Contract to build a dam to create City of Sweetwater.

The proposed dam will be located approximately ten miles northeast of Bronte on the Odom Estate. Much Sweetwater city officials accepted. controversy has surrounded the project because of the hot oil play which s now going on in the area.

Campbell's bid on the project was \$300,653.28. This bid covers only Upper Colorado River Authority has oes not include the work of clearand leveling the land or of digging ecessary channels.

Work on the proposed reservoir is expected to begin within ten days after signing of contract.

In face of Board findings to the contrary, union leaders insist on 48 hours pay for 40 hours work. This would be an average increase of 31 cents an hour, or \$2.48 a day. So Union leaders have called a completely unjustified strike on 5 Western railroads, effective June 25.

On June 15, an Emergency Board appointed by President Truman under the terms of the Railway Labor Act recommended the railroads grant switchmen a 40-hour week and a wage increase of 18 cents an hour, or \$1.44 for an 8-hour day.

Despite the added financial burden involved, the railroads are ready to accept these recommendations, as they have always accepted Emergency Board recommendations on national issues.

But the leaders of the Switchmen's Union refuse to accept! They demand an average increase of 31 CENTS AN HOUR OR \$2.48 A DAY-although their present earnings are substantially higher than those of workers in other industries!

Board Says Demands Unjustified

In its report, the Board declared this demand unjustified by all the evidence presented. It also pointed out that it would give the switchmen an unfair pay advantage over other groups of railroad employes, and would add too great a burden to railroad costs.

strike in an outrageous and reckless attempt to force demands which the Board clearly labels as unjustified!







Bread rounds may be cut and buttered the night before and wrapped in wax paper, so that in the morning only a second is needed for Licaking the eggs into the cups, adding milk, and putting them

You'll want extra toast to serve with the egg cups and bacon. Temptingly browned toast is an easy way to see that your family gets a good portion of the B-vitamins and iron they need daily. Six one ounce slices of bread per day provide about ¼ of the daily minimum requirement for iron, even more of the thiamine and niacin needed for pep and all-around good health.

BAKED EGGS IN TOAST CUPS

With a scalloped cookie cutter cut rounds of bread from bread slices. Use a smaller cutter to remove center portion from 6 of the slices. Eruch each slice with melted butter or margarine. Place plain rounds of bread in bottoms

of muffin cups and top with a ring of bread. Break egg in center of each ring and add 1 tablespoon milk to each. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Serve with broiled bacon. Makes 6 servings.
