Final Services Held For Otis Richman

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon from the Bronte Baptist church for Otis M. Richman, 23-year-old local youth, who died at noon Friday from injuries received in an automobile wreck five miles south of town.

Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the church, officiated at the services which were read at 4 p.m. Interment was in the local cemetery under the direction of Clift Funeral home.

Richman was born June 9, 1926, at Mosquero, N. M. He had lived in Bronte since 1941, coming here with his parents from Midland. He was employed by McQueen & Clevenger drilling company, and was working in the Bronte field. He was a veteran of World War II, having served two years with the U. S. Navy. He served aboard the USS Missouri and was aboard during the signing of the peace treaty with Japan. He attended school in Midland and Bronte, graduating here with the class of 1944.

The fatal accident occurred some time Thursday night or Friday morning when Richman's car left the road and plunged into a ditch on U. S. highway 277. It was 8 a.m. Friday before the wreckage was discovered by Tom Williams, local man who was on his way to visit at the Bronte hospital. A Clift ambulance was called and Richman was brought to the hospital where physicians worked with him until his death shortly after noon Friday. He never regained consciousness enough to give a coherent story of the cause of the accident. Relatives and others said that the only cause they could figure out was that he went to sleep. His death was attributed to a crushed chest and internal injuries.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Richman of Bronte; three brothers, E. D. of Crane, Renfro of Midland and Troy Richman of Port Arthur; and five sisters, Mrs. Van Lyon of San Antonio, Mrs. Frank Westerman of Midland, Mrs. Troy West of Dallas, Mrs. Roscoe Frazier of Midland and Miss Carlene Richman of Bronte.

Pallbearers were Lester and Carroll Leathers, both of Odessa, Noah Pruitt, Jr., Dewey Luckett, Benny Gilbert, Charles Timmons, Dwain Pruitt and Delbert Coalson, all of Bronte.

Humble No. 6 Hickman Flows 125 Barrels on Test

Humble No. 6 R. E. Hickman, in the Bronte field, was completed the latter part of last week. No official 24-hour potential had been announced but the well flowed 125 barrels of oil on a seven-hour gauge. This field well produced from 4,329 to 4,364 feet. This section was acidized with 500 gallons.

The McQueen & Clevenger rig was moved Monday from the No. 6 Hickman location to Humble No. 6 Mrs. Nannie Ash. This well was spudded in Tuesday. It is a west offset to the No. 5 Ash.

Humble has staked its No. 7-2 R. E. Hickman in the Bronte field. It will be 660 feet from the northeast and northwest lines of C&MRR survey.

Union Oil Co. No. 1-B Mrs. Daisy McCutchen was drilling Wednesday below 3,100 feet. Located seven miles west of Bronte, this wildcat is being drilled by the Arrow Drilling Co. of Midland.

Spartan No. 1 Levy Lee has been plugged and abandoned. This wildcat was located a short distance west of Maverick, in Rannels County.

Humble No. 4 Mrs. Sallie Odum was testing various formations this week. A good showing was found in a test above the pay section of the other wells in the Fort Chadbourne field. It is a west outpost to the field, located in Coke County.

Hiawatha and Plymouth No. 3 Tad Richards, the most southerly test in the Fort Chadbourne field, was awaiting orders this week after encountering a slight show of oil on a test from 5,245 to 5,288 feet.

A new location was staked in the Fort Chadbourne field this week. It is Lester & Duffield and Pair & Piper No. 3 S. L. McNay. Location is 1,320 feet northwest of the same operator's No. 2 McNay.

Fred M. Manning, Inc., No. 1 S. L. McNay was finished the latter part of last week for a 24 hour potential of 240 barrels of 40 gravity oil. N. P. Powell No. 5-A Mrs. Sallie Odum rated 181 barrels of 46 gravity oil on a 24 hour test.

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

From farm records compiled in the county agents office, some interesting figures are revealed concerning the well being of Mr. Average Farmer. With the increase in farm income have come increased farm expenditures, most of which are current expenses.

Comparing the years of 1944 and 1949, we find: All farm income in 1944 averaged \$2318.02 and in 1949 it averaged \$3104.49—an increase of 34 per cent in average farm income.

All expenses for the same years averaged \$1338.76 in 1944 and \$2081.82 in 1949—an increase of 56 per cent in farm expenses. The average net income in 1944 was \$979.26 and in 1949 was \$1022.67—an increase of five per cent.

Actually, although the farmer handles more dollars, he is having to get by on less because of the increased prices of the things he buys. There are other interesting sidelights.

His livestock and wool sales have increased seven per cent from the year 1944 to 1949 with the 1944 average \$1485.28 and the 1949 average \$1589.28.

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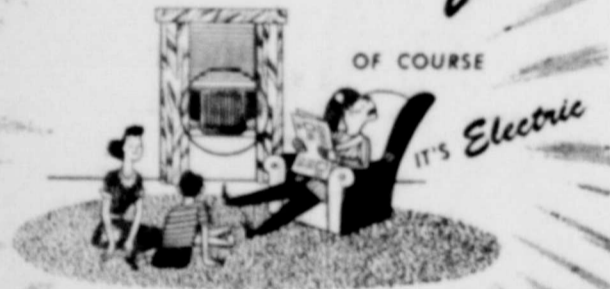

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

age was \$1593.98. The five year period saw a 65 per cent decrease in egg sales, a 34 per cent decrease in sale of dairy products but a 131 per cent increase in sale of cotton. The 1944 average for cotton sales was \$294.60 and the 1949 average was \$682.33. On the other hand a 487 per cent decrease was registered in the sale of hay and grain with the 1944 average of \$94.45 and the 1949 average \$16.25.

On the expense side of the account we find that labor costs have increased \$126 with the average \$220.02 in 1944 and \$497.26 in 1949. Feed expenses increased 19 per cent; farm gas and oil expenses increased 60 per cent; repairs and maintenance costs have increased 63 per cent; automobile upkeep costs have increased 110 per cent and taxes have gone up 84 per cent over the 1944-1949 period.
