cess to one-tenth of the water in the lake when it is finished. The UCRA, headed by L. T.

Youngblood of Bronte, proposes to assist the city financially in laying a pipeline from the lake site to the city limits.

According to tests which have been run on the water which flows down Oak Creek, it is one of the best sources of water supply to be found anywhere in West Texas. Bronte officials are hoping that the city can optain an abundant water supply from the lake. They say that lack of water has alwys been a hindrance to the growth of the city and that they feel it will make appreciable growth when this water is acquired.

### SCS District Adds **Two Cooperators**

The Board of Supervisors of he Coke County Soil Conservation District held their regular meeting Friday, July 7, C. N. Webb, chairman of the board of supervisors, has announced.

J. A. Percifull and Ed Hickman became district cooperators with the District when the supervisors approved their individual soil and water conservation plans. The plans were developed to treat each acre according to its needs. Contour farming, seeding of cover crops, protecting crop stubble, range improvement, and terrace construction are some of the practices that were included in the plans. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted the landowners with the development of the plans, Webb said,

Cooperators with the Coke County Soil Conservation district are planning to tie down their soil by seeding fall cover crops consisting of rye and vetch, Madrid sweet clover, and Dixie Wonder winter peas. To date, 1,539 acres have been planned for seeding this fall.
