Oil play was on the increase this week in the Bronte area and in all Coke County. Three wildcats have been staked, other wells are nearing completion and some field tests are getting ready to start drilling.

Perhaps the test of most interest to Bronte people is the wildcat which Humble is scheduled to drill on the Pruitt place, northeast of town.

Humble has a sub-lease from Geo. W. Strake of Houston on a large block east of Bronte and the Pruitt wildcat will be the first test of this block. The rig of McQueen & Clevering which has been drilling in the Bronte Field for nearly two years, will drill the wildcat, according to C. E. Earnest, tool pusher. He said he expects to complete the Humble No. 2 Brunson in four or five days, after which the rig will be moved to the location northeast of town.

Another wildcat which was announced late last week will be Lion Oil Co.'s No. 1 Runie Waldrop. Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of section 36B, block 1-A, H&TC survey. It will be on-half mile east and slightly south of Hayrick Mountain and the same distance south of the old school building at Hayrick.

Lion No. 1 Waldrop will be four and one-half miles northeast of Union No. 1 Daisy McCutchen, recently completed discovery. It will be seven miles northwest of Bronte.

Another wildcat has been staked in the south part of Coke County. It is Humble No. 1 E. H. Schuch. Location is about 13 miles south of Robert Lee, about one mile east of the Robert Lee-San Angelo highway.

The wildcat is four and three-quarters miles southwest of Seaboard and Southern Minerals No. 1 M. G. Reed, which for awhile produced some oil from the Ellenburger.

In the Bronte Field, Humble No. 2 J. L. Brunson was drilling at 4,650 feet in shale and lime.

West of town Union No. 2 Jim McCutchen, west offset to Union No. 1-B Daisy McCutchen was drilling this week at 2,950 feet in shale and sand.

American Republics No. 1 Daisy McCutchen, south offset to the discovery well, was to set surface casing this week at about 400 feet. Connell Drilling Co. of Odessa has the drilling contract.

Two wells in the Coke County sector of the Fort Chadbourne Field were nearing completion early this week.

Humble No. 1 Wylie-Bolin recovered seven feet of gray, porous lime on a core from 3,247 to 3,264 feet in the Cisco section. The remainder of the core was green shale. Location is southwest of Barusdall No. 2 Harz Davisport and southeast of Humble No. 4 Sallie Odum, both of which produce from the Strawn section.

About two miles north, Humble No. 1 Odum-State was drillstem testing from 5,318-30 feet in Capps sand. Lester & Duffield and Pair & Piper No. 4 S. L. McNay has been completed in 16 hours for a flow of 128.3 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 980-1.

Humble No. 17-B Odum was preparing to core from 5,451 feet.

## Bronte Reserve Unit Alerted for Active Duty

Ten reservists of Coke County, most of them from Bronte, have been alerted for call to active duty in the near future.

The announcement was made this week by R. T. Caperton, commanding officer of the local Army Reserve Unit. The unit, which was organized last March, is a part of the Army Quartermaster Corps and is attached to Fort Sam Houston at San Antonio.

Coke counties who will be affected by the call are: Bon Spoots, Noel Percifull, Matthew Caperton, Frank Dean Bryan, Weldon Fikes, Dwain Pruitt, Francis Pruitt, Oliver Johnson, Wayne Rogers and Jarvis Moragne.

Exact date of reporting for active

duty and place to report were not released, but it was expected that the men from the Bronte unit will be assigned to some camp in this Army area.

Members of the Reserve who were not called, but who are subject to call are R. T. Caperton, Robert Hugh Sims, Bud Carruthers and O. R. (Soupy) Gentry.

All of the men called are veterans of World War II. Most of them are married and have families.

Other reservists in this area were standing by wondering if and when they would be called to active duty. In addition to Army Reservists, there are some Naval and Air Force Reservists living in the area.

A few Coke County men have received orders to report for examination for the draft. However, J. A. Stephenson, Coke County member of Draft Board 118, said that he thought all of them were ineligible for the draft as they are married and have failed to report it to the board. Stephenson asked that anybody who is registered under the Selective Service law should report marriage or any other changes in dependents to their board immediately. He said that a letter to Draft Board 118, Federal Building, San Angelo, Texas, would prevent much confusion and extra work both for the registrant and the draft board.

## WORK RESUMED ON SCHOOL REPAIRS; 3 TEACHERS NEEDED

Work was underway again this week on repairing and remodeling of the Bronte schools. Some of the plaster work has already been completed, but most of the work has been held up due to a technicality in the consolidation election held last September. A new election Monday of last week "made everything legal" and it is expected by officials that the work will be completed in time for school opening in September.

