Bronte people welcomed the first day of summer Wednesday with air conditioners and electric fans nearby. Old man weather started the season off right by raising the temperature to 98 degrees.

Mayor H. O. Whitt announced Wednesday that if the weather permits and if the material arrives on time, Bronte will be thoroughly sprayed with a DDT solution next Sunday morning.

Plans are to begin the work some time between midnight Saturday and 2 a.m. Sunday. A fogging machine has been contracted for and every square inch in the city limits will be covered, Whitt said.

The solution to be used is absolutely harmless to human beings, the mayor added, urging that everyone leave his house open so that the insect-killing fog can penetrate it. It will, however, be left up to each person as to whether or not he wants the inside of his house sprayed.

The owner and operator of the machine says that it will send a fog covering 300 feet and that a 97 per cent kill of all insects can be secured with it. Whitt said that he will be on the machine himself and will see to it that every section of the city is thoroughly covered and fogged.

The movement to spray the city was begun several weeks ago and final decision to hire a machine that could do the job right was made this week. Merchants and other persons living here donated the money to hire the machine and buy the chemicals. Whitt said that city officials will personally supervise the mixing of the solution to be used.

It is hoped by everyone that this fogging of the city will help prevent another outbreak of polio such as Bronte had last year.

## Replica of Liberty Bell To Be On Display Here Sunday at 12:15

The voice of American liberty and independence will ring out here Sunday, June 25. A bronze replica of the original bell will visit Bronte on that date, to help promote the sale of United States Savings Bonds during the Independence Drive, May 15 through July 4, according to L. T. Youngblood, Bronte savings bonds chairman.

The bell will arrive here at 12:15 and depart at 1 o'clock. While here it will be in charge of Mr. Youngblood and his committee, who have planned appropriate public ceremonies to mark the visit. The program will be presented somewhere in the vicinity of the Methodist church.

The program they have planned, which will begin promptly at 12:15 p.m., will include an opening prayer by Rev. J. E. Fuller, pastor of the Bronte Methodist church, and a talk on the story of the Liberty bell by Rev. V. D. Price, pastor of the Bronte Baptist church.

Water was flowing through the mains of Bronte again Tuesday night after being off since early Sunday. The trouble, according to Mayor H. O. Whitt, was caused by the bursting of both main lines leading to the city standpipe.

"It seems like everything happened at once," the mayor said. Both the line coming from the city lakes and the line from the wells near the river broke at the places where they cross the creeks which run through town. The creeks both had water in them, making it exceptionally difficult to determine just where the breaks were.

However, after much hunting, the lines were repaired and water began to flow again Tuesday. But not for long. The electric motor on the pump from the lake burned out and had to be taken to San Angelo for repair. It was returned to Bronte about 10 p.m. and water was running into the standpipe at 11 o'clock.

Mayor Whitt said that he believed the former water superintendent, R. H. Herron received a lot of unjust criticism in connection with the unfortunate chain of circumstances which caused so much inconvenience to residents of the city.

Herron has resigned his position and Jess Coppedge is now water superintendent. Whitt said he was extremely sorry about this resignation which was brought about by criticism which Herron did not deserve.

"However," the mayor said, "I do want to offer apologies of the city council to the people of Bronte for the inconvenience which they have had. All of the persons responsible for the operation of the water system were on the job night and day until it was in operation again. I hope the citizens of Bronte will give some consideration to the facts of the matter before anyone is condemned for neglect of duty."

"We did the very best we could in getting the water system back in operation. It seems as though circumstances were against us, but we think we have it fixed now," he concluded.

quota for the drive is \$25,000,000 series E bonds. The slogan is "Save for Your Independence—Buy U. S. Savings Bonds."

The bell is an exact duplicate, except for the crack, of the original Liberty Bell which is preserved in Independence Hall at Philadelphia. The crack is simulated in the duplicate bell so that it will have the same "voice" that proclaimed liberty 174 years ago when this nation declared itself free and independent.

The bell is one of 49 that the copper industry is furnishing as its contribution to the Independence Drive. One bell each will tour the 48 states and the District of Columbia during the seven weeks of the drive. Companies cooperating with the Treasury department to make the bells possible are Anaconda Copper Mining company, American Smelting & Refining company, American Metal company, Ltd., Kennecott Copper company, Miami Copper company, and Phelps-Dodge corporation.

The Texas bell and the 48 others will be transported on specially built trucks that are being furnished by the Ford Motor company.

"The visit of this bell gives the people of this community and county the opportunity to see an authentic replica of America's most cherished relic," Youngblood said. "I hope the largest possible number of our citizens, children as well as adults, will make plans to see and hear it. We want to issue a special invitation to citizens of our neighboring towns to participate in this program."

