On December, 1949, the Bronte combination took three first place banners in the Concho Valley District Leadership contests held here. The banners were won by the Greenhand Chapter Conducting Team, the Farmer Chapter Conducting Team, and the Farmer Quiz team. On the teams were Billy Wayne Hipp, Doyle Adair Williams, Lyndon Waldrop, Robert Brown, J. 