In addition to the plaster work, the building will get a new roofing job; it will be repainted; some of the electric installations will be replaced; defective doors and windows will be torn out and new ones put in; floors will be sanded and refinished and new treads will be placed on the stairways.

Supt. J. L. Carroll said that no definite date had been set for the opening of school, because officials have been unable to determine just when the remodeling work will be completed. However, it is expected that the 1950-51 term will begin either Sept. 4 or 11.

Carroll also announced this week that for the first time in several years the school ended the year and came out even on its local funds. He said that additional aid from the state on teachers' salaries and for transportation and increased revenue from rising valuations get the credit for this healthy financial condition.

The superintendent said that local revenue increases should make more money available to buy additional equipment for the school next year and following years.

Three teachers are still needed by the local school system. Carroll said that several applicants have inquired

about the positions which are open and that final decision on the selection will be made soon.

Teachers are needed for the fifth grade, high school English, and high school mathematics.

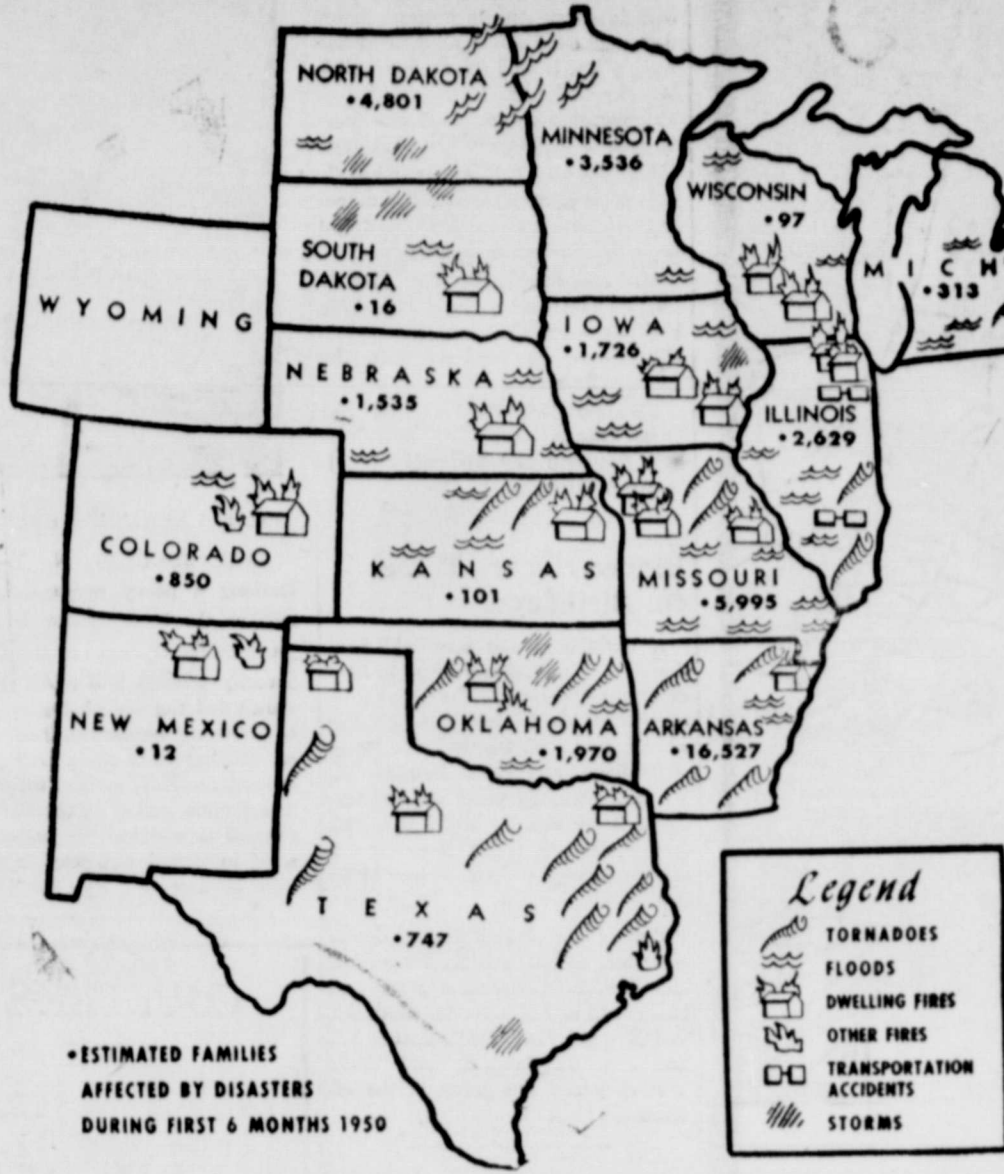
