant account, it is an overdraft. The \$32,165.00 in borrowed money can only be refinanced through the holders of this indebtedness. The \$72,715.20 in machinery warrants will either have to be defaulted or paid with borrowed money.

I maintain that at this stage of the financial affairs of Coke County there should be a substantial balance in all of the county funds. Since the present County Judge assumed office there has been the biggest tax collections in the history of Coke County. For your information and consideration I list from the record, the county, the car tag tax and the total tax per year for the year 1946 through 1949.

You will please note that the total collectable taxes for the year 1949 was \$111,899.80 as compared to \$51,232.96 for the year 1946. An increase of \$60,666.84, and yet, Coke County is operating on the biggest deficit in its history, with only \$3,319.25 credited to the Coke County account in the Depository Bank on January 9, 1950.

If elected it will be my purpose to improve the financial condition of Coke County by eliminating the excessive and unwise spending in these divisions of County finances:

1. Salary of County Officials.
2. Regular Road & Bridge Fund.
3. Special Road & Bridge Fund.

I will see to it that Coke County participates in the State Farm-to-Market Program that is now available to Coke County.

From now until election time I will discuss with the people the need for economy, and wise spending in Coke County's financial plan.

I will sincerely appreciate your careful consideration of my candidacy and your vote.