## Madrid Clover is Good Soil Builder

"Madrid sweet clover, a biennial crop, is proving to be an excellent soil conditioner, soil enricher, and soil building crop in the Coke County Soil Conservation district," was the statement made this week by A. V. Sheppard, work unit conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service. "The clover is a legume that is adapted to most hard soils and is a host for nitrogen fixing bacteria that develop on the root system and take nitrogen from the air and fix it in the soil to be used for future crop production." Sheppard explained. "The clover is a very deep rooted plant that is able to penetrate hard soils and tends to break up plow soles that retard the intake of water during rainfall. The deep root system opens up the soil and allows the water to enter the soil faster during

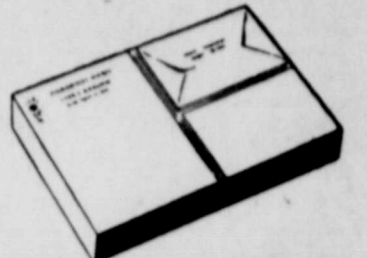
rains which is a very important factor because many of the rains in this area fall in a few minutes.

The following data were collected on D. K. Glenn's farm located one mile south of Bronte, by the personnel of the Soil Conservation Service, assisting the Coke county Soil Conservation district. These data were secured by checking the rate of water intake on a tight sandy soil on two sites. Site No. 1 was seeded to grain sorghum in 1949 and Site No. 2 was seeded to Madrid sweet clover. Both sites were seeded to oats in 1950.

Land-seeded to grain sorghum in 1949 followed with oats in 1950 took up 1.95 inches of water in 35 min-

utes; whereas, 2.92 inches of water penetrated the land seeded to Madrid sweet clover in 1949 and followed with oats in 1950 in the same length of time.

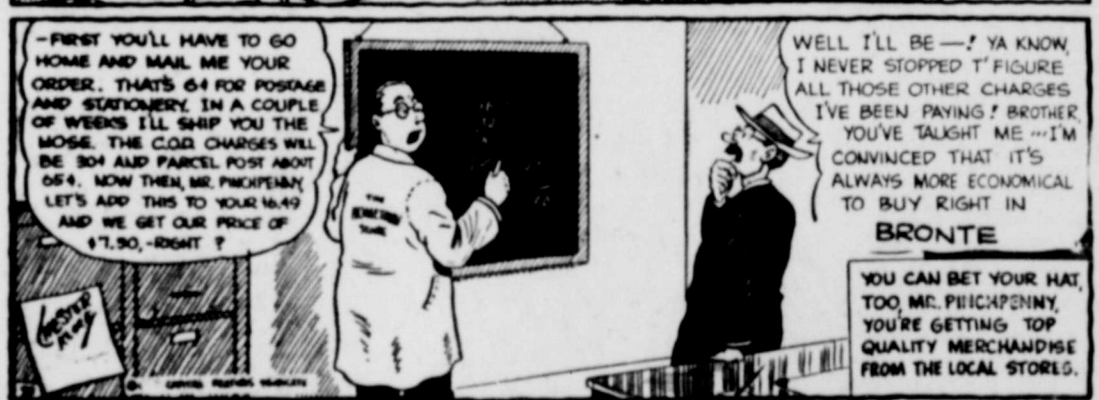

A total deficit plus borrowed money in these three funds in the amount of \$144,249.11 with only \$419.57 to the credit of the Coke County Account and with only \$87.01 to the credit of the Officers Salary Fund Account on May 31, 1950.

I maintain that the present County Judge of Coke County is directly responsible for the present financial condition of Coke County.

As Chairman of the Commissioners Court, it is the duty and responsibility of the County Judge to advise with and recommend policies to the Commissioners Court that will be to the best interest to all the county.

It is the duty and responsibility of the County Judge to prepare the budget in such a manner that each and every precinct will receive its just portion of the Regular Road & Bridge Fund, and that each and every Precinct Commissioner will know the total amount of money that he may spend.

It is the duty and responsibility of the County Judge to call for and demand a vote of the Commissioners Court on any excessive spending in the Regular Road & Bridge Fund, naming the projects that are to be worked and the amount of money that may be authorized for any excessive spending.

Article 680a-11 R.C.S. provides, and I quote in part: "Except that emergency expenditures, in case of grave public necessity, to meet unusual and unforeseen conditions may authorize the Court to amend the budget from time to time."

I maintain that there has been no need for emergency expenditures, that there has been no case of grave public necessity nor has there been any unusual or unforeseen conditions that would authorize or justify the spending of \$97,635.47 in 1949 or \$35,419.19 in the first half of 1950 from the Regular Road & Bridge Fund of Coke County.

If elected, as Chairman of the Commissioners Court, I will advise with and recommend policies to the Commissioners Court that will be to the best interest of all of Coke County.

I will prepare the budget in such a manner that each and every Commissioners Precinct will receive its just portion of the Regular Road & Bridge Fund and that every Precinct Commissioner will know the total amount of money that he may spend.

I will call for and demand a vote on any excessive spending in the Regular Road & Bridge Fund. If I have as many as two Commissioners to vote with me, Coke County will spend within its financial ability to pay.

I will sincerely appreciate your careful consideration of my candidacy and your vote.