**HAVE NEW SUPERINTENDENT**

**40,000 Families Affected By Disasters in 16 States, 6-Month Survey Shows—Floods, Tornadoes Cause Greatest Loss**



Floods, tornadoes, storms, fires, and other disasters this year have struck an estimated 40,000 families in 15 of the 16 states comprising the American Red Cross Midwestern Area, shown by the above map. Red Cross officials in charge of aiding disaster victims in the area report a number of disaster operations continuing into the second half of 1950. Largest continuing operations are in the North Dakota-Western Minnesota flood area, where Red Cross has provided continuous assistance since the end of March, with operations complicated by recurring floods and blizzards.

Guy Denman and a group of his neighbors conducted a range tour Friday, August 4. The group met at Denman's farm and observed a seeding of Blue Panic and Weeping Lovegrass that is a part of Denman's complete coordinated soil and water conservation program that he is applying on his farm as a member of the South Saco Conservation Group and a district cooperater with the Coke County Soil Conservation District.

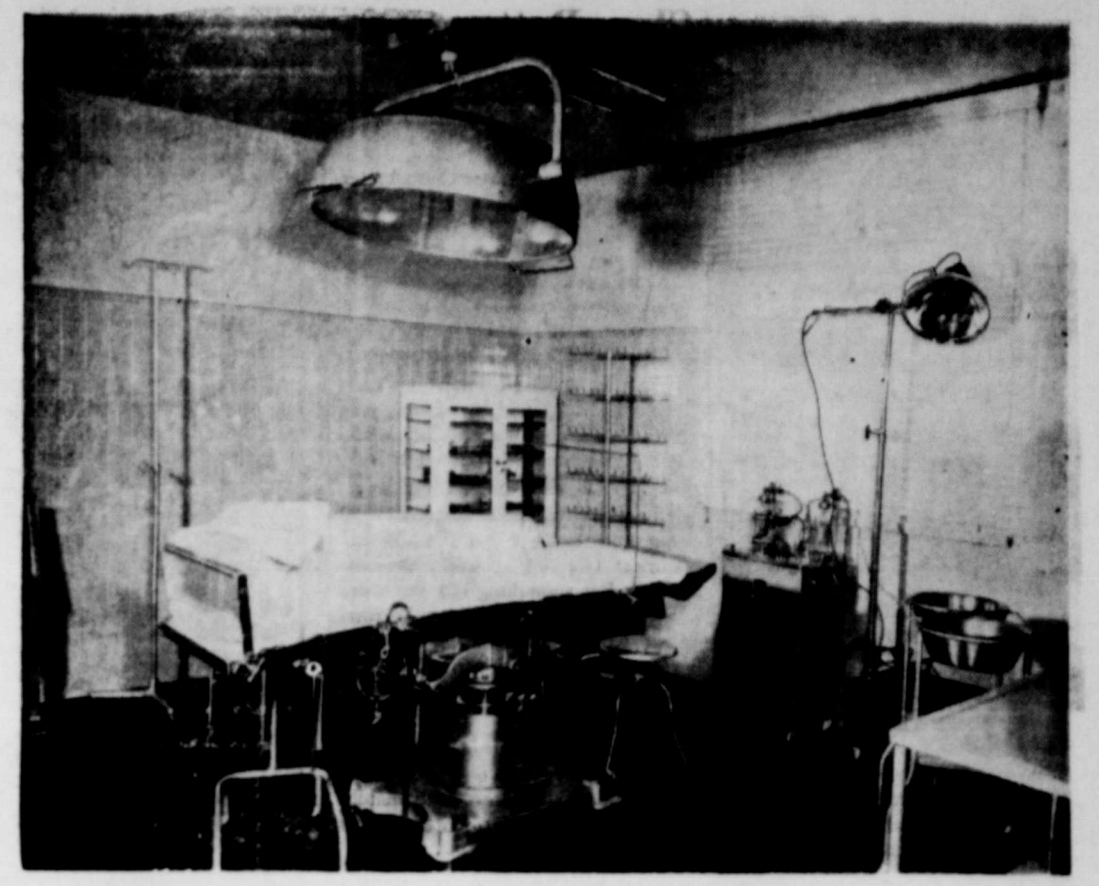
Denman plans to utilize the Blue Panic and Weeping Lovegrass to furnish summer grazing as a part of his range improvement program. By utilizing these grasses, he plans to give his native range land needed deferments during the summer.

"I started my range management by developing a soil, water, and range conservation plan in January, 1949 with the Coke County Soil Conservation District. Personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisted me with developing my plan," Austin said. "My range has made remarkable improvement the last two years, and in yearling and lamb weights will show the value of good range management. compared to 92 pounds in 1949. I am beginning to get soil erosion stabilized and get a good cover of grass on my range, and I plan to keep it there. I have found out that grass is the only feed that a rancher can obtain an economical return from," Austin said.

The group observed the invader weeds and grasses being replaced by fair and good vegetation as well as the fair to good being replaced by choice vegetation. At each stop such grasses as Side Oats Grama, Black Grama, Little Bluestem, Indian Grass, Buffalo, and Curley Mesquite are making good growth and gaining in plant vigor and replacing such vegetation as Croton Weed, Harry Tridax, Red Grama, and Threawn Needlegrass.

The group observed excellent gully stabilization with native grasses. "I have never done any mechanical work on this gully, and it is almost stabilized. The grass is making a good growth in the bottom, and I am losing very little soil," Austin said.

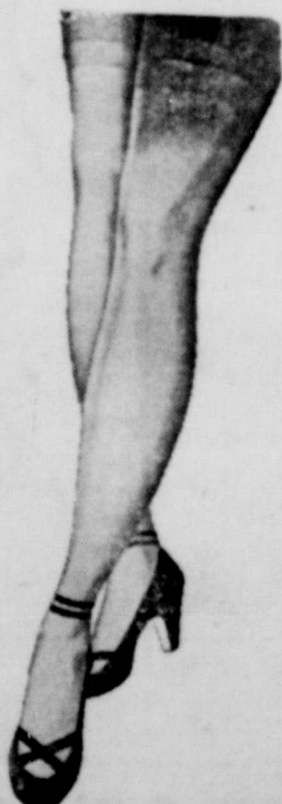

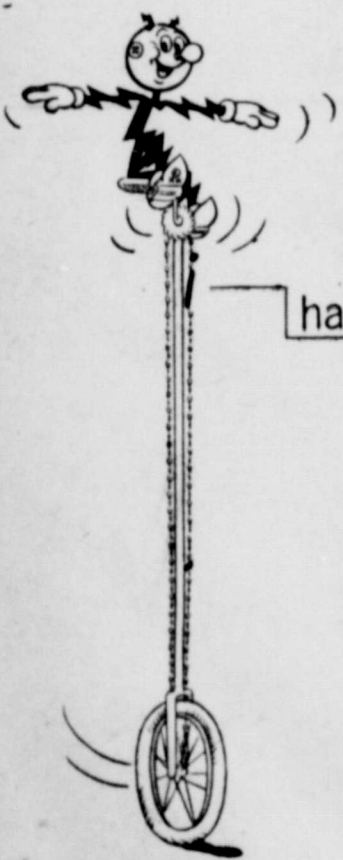

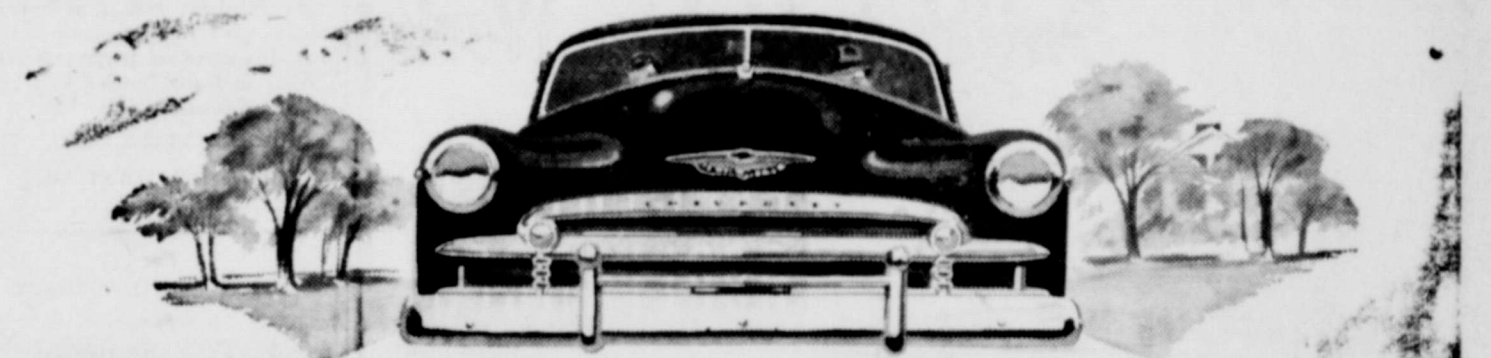
